NHS Beds Shock

NHS nurses no longer to staff our 14 Hospital Beds

Anger broke out in June as Oxfordshire County Council announced they will no longer pay for NHS nurses to staff the Town's 14 'intermediate care' beds — which provide a specialist service for NHS patients after treatment in the main hospitals.

After months of unresolved contract discussions, County Council and NHS say firmly that this NHS service will continue and that standards of service will not be affected. But they want to simplify things by using nurses employed by the Order of St John Care Trust – the charity that runs the building and the care home. They say this could be £1000 per week per bed cheaper.

Local councillors, the Hospital Action Group, and UNISON are upset, with fears of downgrading or eventual loss of NHS service – perhaps with the County eventually switching NHS money into cash-starved residential and home social care. MP David Cameron and the Oxfordshire Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee want detailed explanations – but there may not be any more public consultation. Full report page 2.

The NHS bed issues in Chipping Norton

Since Chipping Norton's new hospital and care home opened over four years ago, the NHS has funded 14 'Intermediate Care' beds specifically for NHS patients mostly recovering from treatment in our NHS hospitals. The beds and equipment are to 'hospital' standards and staffing has (to date) been by NHS-employed nurses from Oxford Health NHS Foundation Trust, who had worked in the old hospital.

What is changing and why?



While this is still clearly an NHS service, the NHS nurses are working with beds and building physically operated by the Order of St John Care Trust – the charity that runs

the adjoining Henry Cornish Care Centre. This has meant some kind of joint responsibility for the unit. Chippy's vicar Rev James Kennedy, on behalf of local users, said that after initial difficulties, since early 2014, 'the systems and services have improved such that the Unit has grown to be a happy, safe, efficient and well-managed facility.' The NHS budget for all this is in fact now run by Oxfordshire County Council, who also fund social care. There have apparently been problems agreeing a new contract since 2014. All parties say there are continuing management and regulatory issues with the joint arrangements and a very significant 'funding gap'. The result is that OCC are now going to contract directly with OSICT to provide the whole hospital bed service more cheaply, entirely with OSICT staff. NHS nurses are being consulted on whether they want to change employer (with guaranteed 'TUPE' terms and conditions) or be redeployed elsewhere by Oxford Health.

OCC say 'no change to service'

An official statement sent by David Smith, Chief Executive of the NHS Clinical Commissioning Group says 'OCC will continue to fund this NHS service, which will be provided by OSJCT. There is no need for any concern. The change is not to the service provided to the people of Chipping Norton, rather a change in who is responsible for providing that service. It had proved impossible to make the system work with two sets of management arrangements. Continuing with the current arrangements would cost for each bed nearly £1,800 per week (over £1m per year) while it costs £823 per week for a comparable OSJCT service at Isis House Care and Retirement Home in Oxford, fully compliant with the CQC.' In the statement John Jackson, Director of Adult Social Care at the County Council said, 'OSJCT is an experienced care provider which has received good ratings from inspections held by the CCG, the County Council and the Care Quality Commission'.

Accusations of 'downgrading'

Mayor, Local Councillors and the Hospital Action Group – formed previously to help safeguard NHS services – all have major concerns (see statement from Chair of HAG). The main issue is whether Order of St John can provide the same

service standards of qualified nursing staff. Doubts are raised about OSJCT's abilities, everyone sees the cost cutting, and some fear that demands on the County to provide more social and residential care might squeeze their budget and commitment to local NHS 'hospital' beds. Cllr Jo Graves, Chair of the Hospital Friends, was 'appalled' at the decision and was very concerned at potential 'downgrading'. A local UNISON statement talked about OCC trying to 'push a significant service change through the back door' and 'care beds being handed over to the private sector' when 'David Cameron promised that the NHS was safe in his hands'.

Challenge and scrutiny

Many want a public consultation. Mayor Mike Tysoe's protest letter suggested that OSJCT's pay, skills, and staffing levels would be lower – potentially risking patient safety. An angry response from Cllr lan Hudspeth, the Leader of Oxfordshire County Council accused the Mayor of 'mispresentation of facts', ignoring their briefing statement, and making 'completely unjustified' and even actionable statements about OSJCT. It looks like, even with loud local protests, forcing a formal consultation based on 'significant service change' may not be easy. Cllr Yvonne Constance, Chair of Oxfordshire's Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee, has this item on her 2 July agenda. She, along with MP David Cameron, has demanded a detailed report, and wants closer monitoring of what happens. But this of course may not satisfy everyone in Chippy.

Statement from Chipping Norton Hospital Action Group



It is with a great deal of concern that our Action Group learned that despite the written commitment OCC gave us last year that our beds and nurses would be fully staffed and managed by the NHS, for the next three years, they now plan to replace the NHS Intermediate Care Bed service with one from a private provider. We believe it is nonsense to suggest patients' treatment will be identical; the private provider simply does not possess the clinical expertise and experience of the NHS. We are told that The Orders of St John employ over 1000 staff in Oxfordshire however less than 5 in every hundred are registered general nurses. They simply cannot operate in the same way as the NHS. OCC seem to be chopping and changing and just giving contracts to today's lowest bidder. If everyone followed the OCC model the NHS would very soon cease to exist. This is why NHS spending is supposed to be ringfenced; so why is OCC cutting Chipping Norton's NHS budget when it is supposed to be protected? We will be fighting this and need the support of people in the community. This is a fight for the very existence of the NHS in Chipping Norton. We are launching a postcard petition and hope as many people as possible will sign and post a card to show OCC how much we object to the threat of losing our NHS beds and nurses.

What future for Beales?

A sign in Beales department store in Chipping Norton says 'under new ownership' and '70% off'. Behind this is property businessman and 30% shareholder Andrew Perloff, former owner of 11 of the freeholds of Beales' 29 stores. He has now bought out all the shares of the struggling company for £1.2m – apparently partially because his representative was ejected from the Board. Mr Perloff, recently described by the CEO as 'an eccentric guy', has also put a £2m deposit in Beales' bank to help them with financial issues, some caused by debt 'overstretch' after taking over the 19 Anglia Co-op stores (including the one in Chipping Norton). Mr Perloff has said he did not foresee widespread store closures but, according to local press, 'has not ruled out the possibility of a small number of branches closing'.

saw many celebrations around the UK marking 800 years since the Magna Carta was sealed. In Chipping Norton, St Mary's Primary School hosted celebration event grand with medieval fayre to governors which and Town Councillors were invited. **Emily** Weaver, History Co-ordinator at the

School, told the News 'All the children and staff came dressed up and organised their own medieval games and decorations. Mayor Cllr Mike Tysoe was invited to crown our own 'King John & Isabella' which was followed by the signing of their own class Magna Carta and celebratory dancing. All children were then treated to a pig roast, funded by the Town Council, for which we would like to thank them.'

Meanwhile in Stow on the Wold former TV News correspondent, local writer and historian, Derek Taylor launched his new book *Magna Carta in 20 Places*. This tells the story of Magna Carta through places associated with its birth and later history. It tells us that the popular notion that King John was a tyrant, the barons were champions of civil liberties and Magna Carta was the foundation of democracy, is a myth. Mr Taylor looks at the reasons why today it is more revered in America than in the land of its origin and how it has inspired those who have struggled over centuries to win democracy in their own countries. The book is £18.99 from History Press.

Problems at Churchill House

Building work on the affordable homes development at Churchill House (at the bottom of Hailey Road) have hit some major snags, bringing the work to a stop. Apparently, according to one officer in West Oxfordshire District Council, the developers 'unbelievably' had been building from the plans that had been refused permission rather than those later given approval. WODC officers are meeting the developers to see what needs to be done to get them back

on track. This may need a new planning application and in the meantime building has stopped. The issues appear to relate to the design and appearance of the new housing.

Future of Chippy Jazz

The Rotary Club of Chipping Norton has announced they are stepping down from running the Chippy Jazz and Music September event – which was started by the late Mike Howes 17 years ago. Rotary President Simon Hamilton said that with reducing membership, the Club have found organising both the Town Festival and the Jazz Day too much to ask of its members. However, the venues who have been hosting the musicians over the years have



expressed an interest in keeping their part of the Jazz Day going, and the Rotary Club wishes them the very best in continuing to provide a jazz presence in the Town.

Big issues with Premier Inn

Premier Inn's plan for a 70+ bed hotel along Chipping Norton's Spring Street is hitting significant objections mostly about the design and scale of such a place in a traditional Cotswold town. At a special planning discussion in May Chipping Norton Town Council 'agreed in principle' to the idea of bringing new hotel space for visitors and some more jobs to the Town, but they have written to West Oxfordshire saying they 'strongly disagreed' with details of the proposal and have asked WODC Planning Officers to suggest a resubmission with several changes. The Town Council said the design is unsympathetic to the area which adjoins a conservation area and Spring Street which has considerable historical significance being the original 800-year-old main street of Chipping Norton. They also said the scale and height should be reduced to improve the visual impact from the west and south and the number of proposed rooms reduced accordingly to lessen the traffic demands on Spring Street and residents. The Town Council want to see a resubmission with proper traffic analysis and proposals for signage. The plan for a

Stained glass window unveiled

Some 60 people from the British Legion, Chipping Norton School and the local community gathered at Chipping Norton School on 5 June to see the unveiling of the stained glass window commemorate the 100th anniversary of the First World War. After tasty cream Simon Headteacher Duffy welcomed everyone and spoke of the truly collaborative nature of

the project, with input from School, British Legion and Town Council. Mayor Mike Tysoe further outlined the journey of the project from the initial idea, the competition the School, the expansion of the





three windows and finally the commissioning of stained glass expert Graham Brant. Cllr Tysoe said it was 'a fitting but less traditional memorial with input from the younger generation, a modern tribute by this generation'. The unveiling was by Steve Kingsford, Chairman of Chipping Norton Royal British Legion, together with the three students whose designs had been built into the final windows, Beth Coombes, Zoe Foster and Georgia Juckes. Zoe told the News, 'It's a complete honour to have been chosen. A lot of thought went into my design (the evocative central 'bleeding' poppy) though it was quick to draw'. Not surprisingly, seeing the standard of her work, Zoe is hoping

to continue her art studies at Oxford Brookes

As the curtain drew back to reveal the three glass panels there was an immediate, palpable silence for a few seconds, followed by gasps and warm applause. Neville Edwards, President of CNRBL, spoke for many there saying 'It warms my heart that there are students so talented and caring, so wonderful, to design such a thing'. It was a very

poignant moment when he recited 'The Ode', 'They shall not grow old . . . we will remember Following them'. presentation to the three students and a prayer and blessing by the Reverend James Kennedy, Vicar of St Church, Mary's Headteacher Simon Duffy made a short closing address.

Graham Brant told the News about the design and execution of the windows: There is nothing here to glorify war. Many of the images are representational, for example the stark trees, the going down of the sun (with the soldiers walking down), the dawn (with the soldiers walking up), the threatening clouds, the drips of blood on the poppy stem. There are the three services represented and the role of women is acknowledged'. He seemed delighted with the finished work in situ, as well he might be. Readers are welcome to visit the School and ask at reception for a convenient moment to look at the windows. Donations to the project are still welcome and can be made at the School reception.

Spring Street community car park with 13 public spaces was welcomed but the Town Council would like to take over ownership and responsibility for its governance, given that OCC and WODC have declined to do so. In June the Mayor said that Premier Inn representatives had been a little disappointed by Town Council comments. English Heritage, amongst others, has also registered strong objections, but WODC planning officers are recommending approval. It all goes to the Uplands Committee on 6 July.

Mayormaking ceremony

Councillors Mike Tysoe and Richard Benfield were formally elected and sworn in as Mayor and Deputy Mayor respectively of Chipping Norton at the Mayormaking ceremony in the Town Hall on 18 May. Arrayed



in full mayoral robes Cllr Tysoe gave a resumé of the year's events, following which formal nominations and elections took place. The Mayor moved a vote of thanks to the Mayoress, Mrs Monica Tysoe, who continues in office. A reception was held in the Lower Town Hall after a brief Town Council meeting, the first for the four newly elected councillors, Richard Averill, Stephen Jordan, James Kitcher and Andrew Villars. Four outgoing councillors were thanked for their contribution to the Town: Sue Bartholomew, Mike Dixon, Charles Watson and Sarah Wilkes. Prizes for the Mayor's raffle (originally intended for the cancelled Ball) were drawn at the Mayormaking and a total of £225 was raised for the skate park fund. Thanks were given to the many organisations and people who had donated all the prizes.

Civic Sunday Service

Chipping Norton's annual Civic Service will be held at St Mary's Church on Sunday 12 July. Those attending should be seated by 10.35am. The Mayor and Councillors are invited to join other members of the community to acknowledge all civic and community service provided to the Town.

Bus cuts on the way?

With Oxfordshire County Council likely to face another £60m of savings - over and above those already announced attention, particularly in rural areas, is focusing on what will be next to go. OCC's Cabinet Member for Finance, Lawrie Stratford, gave a stark warning that 'everything is at risk'. First of all, the County's Cabinet has voted to 'consult' on a review of every bus subsidy on all routes across the County looking for £2.3m savings. 105 bus routes have subsidies as they are not fully 'commercially viable'. Chipping Norton's S3, X8, 488 and others will be looked at. A 12-week consultation is underway; see www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/stconsultation. Secondly, the County may need to make another £6m in cuts in Children's Centres. Similar cuts planned in 2013 caused a public outcry - including in Chipping Norton. More will be known after the Chancellor's July 'emergency budget' when the next finance settlement for Local Authorities will become clearer.

'Troubles' at Penhurst site

The major development – new houses and a new care home - at the old Penhurst School site on New Street is well under way. Commenting on the rise and fall of buildings and huge piles of earth and crushed concrete, one Penhurst neighbour recently remarked that the skyline from Diston's Lane had been 'heaving up and down like the bedding of a deeply troubled sleeper' for eight months. Nearby residents, including many from Diston's Lane, formed the Penhurst Liaison Group (PLG) to monitor the works. A PLG representative wrote to the News with continuing concerns: 'The "troubles" began with the demolition of the school buildings in November 2014, with much noise, dust and smoke. Concrete breaking and crushing continued till early February, soon succeeded by a tall hole-boring machine notable for its painful high-pitched screech on striking rock. In early March, excavations finally began for the Care Home on the Lane side of the site. Foundations for the sheltered housing had already begun creeping along the playing field boundary, with the first units rising above ground level at about this time. The staggered start of the two developments - Porthaven for the Care Home, Beechcroft for the houses means the period of disruption will be longer than expected.



Both stalled at times, hampered by piles of waste retained on site. Though progress has speeded up recently, it is hard to imagine the shell of the Care Home will be complete by Christmas or marketing commence in March 2016. Clarification is still being sought on the final project completion date, with the end of July 2016 being the most recent estimate obtained. Actual occupation of the care home will then be subject to CQC certification'.

Residents formed the PLG when the site was first sold and have pressed developers for information, and voiced concerns where appropriate. Their concerns have included protection of tree roots, clouds of wind-borne dust, excessive machinery noise, danger from large numbers of contractors' vehicles parked on New Street, and occasional extensions of working hours. A recent proposal to use a tower crane with a 40m swing, extending deeply over several residential properties, is believed to have been withdrawn. The PLG said 'With all these issues, together with a general lack of initiative in keeping neighbours informed, the claim of being 'Considerate Developers' seems hard to justify. Sadly, the Church will eventually no longer be visible from the playing fields nor parts of the Worcester Road and Diston's Lane. So much for protection of important views of listed buildings in Conservation Areas! Sad, too, that the new skyline will bring sunset an hour earlier for nearby residents!'

Music therapy benefits

Katharine House Hospice has secured funding to provide music therapy to patients three days a week for 12 months. Families with relatives or friends at the Hospice will see that music therapy can act as a welcome and soothing distraction from pain, agitation and anxiety. It can also provide a conduit between patients and their families, enabling shared memory and emotion, says the Hospice. In 2013 The Theatre Chipping Norton co-ordinated a programme of music therapy in three care homes in Chipping Norton. At Southerndown Care Home, activities co-ordinator Stacey Davies told the News that, since then, they have continued with weekly choir practice, which residents absolutely adore. We have quite a big repertoire,' says Stacey 'including songs from musicals, hymns, war-time songs and sea shanties. Many residents know the words without needing song sheets. We are hoping to work with St Mary's School choir on a joint concert.' Music therapy has benefits that go beyond the feel-good factor associated with singing, particularly for those living with dementia. 'The power of music, especially singing, to unlock memories and kickstart the grey matter is an increasingly key feature of dementia care. It seems to reach parts of the damaged brain in ways other forms of communication cannot' say Age UK.

One of the riders is Shane Carter of Worcester Road, whose father-in-law, also of Chippy, is receiving treatment at this Centre. It takes a long time to recover from treatment for oesophageal and stomach cancers, and OOSO plays a vital role in this. It provides support to patients (and their relatives) undergoing treatment – an integral part of the care patients receive. There have been huge improvements in the treatment of oesophageal cancer in the last decade, but the survival rate is still worse than from many other cancers. At present, together with stomach cancer, it kills more than 10,000 people each year in England

While Mike has stood down from official council duties, the Council have asked him (with his years of experience driving local bus routes) to stay on as the Town's representative on local bus service consultations — which will be critical next month as the County is reviewing all the bus subsidies and possible cuts.

Chippy Tweeters hit Guardian

Many Chipping Norton residents may be completely unaware that a 'Twitterstorm' broke over the Town recently. *Guardian* journalist Sam Wollaston wrote what he now admits was a 'throwaway headline' in a TV review: 'Benefits Street: just look at the community spirit – you don't get that in Chipping flipping Norton' on 12 May. The main problem, as I told Mr Wollaston when he accepted the challenge to visit and find out for himself, is that, particularly in the election run-up, the

media uses 'Chipping Norton' as shorthand for some sort of upper middle class elite, without knowing anything about the Town. What brought Mr Wollaston to the Town was a backlash on social media. Those who knew the Town weighed in, accusing him of lazy journalism and rudeness. Rupert Parsons, who runs award-winning Womersley Foods, tweeted: 'You are hereby cordially invited to visit our community of Chipping Norton' and Mr Wollaston, to be fair, accepted.

Rupert is also on the steering committee of Experience Chipping Norton (ECN) with more than a passing interest in protecting the Town's public image. He spent the best part of the day taking his visitor around the Town, stopping at the new hospital, the Lido and The Theatre, going around the town centre and ending at ECN's public meeting at the Red Lion. In his follow-up article (pictured above — Google 'wollaston chipping norton'), he accepts he used the Town's name in vain and that the community spirit is alive and well here. It probably won't stop others using 'Chipping Norton' in an ill-informed and lazy way, but at least it's one small victory.



Objections to Foxfield plan

A plan to build three new detached houses above the back of Foxfield Court cul-de-sac in Chipping Norton



has hit strong objections from local residents and the Town Council. The application proposes three houses in what Councillors call a 'tree belt buffer zone' of trees and natural habitat - which would screen current residents from any future 600-house development on the Tank Farm site. Issues of height, privacy, flooding, loss of woodland and open space have all been cited in objections. Councillors were also angry that the prospective developer has already cut down many trees. Last November a specific permanent Tree Protection Order (TPO) was agreed by WODC for a number of the trees, citing 'protecting the trees in the event that an application for development was received for the site and would prevent their removal'. Town Councillors now await the official application verdict from the next Uplands Committee meeting and will want to know what legal sanctions WODC might take if TPOs are ignored.

New houses on vets' site

A new planning application has been submitted for five dwellings in Albion Street on the site of the old vacated Vets' surgery. At their May meeting Chipping Norton Town Council agreed in principle to the application but there was concern over car parking and traffic from five properties. The Town Council recommended three instead of five dwellings on this site. The application now goes to West Oxfordshire Uplands Committee.

Walking tour App for Chippy

You can soon download a new phone app with a walking tour of the Town — sponsored by local businesses. Local group Experience Chipping Norton have organised this to help visitors with a free informative tour of the Town's high spots. Local traders who sign up, for an annual fee, to the Handheld Tour venture will get their profile onto the digital map which will feature a range of clearly signed interesting pubs, cafes, restaurants and shops. Rubbish action - but still no tip

Chipping Norton was hit with more flytipping last month – including a wonderful selection of fridges and other electrical gear and bed pieces in New Street car park again (see picture). West



Oxfordshire District Council officers were out at some of the 20 bank sites in a bid to tackle their continual misuse. They plan closer monitoring at the main troublespots and clearer signage explaining the rules. Anyone caught dumping – including in black bags – faces prosecution. Earlier this year a Chadlington resident was prosecuted for dumping commercial waste at a Chipping Norton site. Fly-tipping can be reported at www.westoxon.gov.uk/report or by calling 01993 861060.

Meanwhile there are still no plans for replacing Dean Pit which Oxfordshire County Council closed after local neighbours objected to its continuing. County Councillors who voted for closure had been assured about a replacement, but since then, in spite of 'ongoing review', the County Council (and indeed District) have failed to do anything. The nearest rubbish tip is a 40-mile round trip. Now District Councillor Geoff Saul has told the Town Council that some local parish councils (including Charlbury and Chadlington) want to meet to discuss clubbing together for some sort of new tip and hoping OCC and WODC will support it. Chipping Norton Town Council will be invited to join any discussion. But any parish funding could see a big rise in town council tax precept – instead of the County or District doing this out of tax we already pay! Disgruntled Town Councillors, including Cllr Eve Coles, are planning a petition. Keep sending those rubbish pictures!

In addition to raising funds for the Trust, an annual 10% donation from our award fund goes to Asthma UK, the charity dedicated to improving the health and well-being of the 5.2 million people in the UK affected by asthma.

July sees the full reopening of the expanded 15,300 sq ft Midcounties Coop store and Chippy News team member Roger Sinclair was given an exclusive tour in June by Deputy CEO Andy Cresswell and his senior management. The team's enthusiasm was palpable as Andy waxed lyrical about finishing the project on time, the much improved parking (up from 50 to 120 spaces), an additional 2,700 products on sale and the fresh food that should hit

your senses as you enter. They say they have listened to their 6,000 Chippy Co-op members and customers and say us locals should be justifiably pleased with the results.

After a successful 21month building programme

on Tuesday 14 July, and by the entrance will be a new 'discovery zone' with community and Co-op information and local produce. The relocated Post Office will be on the far side of the bank of 14 shiny new checkouts. For the first time, there will be a fresh bakery, deli and meat counter taking centre stage towards the middle of the store, while all traditional groceries will occupy the entire space taken by the old store, with well lit chilled cabinets. Store manager Adam Quinton introduced us to Fran who has worked at the Co-op for over 19 years and is in charge of Dairy. She and her colleague reported good customer feedback already and

were delighted with how the new cabinets showed produce at its best. In total, 32 additional local people will be employed to help run the store which is good news for the local economy. In June the Co-op held a recruiting day at The Theatre - a location used extensively recently for staff training and induction.

We asked Andy how he viewed the new Aldi coming to Chippy. He felt that the two stores would complement each other well but he added 'we will have

> local produce, more choice and more fresh food than Aldi with over 8,000 lines compared to Aldi's 1,800'. He clearly sees the town centre location as a major benefit too and wants people to use the car park when they are popping

doing some convenience shopping at the Co-op too! Asked about the growth of online food shopping he said 'only 5% of shopping is done online and while this is growing massively, there is also a significant growth in the convenience food market (such as Co-op type stores) where there are an average 4.2 visits per week to this type of store'. Co-op Travel and Co-op Pharmacy on Topside are also being refurbished and relaunched on 14 July and readers may already have noticed the fresh lick of white paint on the outside walls. This looks like a big 'reborn' asset to the Town and yes Andy, we love the parking too!

Good progress at Phone Coop

The Phone Co-op held its half year meeting, designed to involve more members, in Chipping Norton Town Hall on 4 July - and announced an 11.5% year-on-year sales increase despite falling industry prices. Chief Executive Vivian Woodell said key to this growth were the new partnership with Fairphone, a Dutch ethical Smartphone maker, the acquisition of Worcester-based broadband business Namesco, and the deal with the wider co-operative retail movement to supply Pay As You Go SIM cards. Customer satisfaction was also up at 93%, a level almost unheard of among telecoms service providers. The co-operative is also running a competition to promote the benefits of recycling old mobile phones, and held a collection at the meeting. Anyone can recycle their phone via The Phone Co-op's website with proceeds going to the International Co-operative Alliance's appeal to help the reconstruction of co-operatives affected by the Nepal earthquake. They also stand a chance of winning a Fairphone.



Duke of Edinburgh Award Diary

CNS Year 11 student Connor Vellinga concludes his six-month series about what it takes to achieve the Duke of Edinburgh Award

We have discovered and explored the new skills that all of the students have learned during their Award from the early

stages of the activity sections including the skills, physical and volunteering sections all the way to the expeditions. Last month we focused on the Silver three day trek expedition



and this time we will be looking at the Bronze training expedition which took place on 16 May. It was the very first expedition for all of the students who took part in the Bronze DofE Award. After having completed their three month and six month activity sections and their training day in April, a staggering number of 63 students headed to their starting point and campsite at Hill End just to the west of Oxford. All students had to walk for six hours on their two day and one night expedition.

When the teams arrived at Hill End with backpacks weighing about 14 kilograms (one third of their body weight) everyone went through a series of exercises to find out their group's paces. Everyone also had to record their route on a map: a circular route which passed the River Thames and the Farmoor Reservoir which was about 16 km long. Once

teams were ready they left Hill End accompanied by a teacher who would help if the group got lost or did not know where to go. After facing the various challenges of steep hills, melted chocolate bars, being chased by cows and attacked by nettles, and with blisters aplenty, the groups finally arrived back at camp. Here they all started to assemble their tents and prepare their food for the evening which ranged from pasta with sauce to hotdogs. The following morning the students took a route they had



planned themselves.

Most went through

Wytham Woods,
which is owned by

Oxford University, for
which they had been
given special
permission. Most
routes were around

16km to 18km long and this time they were unaccompanied. Several groups got lost but most made it back quickly to campsite. In June both the Bronze and Silver students will be completing their real expedition in the Cotswolds and the Gower.

Good luck to everyone taking part in the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme and many thanks to the *Chippy* News for letting me be part of their team for six months!

Town Council presentation The area's top police officer

Super-intendent Kath Lowe (who replaced Colin Paine) attended the June Town Council meeting to meet and update councillors. Regular stats on crime, comparably low in this area, are now being presented – highlights show in the last 12 months in Chipping Norton (area) 512 crimes. The trend is down in criminal damage (80), low and steady in burglaries, slightly up in



violent crime (33) and a significant rise in sexual offences (23) probably with more victims coming forward. Police deal a lot with mental health issues, safeguarding, domestic abuse and drugs.

Shed and garage burglaries Allotment sheds are still being targeted with tools stolen. Between 3pm on 2 May and 2.30pm on 4 May some tools were stolen from a shed at the Burford Road allotments. Please can you check the security and deter anyone from trying to gain entry?

Motorbike theft A red/orange and white Honda CR80 scrambler motorbike was stolen from a shed near to Southcombe, Chipping Norton overnight on 4–5 May.

Rogue fish van There have been numerous calls from around Woodstock and Chipping Norton about a van turning up and people going door to door selling fish. The van isn't refrigerated but the fish is kept chilled. Members of the public have been calling with concerns that this vehicle is linked to the theft of dogs. Police say that in the last year there have been four reports of stolen dogs in West Oxfordshire but in fact three were simply missing and were recovered by neighbours. The fourth has a known suspect who is being investigated.

Veteran's trip to Buckingham Palace

This month the News salutes a special resident at Chipping Norton's Henry Cornish Care Centre.

Team member Roger Sinclair went to meet him after a very memorable trip out.

Henry Cornish Care Centre resident Bob Badger Smith had the privilege of meeting the Countess of Wessex and a thousand other exservicemen at a special Buckingham Palace garden party held on 4 June to commemorate the Centenary of Blind Veterans UK. This

organisation was initially set up to help soldiers blinded in the First World War, but has gone on to support more than 35,000 blind veterans and their families, from the Second World War through to recent conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan. It provides free training, rehabilitation, equipment and emotional support to blind and vision-impaired veterans no matter when they served or how they lost their sight.

Distinguished naval service

Bob, now aged 95, served in the Royal Navy during the Second World War as a communications officer, chiefly seconded onto Russian destroyers courageously helping to escort merchant shipping across the Atlantic. This was of course highly dangerous with Bob recalling the German U Boats sinking many ships with significant loss of Navy and civilian lives. However with Bob's communications expertise gathered before the outbreak of war and his grasp of Russian - 'I knew yes and no, so I had a head start' - he was soon making the most of the Russians' superior communications equipment and putting that and his skills to good use, helping to protect highly vulnerable shipping. He never went all the way to New York or other US ports, always meeting the American ships half way across the Atlantic and transferring loads before starting the dangerous return journey back to the UK, again within range of the dreaded U Boats. In the early stages of the war he also helped deliver food and other essential supplies to Russia to help their population survive the ravages of the War. He was recently awarded the special Ushakov medal with thanks from President Putin and the Russian people.

Bob's return to the Palace

Bob lost most of his sight fairly recently though he can still see shapes – 'old age' he said – and has also unfortunately lost his right leg. 'It's probably at sea where it belongs' he quipped, showing typical stoicism and humour. Following his return to civilian life in around 1950, Bob has fond memories of helping out at Buckingham Palace with the young Royals, teaching them, amongst other things no doubt, about the Royal Navy – he feels this was a reward for his service during the war and he really enjoyed his time there. Returning to the Palace on 4 June for the Centenary celebrations was a real honour; even the journey was memorable according to Bob, as with his eyes

lighting up he recalled the tremendous feeling of speeding down the M40 in the taxi together with Henry Cornish Activities Co-ordinator Sylvia Evans who was about to celebrate her last day at the Care Centre. Together with Sylvia he moved among the crowds meeting a few old friends as well as the Countess, and he said it was 'simply a fantastic day'. He was just as pleased for Sylvia as

it was her swan song at Henry Cornish and an incredible event to bow out on. Bob is one of those people who you could talk to for hours and for whom you have the ultimate respect, not just for his courage and commitment to helping people during the War but also now, with his humour and positive attitude in spite of the physical challenges he now has.

Bob is a shining example and role model for us all and Newsteam

correspondent Roger has promised to read this article to him when published so that he can enjoy hearing his own story and recollections. You never know, there may be more stories to come out of the woodwork yet!

Chipping Norton – Al Fresco

Newsteam member Sue Hadland gives the first of her features on eating, drinking and relaxing around Town

It's Summertime and what is better than lazing around on a sunny day with a drink and perhaps a meal? Yes it's time to go AL FRESCO. Chipping Norton does not lend itself easily to this type of pleasure. The Town is very compact and the ever present heavy lorries in the centre mean that 'pavement café' culture has nowhere to thrive. But despair not — there are places tucked away that are little gems.



The Crown & Cushion has the largest outdoor decked area (pictured above) with attractive flower beds and comfortable seating. The staff are always happy to serve you once they are aware that you are there which may involve you going to the bar to alert them. It is a very child friendly

environment away from traffic and noise and has the added advantage of a car park. It is also accessible for wheelchairs.

If you want to watch the world go by and see everyone vying for parking places in the Market Square then pay a visit to **Jaffé & Neale**, not only a wonderful bookshop but also a maker of excellent coffee and tea. The tables wobble a bit on



the uneven pavement and the seating is basic but 'hey there' this is Chippy's pavement café. The same view can be had from the balcony of **Bitter & Twisted** which is the best place to be when events are on in the Town, such as the Mop Fair or



the Town Festival (pictured), and you can look down on all that is going on while enjoying a drink or meal. Very civilised!

Just along from Bitter & Twisted, in Middle Row, is **Whistlers** a bistro come cocktail bar which has seating outside with the advantage of being away from the traffic. Here you can enjoy coffee or lunch in a pedestrianised area on a nice day but beware — the Chippy wind can whistle down the road, perhaps this is how it got its name! Dinner is also served but it is closed in the afternoon.

There's always a friendly welcome at **The Old Mill Café** in West Street which is open every day until 5.30 serving all types of food and excellent coffee and cakes. There is a pleasant quiet garden at the rear although it has to be accessed via a flight of stairs. **The Kings Arms Hotel** opposite The Mill has a courtyard garden at the rear where food and drinks are served and just round the corner up of the top of Cattle Market in Albion Street is **The Red Lion Pub** with a garden where you can play Aunt Sally and sample Hook Norton beers.

Five minutes from Chippy, in the village of Chadlington, is **The Tite Inn** which has a beautiful garden and serves good pub food. Try the fish pie, it's yummy. In the opposite direction in Enstone is the newly reopened **Harrow Inn** which has a large grassed area as well as a charming well sheltered courtyard. I haven't eaten there yet but the menu looks very appealing, just that little bit different.

So, off you go and enjoy the wide selection of cafes and hostelries in our town while the summer lasts. Happy eating and drinking!

For visitors and all regular readers, here's a guide to some summer fun. We feature some local nature reserves, a quizzical Town Trail and a round-up of local summer festivals.

OUT & ABOUT WITH NATURE

If you go down to the woods today, or up to the hills, or along the river bank you are sure of a great surprise. They say the best things in life are free and that is certainly true of the many nature reserves in our area. Pack up a picnic, take a ball or a fishing net and off you go. Here are just a selection of nature reserves in our area and what they have to offer. All on google.

FOXHOLES nature reserve situated down a track (bumpy but driveable), on the right hand side just through Bruern, is a magical wonderland. Although the amazing bluebells and foxgloves are now over, this woodland stretching down to the river Evenlode is full of exciting things to discover. Go in the evening and see the bats or badgers, go in the

day and follow the waymarked walks ranging from 1.75 miles to an energetic round trip of 11km. Car parking and plenty of space for a picnic.

HOOK NORTON CUTTING off the Swerford Road was originally a railway line

taking iron ore from Hook Norton to the blast furnaces of the Midlands and South Wales. It is now



two nature reserves either side of an inaccessible tunnel: one grassland with a galaxy of wild flowers and butterflies, the other woodland with woodpeckers, goldcrests, warblers and bees. What makes this reserve exciting though is the exposed cliffs of the original railway embankment which are Jurassic in origin and contain many fossils.

BROADWAY COUNTRY PARK at the top of Fish Hill off the A44. Take a kite! From here on

a clear day you have a 62 mile vista and can see 16 counties. There is a charge to go up the tower and also a café on site.

LECHLADE WATER PARK could be your choice for water and meadows with

acres of green fields to play in. Go over Ha'penny bridge over the Thames at Lechlade and just down the road is the car park.

GLYME VALLEY is much nearer home. Along the London Road take the track on the right opposite the layby or you can get there by following Glyme Lane track which goes past the Leisure Centre. If you wish you can make it a circular walk. Lovely area to spend an afternoon.

Visitor Information

The nearest 'official' Visitor information office is at Burford (01993 823558) but on weekdays the WODC One Stop Shop at the Guildhall has leaflets and advice (tel 643384, open Mon-Thurs 8.45-4.30, 4pm on Fri, closed 1-2). On Saturday mornings the Town Council runs a very helpful visitor information desk (10-1) at the Town Hall.





As we start to think about beach reads and airport novels, the Chippy News Arts Team recommends some quality reading for your down time this summer, all by local or locally-based authors.


The Last Blue Mountain





Amnesty update on Rwanda

Amnesty International member Sam Dastor works in Chippy's Oxfam Bookshop and had the opportunity to go to Rwanda recently to see 10 projects helped by Oxfam. At our June meeting he gave us a talk, accompanied by photos, about his time there.

Oxfam give support to create co-operatives providing work for local Rwandans. The support includes training and providing links to markets and supplies in and outside their country. He visited various co-operatives; pineapple farms, mango juice bottling plants and plantations of cassava, Rwandans' favourite root-vegetable, all of which are grown to be sold in local and national markets within Africa.

Sam was very impressed and delighted to see how Rwandans have become reconciled since the horrific genocide in 1994. The Hutu and Tutsi work together and now call themselves Rwandans. 52% of the population are women and Oxfam insist that 75% of workers they help are women who now outnumber men because of the genocide.

It was such an interesting talk and we learnt so much; a really uplifting evening.
