# Skeleton revealed at Rollright

Behold – the Rose of Rollright! On 28 March, the same day that the Rollright Trust was celebrating the award of the Dark Sky Discovery to the Rollright Stone monuments, word came that a significant archaeological discovery had been made close to the site. The Muddy Boots Metal Detecting Club was scanning, with permission, on nearby private land when a strong signal indicated a large metal object. Careful and fairly deep excavation revealed a 15" long, perfectly preserved metal ladle – subsequently determined to be the only one of its type found intact. With admirable professionalism, the experienced team immediately recognised its significance and contacted the Finds Liaison Officers and the site was secured.

The following day in and rain gales, archaeologists Oxfordshire, Surrey and Bucks with members of the Muddy Boots Club began a painstaking and professional excavation and just before noon the of a perfectly preserved skull emerged. More skeletal remains came to light together with metal and other artefacts including amethyst, quartz and a

rock crystal spindle whorl. A perfectly circular bone disc with a hole in the centre was found under the spine. Following complete exposure, the preliminary assessment shows the skeleton to be that of a woman, between 4'11" and 5' tall, buried between 630 and 680 AD with a North/South orientation indicating a Saxon burial.

The complete skeleton and grave goods were removed for further investigation. At this time the fate of this 'Rose of Rollright' is not known but hopefully she may go on display locally. Following removal, the site was meticulously scoured and the ground returned to its natural state. Charles Wood, the detectorist who first found the site, considers that 'further tests and investigation could well lead to a rewriting of the Rollright history' and Leslie Webster, a leading authority on Anglo Saxon history, compares the bronze ladle find to similar finds on the Isle of Wight, Whitby and Desborough, all of which dated from Saxon times. The discovery has added to the fascinating story of the Rollright Stones area and a fuller picture should be shown at our

Autumn public forum. Until then, the Rollright Stones offers everyone a fascinating journey back in time and we urge everyone to take some time out to visit the monuments and imagine what life may have been like in those far off Saxon and distant Neolithic times.

# Rampant sheep hit town

Ursula Halifax who owns the sheep, which were

temporarily pastured in fields next to her home on Spring Street, thanked the people of Chipping Norton and the Police for their intervention.

# **Changing role for Dr Edwards**

With our GPs' new Chipping Norton Health Centre fully up and running, the News visited the Centre to talk to Dr David Edwards about his changing future role, which will include continuing to practise part-time as a locum GP here. As a longstanding and senior partner at the old White House

practice, David was heavily involved in both the initial idea and planning of the move to merge Chippy's two GP surgeries. The merger 'went live' in April with a brand new single partnership formed by a core team from both surgeries, and the old White House and West Street partnerships coming to an end. David, who is now 60, announced he was taking this sensible moment to step down from any partnership role in the new practice – but many of his Chipping Norton patients will be pleased to hear he is staying on as a 'locum' doctor part-time at the new surgery to help out for some time to come.

David also now wants to spend more time on some of his wider medical interests. He already runs specialist men's health clinics which he aims to continue. His medical specialism of dealing with both men and women's sexual health problems also takes him much wider afield than Chipping Norton. He is a Past President of the British Society of Sexual Medicine, and a member of a national Men's Health Experience Policy Group. David is also a lead researcher on a major multicountry patient-based study on more effective uses of aspirin.

So patients visiting the now 'up and running' Chipping Norton Health Centre will continue to see Dr Edwards' familiar face helping out, particularly at a time when both patients and staff are getting over all the typical start-up problems that come with working in a new environment. David himself is delighted with the new building and the facilities saying it is 'wonderful to see it all blossoming and it should provide a major boost for maintaining and growing primary care health services in Chipping Norton'. Tony Love, now the Business Manager of the larger single practice, told the News that everyone was pleased David would still be providing experienced support and advice as and when needed.

# Work starts at Baptist church

It looks like work is finally starting on the renovation of Baptist Chapel down New Street. It will be converted into eight two-bedroom apartments and a smaller hall underneath. After years of delay since its closure new signs have



gone up under the aegis of estate agents Chancellors announcing that the apartments will be ready early in 2016.

# Premier Inn application submitted

The planning application for a 72-bedroomed hotel with restaurant on the site of the former Castle View Care Home and ambulance station on Spring Street was submitted on 2 April. A review shows no significant changes from the proposals displayed in the public exhibition, reported in May. Premier Inn say they received 31 responses and 'the overwhelming majority of comments supported a new Premier Inn in Chipping Norton.' They say detailed comments focussed on design and traffic levels. However, in their application Premier Inn do not report all the comments they received, only a 'representative sample'. As reported last month at the initial exhibition, Mayor Mike Tysoe said that he and some councillors were positive in that hotel guests might bring spending to the Town. Now councillors and planning officers will consider the merits of this in the detailed application - and may well focus on issues such as suitability of design, views from surrounding area, access, congestion and parking.

# Benefits to local economy?

The proposal points to a potential boost to the local economy from extra hotel visitors. An additional £1.1m visitor spending is claimed. Premier Inn anticipate 23,000 overnight visitors per year (assuming average occupancy of 1.2 people and 64 rooms every night of the year). Normally about  $^{1}/_{3}$  of their visitors eat out in the evening but Premier Inn anticipate more here due to their

'limited fare food and beverage offer, which will be principally aimed at providing guest breakfasts' in their 66-seater restaurant. They calculate that local bars and restaurants could see 9,000 extra customers a year, who will, apparently, have on average £41 per head to spend on food, drink and travel, which we calculate totals £369,000. This doesn't quite equate to the £1.1 million benefit to the local economy that caught the headlines. Presumably the big gap comes from from indirect spending, including by the people to be appointed to the 15 full time equivalent new jobs on offer.

#### Big additions of hotel space

Lots more local hotel rooms are on the way. Construction is well underway of a 34-bedroomed hotel at The Cotswolds (golf) Club. Four extra bedrooms at the refurbished and extended Fox Hotel should be available soon. Thirty cabins at the up-market private members club outpost Soho House near Great Tew are opening imminently, so these 72 proposed Premier Inn bedrooms will take the tally of new hotel rooms in the Chippy area to 140! Is Chipping Norton set to become the visitor hub of the north Cotswolds?

#### Russian Medal for Bob

One of the residents at Chipping Norton's Henry Cornish Care Centre is being honoured for his Second World War exploits. In April Bob 'Badger' Smith joined a small select group, all in their 90s, at Oxford Town Hall to collect the Ushakov Medal from Russian Diplomat Dr Alexander Yakovenko after Russian President Vladimir Putin signed a decree, awarding this to all of the Veterans of the Arctic Convoy. Called by Churchill 'the worst journeys in the world' 78 convoys over four years in 1400 merchant ships, under constant U-boat threats, took supplies from the west to the northernmost parts of Russia. Then, on 4 June, Bob is off to Buckingham Palace for another memorable occasion – the Blind Veterans' garden party.

Come rain or shine every Wednesday you'll find Mark of Saywards of Whilton on the corner of the market busily and

cheerily serving his customers with a wide range of fruit, vegetables and free-range eggs. 'Customer loyalty is important to us' said Mark, 'so whatever the weather we keep up a presence here.' Judging by the number of returning shoppers each week the stall certainly has a loyal following. Saywards have been in Chippy market for 15 years though Mark himself has worked in market trading for some 40 years, since his teens, continuing the tradition of his marketing family. Produce is sourced from a wholesaler in

Leicester and British products are supported as much as is possible; for example at this time of year, asparagus and

Jersey Royal potatoes and soon strawberries. They have stalls at two other markets and also supply some small

wholesalers and retail outlets. Comparing his three market stalls Mark said 'The rent is more expensive in Chippy but trade is better here. This is in spite of parking having become more of an issue over the years'. Local business owner Sophie Evans, a regular customer, had this to say about Mark and his assistants: 'They are always friendly and will carry my bags to the car. There is a good range of produce which is always fresh, ripe and juicy'. You might think that Mark would put his feet up on non-market days

but not a bit of it. Swapping produce for livestock he keeps busy as a part-time farmer breeding South Devon cattle.

Craft Group, Phil helps keep alive this wood-turning craft called Bodging.

There were home-made cakes, chutneys, bread and cheese, games and music. Good Intent, a four-piece band played for most of the day; with some old favourites which got visitors of all ages dancing or foot-tapping and the Chipping Norton Singers sang well in four-part harmony, entertaining us with selection of songs ranging from a Zulu prayer to folk songs.

# Ladybirds at Oxfam bookshop

# Recycle your phone - & win!

24 June – 4 July sees the annual celebration of all things cooperative with 'Co-operatives Fortnight'. All co-ops nationally join in to show 'why they are local, loved and trusted'. This year the focus is the 'Big Co-op Clean' to help communities clean up their local area and homes with any excess items donated to good causes. The Phone Co-op in Chipping Norton will be helping people dispose of their old mobile phones. Valuable minerals in old phones can get reused to reduce the mining of minerals in conflict-affected regions. Any mobiles unable to renew life elsewhere will be disposed of with care for the environment, with any sensitive info removed beforehand. The recycling scheme will be launched via the website and old handsets can be handed in at The Phone Co-op's Half-Yearly Meeting at Chipping Norton Town Hall from 9-11.30am on Saturday 4 July. Any proceeds go to charity and donors will enter a competition to win a brand new Fairphone, the world's first smartphone to put social values and ethical production first. The Phone Co-op, here in Chippy, is the sole UK Fairphone supplier. The week celebrates the work of around 6,000 co-operative businesses.



# **Town Council report & issues**

April saw the annual public Town Hall Meeting where Mayor Mike Tysoe and the 'retiring' Town Council members faced around 35 members of the public to report on the year and answer questions. The Mayor covered key achievements including investments in recreation equipment, the Town Hall and smartening the Town, all contributing to Council Tax increases covering current and future costs. Plans such as a new skateboard park and major Town Hall repairs will need considerable investment. The Mayor also announced a gift of £1000 to the Chippy Trixsters Roller Hockey team to support them representing Great Britain. But the Council's idea of buying the Police Station building has made little progress the plan may well be too ambitious. Deputy Mayor Chris Butterworth gave an update on the Neighbourhood Plan now due for final inspection before putting it to a Town Referendum. At this Town meeting and at the April Council meeting a number of questions were asked on other issues. Here is a run down:

**Need for more Town infrastructure** – one questioner asked, with big housing growth, where were plans for more town infrastructure – schools, roads, parking, utilities, public transport around town and beyond? The Neighbourhood Plan

mentions this but it will need money and collaboration to achieve it (see separate News feature on p17).



Flashing reminders warn drivers not to exceed the speed limit

London Road safety – one councillor predicted big issues over traffic, parking and speeding dangers further up London Road, with the hospital, Holy Trinity School and even more houses at that end of town. Traffic calming and other measures may well need more debate.

The Green and Churchill Road – much discussion was had over the need for traffic calming or 20mph limits along Churchill Road, or one-way traffic up The

Green and a new school entrance. All for more debate. A mirror to help with the blind turn at the top of The Leys seemed to be another 'not easy' question.

Worcester Road speeding and parking – longstanding speeding issues are about to be partially addressed by new flashing 30mph signs, but there are still complaints about cars parked on the pavement and verge blocking pedestrian access – and for those with mobility vehicles – see picture below.



**Dangerous pavements** – complaints to councillors over dangerous pavements in the Town need action – everyone should report risks to the County. Get your tape measure out: an uneven 'rise' of over 12 mm between pavement slabs requires action!

**Shop signs and frontages** – Town Councillors are getting uppity about rogue new shop signs and lights – and even potential awnings and furniture – many raise planning and consent issues in our 'historic' town centre. West Oxfordshire District Council (who seem to have little appetite for compliance) are to be asked to do some kind of audit.

Footpath from New Street car park – and old chestnut – why is the footpath up to the Town Centre (past Bannor Electrical) not open at weekends? Some years back the Town Clerk's office apparently lost the paperwork logging a claim for a public right of way through continuous usage – and the private owners have now set a

new precedent. The Chippy News has sent the Mayor past issues setting it all out.

**Blocking off Middle Row** – Plans are still progressing (slowly) to block off Middle Row with bollards to avoid rogue through traffic. Signage and permissions are all rather slow in coming.

Who owns the railway cutting? – There is a mystery of who owns the railway track land at the bottom of the Common between the old railway bridge and the tunnel. It's all now flooded and needs drainage. Is it Network Rail, the Field Reeves, or someone else? No-one seems to know nor take responsibility – more investigation is needed.

Chipping Norton's new Town Council – working with District and County representatives, will no doubt be picking up many of these issues in the coming months.

### **Chickens visit Southerndown**

The eggs definitely came first at Southerndown Care Home in Chipping Norton back around Easter. But then the eggs - courtesy of the Living Egg Company - cracked and hatched, with soft chirps being heard from inside the shell! Nine of the 10 eggs hatched and residents loved it. 'This has made Easter even more special,' said General Manager, Mandy Vettraino. 'Spring has certainly sprung Southerndown.' After fortnight the chickens, then too big for their box, were returned to their farm.

#### What's new at The Museum?

Now open for the summer, Chipping Norton Museum of Local History (next to the Co-op arcade entrance) has some new things to explore. The winter closure has seen the reorganisation of the Bliss display and a general tidying up of the family history and archives area. There is also a considerable amount of research material from the estate of the local history expert, the late Ralph Mann, numerous family name files and an estimated 30,000 plus name index cards. Last September the Museum welcomed two visitors from Australia who donated two framed samplers and a booklet detailing their history. Both were made in Chipping Norton one in 1818 by Elizabeth Howse and another in 1847 by her daughter Louisa Hannah Green. Louisa married in 1864 and shortly after the family left for the goldfields of South Australia, taking the samplers with them. So after about 150 years away they are back home.

Finally, a reminder that the Museum has a wide range of museum-published books on local history for sale together with a selection of cushions and scarves made of genuine Bliss tweed. The Museum is always on the look-out for volunteers to give a few hours of their time once a month to staff the Museum during opening hours – call 641712 for details.

# Too far to nearest tip

April's Town Council saw another exchange of views between Town, District and County Councillors on the (lack of) action

to replace Dean Pit waste and recycling centre which was closed by Oxfordshire County Council. While flytipping and residents' complaints are still happening (see last month's News), the County does not appear to see this as an urgent issue and continues to say 'strategy is being reviewed.' They say the nearest tips at Alkerton and Ardley can serve the north of the County. County Councillor Hilary Biles suggested at one point in the Town Council meeting that the nearest County tips were 'only a 20-minute drive away'. District Councillor Geoff Saul, who wants the WODC and the County to set up a working party, subsequently wrote to the News saying, 'I will be interested to see if you can get to Alkerton in 20 minutes – the AA route planner shows a round trip on main roads from our front door to Alkerton is 37.8 miles with an estimated journey time of 38 minutes one way (ie a round trip of an hour and a quarter). If you go via Hook Norton and use back roads the distance is reduced to a round trip of 27.4 miles but the estimated journey time increases to 50 minutes each way'. Readers' views and experiences are welcome.

# Police & crime updates

This month's update is from PC Mick Anderton and local press

Crime figures - At the last Town Council meeting, police reported 68 crimes recorded last month in the local area. Around 20 were domestic issues, 15 theft, around 8 traffic offences and the rest ranged from assaults to shoplifting and antisocial behaviour. Generally, this is a low figure and down from previous months.

**Theft from vans** – power tools were stolen from work vans around 6/7 May in Hailey Avenue and Lord's Piece Road in Chipping Norton, Meadow Way in Kingham and St Michael's Close in Shipton-under-Wychwood. Three out of the four had no forced entry and yet the vans had definitely been locked.

Lock your sheds securely - There have been several burglaries from sheds, garages and greenhouses including a lock cut off at a house on Churchill Road, Chipping Norton overnight on 19-20 April when a large lawn mower was

Nuisance Drone aircraft - Police had reports of young people using Drone type aircraft. Their use has to adhere to the guidelines for the safety of people, vehicles and buildings - so watch out.

**Shooting birds** – Reports have come of people shooting wood pigeons taking bird food from feeders in gardens. This is an offence under the Wildlife and Countryside Act. Wood pigeons can be shot only if they are damaging farmers' crops. These incidents have been passed to the Wildlife Crime Officer to pursue.

**Those rampant sheep** – A pat on the back has been given to the Chipping Norton neighbourhood police team who had to deal with escaped sheep - 'part of the job that they don't offer any training for!'

#### Sue's appetite for local eateries

Local Chippy resident Sue Hadland has recently joined the Chippy News team and hopes to focus on the enjoyable task of reviewing local places to eat and drink. Sue's big passions beyond catering include travel and photography – she decided in 2000 on the 40 photographs she wanted to take in her lifetime, and to date she has taken 25 of them including one of her favourites, a black bear up an Alaskan creek fishing for salmon. She has also visited Antarctica, the Galapagos and Australia, capturing more great shots along the way. In addition to all this she loves bowling and does all the catering there, and is the local group coordinator for U3A. Sue is looking forward to working on our team and has a genuine appetite for reviewing our local eateries both in town and further afield, saying it's not just about the food. #### An interview with Cllr Eve Coles

Chipping Norton's Eve Coles decided this year not to stand for re-election to West Oxfordshire District Council after representing the Town for 21 years. But she stormed back on to the new Town Council topping the poll – a sign of how well known and respected she is in the Town. The Newsteam's Linda Rand spoke to her for some reflections:

Eve, you are real Chippy girl, aren't you? Yes, I was born here. After the war, my family moved to the East End of London and I was terribly homesick. I have lived in Chippy most of my life, except for my years as a student nurse in Banbury. I was married here, worked here and raised my children here.

What changes have you seen in Chippy over that time? Well, Chippy has changed, of course, but evolved, rather than changed suddenly. It's not pretentious; it's really friendly and has kept its identity as a real working town.

Before we talk about your public life, what about your other interests, many in caring for others and in environmental issues? Yes, I trained as nurse at the Horton, I worked in Chippy Hospital and then at Castle View Care Home for 38 years of weekend night duty, from when it opened in the 1960s until I retired. As trainee nurse, I cared for my mother, who wasn't in the best of health and sadly died aged only 42.

But you were a Governor of Penhurst for 20 years and a member of the Hospital Action Group. At present you are a Trustee and Governor of the Ace Centre and a Trustee and Secretary of Age Concern Chipping Norton, which runs The Highlands Day Centre, the shop, Chatterbox etc. The Ace Centre is a wonderful place. I was there recently and saw many children but not a single tear. The staff are fabulous; it is a supportive and non-judgemental place for young parents and babies. We have great staff and volunteers at our Age Concern services, not forgetting our Thursday morning Chatterbox in the Town Hall with home-made cake and coffee.

And what about environmental issues? Well, I have always loved the countryside. I have tried to do my best for the Town and get the recreation facilities that it needs. That's really why I became involved with the District Council.

So tell me about how that began. Well, the late Charlie Withers had been fighting for a new leisure centre for the Town and he wanted me to carry on. I was first elected in 1994. And with the support of others, such as John Hannis and Tony Walker, we succeeded. I think it is great asset for families and youngsters.

But aren't your environmental interests wider, including air pollution in the town centre caused by lorries? Well, I must admit I have been a bit of a thorn in the side of the powers-that-be about the damage that heavy lorries do to Chippy. Our A44 Action Group had some success in getting the nitrogen dioxide monitoring station and getting evidence about air pollution and possible alternative HGV routes. I don't think we need a by-pass though, as this would kill the Town, but we do need an alternative route for HGVs.



For some time you were a lone Labour voice at West Oxfordshire. Yes, but now there are several excellent Labour Councillors and so I don't feel so bad about standing down when I know Chippy is in good hands. Laetisia Carter and Geoff Saul work hard and Geoff is really excellent on the Planning Committee.

The Labour Party recently gave you an Award of Merit for services. Was that a proud moment? Well, it was lovely of course but I wasn't interested in the award as such. I prefer to concentrate on what we can achieve. I didn't

want a big do, just to be amongst friends at the Christmas party.

You have been on Chipping Norton Town Council for 39 years, and topping the poll! Is it really that long? Well, I was delighted to be re-elected in May. There is so much to do. I was Chair of the Recreation Committee and have been working for better play facilities. I must say Mayor Mike Tysoe has been very supportive. I am determined that we should secure green spaces and recreation areas in our new developments. Children need places to let off energy and socialise, not just sit in their bedrooms with their computers.

But you have never been Mayor, why not? Oh well, I don't like the trappings and networking. I'm a Socialist not a socialiser! I'd rather be hands-on doing things.

So this year you stood down down from West Oxfordshire, what will you miss and what will you have more time for? Well, I won't miss standing around on cold evenings waiting for buses to Witney for one thing! I hope I will have more time for my family and friends whom I fear I have neglected.

Eve, we wish you a happy time ahead. But it certainly doesn't sound like you have retirement plans just yet!

# Can you afford to live in Chippy?

#### 16% house price surge

On 23 April the *Banbury Guardian*, quoting the *Telegraph*, said 'Chipping Norton' house prices had risen 16% during 2014, double the UK growth rate and more like London. A typical

price of a detached 4 bedroom home was 'now £602,000' and the 'average' house price was up from £340,000 to £395,000. Apparently these soaring prices are down to our town's many attractions, with Mayor Mike Tysoe saying 'we have excellent pubs, restaurants and a theatre' and that Chippy 'as a whole is a nice working Cotswolds town'. Experienced estate agent Max at Fairfax & Co told us he thought that 'in town' the prices had increased by 'only' around 10% on average but the big increase in the top whack prices might be distorted by being the wider OX7

area includes some 'desirable' villages. But on RightMove there certainly are a number of fourbedroom town' properties around £500.000. Max at Fairfax welcomed the prospect of more housing for the which Town





could in turn support an improved town centre and better infrastructure – making the Town even more attractive for top end developers and house buyers perhaps escaping from even more expensive areas.

### Not enough 'affordable' homes

All very well, but what about homes for young people trying to get on the ladder or low income households increasingly struggling to find places to live in and around Chippy as a 'working Cotswold town'? Mayor Tysoe himself said 'some of the youngsters are being forced out' but he did know others who have 'worked their socks off' or had 'help from mum and dad' to buy in the Town.

Chipping Norton District Councillor Geoff Saul told the News that in March WODC's Head of Housing advised that

there were 187 households on the Council's waiting list that would qualify for 'affordable' housing in Chipping Norton. But he said there has been little new affordable housing built in Chipping Norton in recent years, although Green Square (who took over development from Cottsway) are now

completing a limited number of new houses and flats for affordable rent on Cornish Road and Hailey Road. There are currently no new shared ownership properties available in Chipping Norton at all. The nearest Cllr Saul could find

currently advertised were outside West Oxfordshire in Wallingford and Wantage or across the County border in Northamptonshire or Warwickshire.

#### **Better future prospects?**

Cllr Saul explained that the new West Oxfordshire Local Plan – with 1800 new homes earmarked possibly in the Chipping Norton area – should be finally in place next year and could help. Any future development in Chipping Norton with more than 15 houses must provide 40% 'affordable' housing on site.

So with 228 new homes south and east of Walterbush Road, 91 are affordable houses and flats. Two thirds of these (59) would be 1/2 bedroom homes and the rest should be 3/4 bedroom homes. Similarly, if the big Tank Farm site has 600 new homes, then 240 of these should be affordable homes with a similar proposed split of sizes. Of this affordable housing, the Council will push for two 'affordable rented' homes to be built for every one 'intermediate' home (which includes shared ownership housing where you buy a share of a newly built property outright and pay a subsidised rent to the housing association on the portion you don't own).

#### But 'affordable' to whom?

But the problem remains that so called 'affordable housing' is often still not affordable to many people. Housing Association 'affordable rents' currently have to be 80% of a market rent which can in itself be a prohibitive amount. To be eligible for Shared Ownership buyers must have savings of at least £3,500 to £4,000, have a good credit history and the ability to fund both a mortgage to cover the part share bought as well as the rent on the remaining portion. Many young families would struggle to meet these criteria even if the homes were available. But this is academic – until the larger developments (such as the new Walterbush Road site) are actually built the options are not there anyway. And with market prices still rising well above inflation, will our housing still be out of reach for those local people that need it?

Views on Chippy's housing issues are welcome from Councillors, other local residents and all readers.

# Who's paying for Chippy's growth?

With big growth signalled for Chipping Norton – up to 1800 new houses in the town and nearby in 15 years – big

questions are now being raised by residents about their impact on the Town and the need some real investment in what is called delightfully 'infrastructure'. That means dealing with traffic congestion, HGV pollution, parking, road safety, overflowing schools. inadequate sewers, poor public



transport around and out of town, town centre development, library and leisure facilities and more. Who is planning this and, more important, who pays and how? Central government will only deal with big items such as major roads – and your local Council Tax only supports existing services. The 'system' is about to change and how do we get the best for Chippy? The Newsteam took a look at all this.

#### A long list of 'what's needed'

In February West Oxfordshire's final Local Plan set out some of what is needed to support Chippy's big growth. Some things are clear: when 600 houses are built at Tank Farm developers will have to fund a new primary school and things like better sewers and water will be funded by Thames Water (out of your payments). Then, in what WODC call the 'Infrastructure Delivery Plan', there are some costed items listed including a big subsidy for making the S3 bus half-hourly, some limited 'highway infrastructure' and the odd new zebra crossing.

But then there seems to be a list of uncosted, unfunded items, with no specific plans — a bit of a shopping list. For example, the aspirations for HGV restrictions and dealing with air quality pollution get only a fleeting reference and no committed plan. Improvements to bus stops, rail bus, and cycle paths get a mention but are uncosted. Then WODC say that Chipping Norton's Neighbourhood Plan will 'explore' the idea of 'additional off street public car parking' and will 'further inform future leisure needs of the Town' including an all weather football/rugby pitch and the future of Greystones. However, neither in WODC's Plan nor in the Neighbourhood Plan are these items costed nor apparently funded — and there is no specific reference to play, open space, footpaths and other green infrastructure, nor to upgrading the library, visitor centre and other social and community facilities.

### So where is the money?

One current system, called Section 106, has seen some infrastructure improvements paid for in planning agreements with house developers. But this is being scaled back in order to focus on developers providing affordable housing. We now need to look to a brand new system, called the Community Infrastructure Levy, to fund infrastructure. Under the Levy scheme, WODC plan to charge developers who build more

than II homes £100 per square metre of floor space (£200 per sq m if less than II homes). This will apply to normal

homes, sheltered and extra care housing and some commercial development – but affordable and self build homes, offices and industry will be exempt. The rate is out for consultation – and WODC need to weigh up whether developers will see this as viable.

If it works – then the site with 600 homes at Tank Farm (with 40% affordable and exempt) could produce around £3m, nearly £10,000 per home, for new infrastructure.

The money will be levied by District Council as a one-off charge. planning once permission granted. Under the new guidance 15% must be passed to the Town Council but, where Neighbourhood Plan is in place, this amount can

increased to 25%. So just from Tank Farm our Town Council could be £750,000 or so better off!

#### So what action is needed?

On the surface a lot of money could be available. But any money could easily disappear – for example a big bus subsidy for the S3 could alone cost £1m – and if the County find no other money for the HGV action we might have to put that in the 'list' and hand over a lot of the Levy. What is critical now is that the projects we really need (and not just the shopping list) must be clearly laid out, costed and prioritized. And for action on things such as the HGV plan our Councillors will have to go back to the County and bid for funding from somewhere else, or the Town will not get all the other 'infrastructure' it really needs. Finally, if the final Neighbourhood Plan is of any use, it must link clearly to a specific costed Delivery Plan and then be adopted as official.





**Take control:** The best way to kick start a lifestyle change is to write down your goals and the reasons you want to reach them. Set realistic goals and then stick to them. If you 'fall off the wagon' for a day or two, don't give up, refocus and pull your fitness programme back on track.

**Go for a run:** If you've been inspired by the London Marathon then get your trainers on! Running is the best aerobic exercise you can get and offers a wealth of different options. If you're happier working out inside, then try the treadmills

at your local leisure centre. If you prefer being out in the fresh air then contact BetterGOActive@GLL.org and book onto the next Just Jog course and step out with like minded friends.

Make a splash: Pool-based exercise is also a great way to get fit and lose weight. It's non-weight bearing so you're less likely to injure yourself and it's ideal for people not used to exercising or with injuries. You can try just lane swimming or sign up for lessons to improve your technique, aqua aerobics or even synchronised swimming.

**Add some weights:** Adding some simple weight training, using hand weights, barbells or resistance machines, will burn even more calories and tone your muscles more efficiently than cardio exercise alone. Try performing three sets of 15-20 squats, with a 30-45-second rest between sets, while holding

dumbbells. It's a great way to tone your lower body.

**Stretch it out:** If the lithe, lean look is what you're after then take a Pilates or Yoga class. It'll help you focus on your breathing and stretch out your muscles, helping to tone without increasing bulk. Lower impact activities like these are a great way to de-stress after a hectic day at the office or looking after the kids.

**Have fun:** If you have fun whilst keeping fit, you will be more likely to keep it up. If you don't like running, don't run. Find an activity that gets your pulse racing and you enjoy – that way you won't want to stop exercising.

More info: For anyone embarking on a fitness campaign there are a host of activities designed to suit every taste and fitness level. The Leisure Centre (www.better.org.uk) has regular classes, a gym, and indoor pool and expert fitness trainers who can create tailor-made programmes and help keep you motivated and on track. The Lido (www.chippylido.co.uk) is open until 6 September if you fancy open air swimming. Local Yoga and Pilates classes can be found via Google. 
#### Successful cricket recruiting

On 7 May, Chipping Norton voters made a large turnout of around 73% for MP, District and full Town Council elections. Congratulations to all those elected and thank you to all who stood for election.

**Parliamentary Election** David Cameron was re-elected as Witney's MP with his share of the vote increasing from 58.8% in 2010 to 60.2%. Duncan Enright increased Labour's share from 13% to 17.2% and moved from third to second place; UKIP pushed the Lib Dems into fourth place. Main results were:
