A 20mph Town?

Town Councillors march forward on traffic safety

20 mph – your views should matter!

Chipping Norton's Town Council want to join the County Council's 20mph Scheme for Towns, improving safety by reducing from 30 to 20 the speed limits in many more or all of Chippy's residential streets.

Meeting Chippy's new Mayor and Deputy

Chipping Norton's 16 volunteer Town Councillors help champion our Town. As a parish council, they have few powers compared with County and District. But new Mayor Sandra Coleman and her Deputy Rachel Foakes volunteered as Councillors to try and 'make a difference', helping make Chippy a wonderful place to visit, live and work. The News Team joined them for coffee at the Old Mill.

Sandra – a passion for people and the planet!

Raised in High Wycombe - Sandra 'migrated' to Chippy 20 years ago, joking that she followed Parker Knoll here. In fact, she practised as an Optometrist after Cardiff University until 'family life got in the way', She, husband Geoff (who now runs a medical care charity here and in Africa), and five children moved to Witney but then sought out Chipping Norton, preferring a smaller town with one good comprehensive school available to all. She got involved as a scout leader, helps at Christians Against Poverty, was Governor at two Chippy schools – then was persuaded to stand as Independent Town Councillor in 2019. Issues

such as the environment and housing for young people are top of her list.

Rachel – advocate and good neighbour

With early life near Watford, Rachel studied modern history in Oxford. Her working career (now from home) is editing and writing educational books. She and husband Andrew (now teaching at Sibford School) lived in Hong Kong, Oxford and a village near Cropredy, before arriving five years ago in Chippy with three children. She loves it here, but did notice that good value family houses are scarce! With one child with a serious medical condition and learning difficulties, she learned to fight for the best support and be an advocate. With Lockdown in the Leys, she helped lead a valuable 'help your neighbour' shopping scheme, then in 2021, a neighbour (and a *Chippy News* article!) got her, to her surprise, to stand for Town Council

Learning and leading the Council

With many experienced Councillors and Guildhall staff retiring or resigning, and Covid hitting, these two new councillors had to learn fast. As Sandra told us, what seemed beforehand like dry, even boring roles like 'Cemetery or Town Hall Committee' became interesting, important, fun and gave her a 'great sense of place'. She dived into the detail of managing town assets – from toppling gravestones to Town Hall repairs, nagging WODC about our waste bins, smartening up the town centre, and planning Pool Meadow improvements. She led on climate crisis policies, grappled with the Council's sometimes unfathomable finances, and now leads on trying to influence the big East Chippy housing development. Becoming Mayor is a helpful platform.

Supporting a positive ethos for the Town

Both Sandra and Rachel want the Council to build on Chippy's heritage, with an ethos that represents all different interests, as Rachel said, 'to help make our Town an inclusive, supportive, safe, and friendly place for everyone'. On specifics, this includes long term HGV and traffic issues, more town safety and 20mph improvements, encouraging walking and cycling, and better recreation facilities. She is keen to involve people on projects to protect our environment – starting with the Council (and hopefully others) being 'Pesticide Free'.

Involving the community

With these ambitions, our volunteer councillors want much more

engagement with all different parts of community. Lockdown and Covid didn't help, but Sandra points now to a thriving 'Build Chippy Better' working group with excellent community expertise, enthusiasts joining enjoyable Cemetery Clear ups,, residents wanting involvement in road safety and 20mph, and more Chippy Christmas events. More community use of the Town Hall is a priority, plus grants to Chippy community projects – such as The Theatre's recent free lunches for families in need.

Newsletters and 'drop in' surgeries

Rachel is leading on making our Town Council much more accessible. The new website and social media are very useful. You are encouraged to attend or speak at Council meetings. There's now a monthly newsletter (sign up on line via the website), and informal Councillors' Surgeries in the Lower Town Hall, 10am–12noon on the last Saturday each month. The next is 24 September – drop in and say hello, get to know your councillors and share any concerns or suggestions. There is also coffee and cake! A new 'Facilities and Events officer' is also being recruited to add to the enthusiastic Guildhall team now back to full capacity (see advert page 7).

Why become a Councillor?

Next May, all 16 Town Council seats are up for election again. Sandra and Rachel hope to stand again – but why not think about standing yourself? Rachel said they'd love more people from across Chippy's wider community to volunteer and join a dynamic Town Council. She said, 'it's surprising what you can get done, you can help influence the Town's future, it's a fantastic way to meet people and gain new confidence and new skills'. Sainsbury's site for sale

The major property site in Chipping Norton Town Centre, at 12-14 Market Place, which houses Sainsbury's supermarket, is up for sale at £5,350,000. Agents Colliers call it a 'prime investment opportunity with development potential in



affluent Cotswold town.....to extend the supermarket and provide residential on the two upper floors'. They say the upper floor development already has a 'positive pre-app' from the local 'Council'. There are 32 parking places existing at the rear. The site owner is Somerfield Stores Limited (a legacy from the previous supermarket business there) not Sainsbury's, but the owner leases it 'on assignment' to Sainsbury's on a 20-year lease that has five years left until January 2028, when it could be renewed. The sales brochure publicises the 'attractive covenant' of having Sainsbury's in situ as an ongoing lessee. For any buyer – and for intrigued shoppers in Chippy – the question will be whether Sainsbury's will continue, perhaps in an 'expanded' store, or leave a new owner to find another supermarket operator as partner, or have another use for the site after 2028.

Moving on from West St News

The end of July saw Mike Dixon and daughter (pictured) Rachael announce the closure of Chipping Norton's West Street Newsagents, much to the sadness of all the regular customers. The shop is one of the Town's very old trading premises. Back in the 18th century it belonged to Samuel West, baker. with his а bakehouse behind the



premises. Later in the 19th century it was Packers Stores (see picture below of a Victorian Jubilee) and more recently was run as West Street Newsagents by John Podbury – with



Chippy's Mike Dixon and his family taking it over in 2014. Mike had been used to getting up early, after around 50 years working 'on the buses', and this was another 'postretirement' hard-working adventure. More recently in 2021, his daughter Rachael took over the lead in the shop giving Mike a rest, with husband Stuart, the family, and colleague Barbara to help out.

But now they've had to take the difficult decision of closing in spite of wanting to carry on, with family commitments, health issues and rising costs all combining to make life difficult. The shop could now be re-let or the whole building put up for sale by the existing owner – perhaps with more residential accommodation in mind. Rachael and Mike hope the business might continue in some form and said 'we've had a wonderful time at the Newsagents. We've met lovely people and made good friends. We want to thank everyone for their support and kindness'.

Apply for Council Grants

Could your local organisation use some funds from Chipping Town Norton Council? They have a £26,000 budget this year (2022/23) to give grants to 'Voluntary Bodies' (local charities community and organisations). Last year £31,000 was



awarded to 17 local organisations. The Council's Community Committee has responsibility for allocating the money fairly. Applications, including reasons for funding and latest accounts, are requested by 25 September. The uses should be for local projects and activities that benefit the parish of Chipping Norton or some of its local residents.

20mph scheme for Chipping Norton?

Chipping Norton Town Council has applied to be considered in Oxfordshire County Council's 20mph Scheme for Towns.

The Town Council wants to know your views – asking anyone who lives in, or travels to, Chipping Norton to complete an online survey. It can be found on their website or you can complete a form available at the Guildhall (see note below). Deadline is 14 September. The consultation, which the Town Council has to do as part of the OCC application, asks whether you support the 20mph scheme for Towns and whether your think all current 30mph areas here should become 20mph.

Cllr Mark Walker, Chair of the Town Council's Strategic Planning Committee and Traffic Advisory Sub-Committee, said 'The Town Council signalled its intent to improve our streets by implementing a 20mph

zone through the middle of town in 2019 – we are now delighted that we have an opportunity to extend this to a much

wider area of town with the aim of making our streets feel safer and welcoming more places for pedestrians and cyclists. We know from other areas around the country, and internationally that there is a wide acceptance of the benefits of 20mph in terms of reducing pollution, reducing harm caused by collisions with cars and making streets feel more pleasant. We welcome the consultation and would encourage all residents to take part'. Mayor Cllr Sandra Coleman said she was particularly keen 'to extend the current 20mph zone to cover our local schools, areas with many pedestrians, including parents with younger children, and young people making their first independent journeys'.

Making 20 the new 30

National momentum Many more 20mph schemes are now being rolled out in residential towns and villages. Wales

hit the headlines in July voting to make 20mph the default speed limit across the country in residential areas to create safer, healthier, and quieter streets. In Oxfordshire, before the 2021 local election, the '20 is Plenty' campaign was building, but most funding for implementation had to come from town and parish councils. Hence ChippyTown Council's earlier limited scheme in 2019, just on town centre main roads. But now the new Lib Dem/Labour/Green OCC alliance is supporting a county-wide rollout, with funding.

Lowering speeds does divide people Some people love the idea, promising less noise, lower

pollution and safer and more pleasant towns. The National Institute for Health and Care Excellence strongly supports it, citing better air quality, fewer casualties, reduced acceleration, and encouraging a shift from cars to nonpolluting active choices such as walking and cycling. Others say it will cause traffic snarl-ups and drive custom away from our town centres and even increase air pollution, although Imperial College's research suggests such speed limits do not worsen exhaust emissions.

Witney takes the lead A week after the Welsh 'everybody 20mph' decision, Oxfordshire's Leader Cllr Liz Leffman announced that Witney would become the first town here to embrace 20mph in most current 30mph residential areas, a direct result of Oxfordshire County Council's 20mph recent policy change and associated programme, costing, they say, £8m over the next three years. West Oxfordshire District (now also under Lib Dem, Labour and Green control) and Witney Town Council are both backing the

scheme, with Witney Mayor Liz Duncan saying it would bring

improved road safety, reduce risks of death and injury, improve air quality and increase physical activity.

Enforcement problem Supporters say townwide 20mph schemes can encourage a change in driver and pedestrian mindsets as a habit, but, as evidenced by Chippy's early 20mph pilots, enforcement and compliance are major issues. Police say they have no resources to help enforcement with speed checks. OCC say local measures such as traffic calming or flashing speed indicator devices (SIDs) have to be funded by parish councils and run by Speedwatch volunteers which will need organising – and will Police provide any help? The residents down Chippy's New Street will

attest to countless 20mph speeding infringements having gone unrecorded and unpunished.

Political football! Such changes become political. OCC conducted an online-only public consultation in Witney (population 30,000) which had less than 300 responses, with only 33% in favour of 20mph while over half were against. OCC and local councillors pressed on, saying 'benefits outweighed concerns'. Conservative MP Robert Courts posted on Facebook 'Yet again the Liberal-Labour-Green coalition running County Hall are dismissing local opinion to plough ahead with their ideologically-driven agenda'. He continued 'Instead of wasting taxpayer money on pointless political gestures that do more harm than good, I am urging County Hall to start listening to local people and focus on West Oxfordshire's real priorities'. Perhaps all our local politicians could turn down the rhetoric and work better together?

HGV and road safety issues



Back in March and May two full Town Hall meetings heard County and District Cabinet Member Duncan Enright acknowledge Chipping Norton's long-held concerns about both HGVs through town and pedestrian safety on our town centre main roads, and that action should be priority. Chippy Councillors are still

keeping up the pressure -

Improved signage & safety items should make pedestrians safer

should make pedestrians safer including through an HGV working group, and our Traffic Advisory Committee. So where are we, five months later?

Firstly, on HGVs, the Town Council is right now erecting signage that hopefully will discourage HGVs from using the London Road past Holy Trinity School, instead getting them to use the Banbury Road via the Shell garage roundabout. For the longer term substantive HGV solution, Chippy County Councillor Geoff Saul says that the now-amended versions of Oxfordshire's Local Transport and Freight Strategies are aiming for an 'A44 Corridor Strategy'. This idea, proposed but dropped by OCC years back, will in effect downgrade or change the status of the A44 main road so that the only HGV use will be for access to local towns. This will require other stakeholders, including neighbouring towns and counties, to agree. Cllr Saul cannot give any timetable – and our Town Councillors admit 'expectations will have to be managed'.

Secondly, on town safety 'hotspots', after the Town Hall meetings, OCC officers and our councillors are looking at pedestrian danger spots such as the crossings at New Street (August saw a further accident, following the tragic fatality last March – see Letters p34), West Street and Albion Street – and pavements at Horsefair. Another survey this September (mainly for West and New Streets) is imminent. But at July's Traffic Advisory Committee the OCC officer attending promised no specific 'timelines' for changes - and did say resources need to be found. Finally, Town Councillor Steve Akers has made progress working with OCC to improve signage for speed limits, safety items such as bollards and islands, and cutting back trees obscuring signs and view. And, of course, more 20mph limits in Chippy could be coming (see separate article). Steve said Councillors will look at the best way to extend the Speedwatch scheme. Town Councillors are also working with OCC on another project for cycling and walking routes (see letters page).

Work starting at The Branch

The project team at The Branch community hub (the old NatWest Bank building in Market Place) are looking forward to building works starting. Rising costs and supply chain challenges meant some re-thinking of the plans. However, good progress has been made and the team are aiming for a start date in the second half of September so that it will not interfere with the Chippy Mop Fair. You'll know the work is starting when you see the hoardings go up at the front of the building. 'Infographic' panels will explain the purpose and plans for The Branch and keep everyone informed of progress. The team is liaising with local businesses, homeowners and market traders to minimise disruption. If you have any questions or concerns please email build@thebranchtrust.org.

Next to visit Chippy, and happily pose for selfies, was Simon Cowell, seen smiling Middle away in Row's Tickittyshake and High Street's Mr Simms Olde Sweet Shoppe, where our music mogul spent time browsing sweet treats with son Eric and fiancée Lauren Silverman. Seems like he's given Chippy the Golden Buzzer for customer service! The couple's upcoming wedding autumn could, according to some, be in their Cotswold home nearby. was Boris and Carrie Johnson's wedding party, hastily relocated from Chequers to the Daylesford Estate hosted by Tory donor and JCB owner Lord Bamford. Helicopters buzzed around the Town's airspace as guests gathered for the party with a heart-shaped motif spotted in a field near a giant marquee. There were no pictures of the house or celebrations, as the Bamfords protect their Daylesford privacy and security carefully.

Will our birth unit ever reopen?

Chipping Norton's Cotswold Birth Centre – run by midwives from Oxford University Hospital NHS Trust – has been closed to births for 12 months with no timetable for reopening. Ante- and postnatal clinics are still available. The unit, along with Wantage's small Maternity Unit, closed largely because of staffing and safety issues across the whole OUH maternity service – notably at the JR Hospital. Over 12 months, various statements have suggested reopening 'soon' or 'in a few weeks' but all 'subject to safe staffing'. The OUH maternity service was given 'a requires improvement' rating by the Care Quality Commission last year, and is still working an remedial action plan set out last September. There have been issues related to Covid (including staff absences), but many issues are wider – similar to the rest of the UK – including problems recruiting both clinical and non-clinical staff. In July a Parliamentary Select Committee described the England's maternity services as 'unsustainable'.

A statement to the News in August by OUH simply repeated that Chippy's unit was 'not currently open for births. This is due to staffing problems that we are working hard to resolve.' The News Team responded, asking for more reassurance to combat local fears that Chippy's closure could become permanent. In reply, the OUH's Chief Nursing Officer 'confirmed this situation is not unique to OUH'. She added 'we are working with the Region, CQC, and HOSC (the Scrutiny Committee) to assess and mitigate current workforce constraints' which mean they can't staff all units.

Pool Meadow conservation

After recent discussions by Town Councillors and local stakeholders, a feasibility study for restoring the environment at Chipping Norton's historic Pool Meadow is starting. After



a presentation at their July meeting, Councillors agreed to commission Chippy resident Jonny Ackroyd from Beaumont Rivers to conduct the study – a budget of £3425 has been agreed. Pool Meadow, the natural site alongside the stream below New Street Recreation Ground, is linked with the Scheduled Ancient Monument of the motte and bailey castle and fishponds. Mr Ackroyd's proposal notes that the Pool Meadow lower pond was drained and silted up years back and 'colonised' by horsetail which has somewhat 'out-competed' all other ecology. He will look at restoration ideas, including introducing a pond or wetland area, replanting the meadow, improving existing footpaths for access, and installing information boards about the ecology and wildlife. It is a chance to engage local people with history, and help wildlife and endangered species such as bees, voles, newts and birds. His report will include a costed action plan, maps and designs.

Feasibility work, taking a few weeks, will include a site survey by a chartered ecologist, and liaison with the Environment Agency, Natural England, Historic England, landowner, and planning authority - to identify further consents or planning work needed. Mr Ackroyd will liaise with the Council's Pool Meadow Working Party. He has already visited the site with Chippy resident and former County Ecologist Craig Blackwell, who supports the study and hopes it will also highlight Pool Meadow's links with the nearby wider landscape corridor. Clive Rand, Chair of the Green Gym, who has taken an active interest, also supports the project. He has been worried that Pool Meadow was under threat of being overrun, for example by shrub growth, unless something is done. He noted that there will be challenges, for example with insufficient stream water, and the time for getting all the right approvals from the various bodies.

National Racehorse Week

From 10–18 September, venues including training yards, studs, retraining and rehoming centres (eg: the gold standard HEROS www.heroscharity.org) are organizing hundreds of events to mark this special week. It's the brainchild of local trainer Richard Phillips at Adlestrop, who is pictured with

some of the team during the Week last year. Richard said, 'I am delighted that, once again, we are celebrating the racehorse with the second National Racehorse Week. It is an ideal opportunity to show the world the incredible love and care racehorses receive and share the joy and happiness they give in return. We welcome everyone to witness the human devotion that Thoroughbreds receive throughout their lives.' Last year, I 1,000 places were booked in advance and the digital reach was 15 million. Some 95% of attendees had a positive impression of racing. It provided an excellent platform on which to build bigger and better this year.'We would like more non "core" people to attend in September, that is, first-timers to racing' added Richard. (www.richardphillipsracing.com)

Events at Adlestrop include a short Sunday Thanksgiving service, plus interviews with farriers, vets and physios. There will be demonstrations by world renowned Yogi Breisner explaining how he encourages young horses to jump, and Godolphin Stud and Stable Staff Award winner Dulcie West who will give a dressage display on a retrained racehorse. Racing is the second most viewed sport in the country and the only major sport where males and females compete on an equal footing. With Rachael Blackmore and Hollie Doyle flying the flag for female jockeys there are opportunities aplenty for young women. Ideas for Town Hall uses

Chipping Norton Town Council are starting a significant fiveyear programme of expenditure on the Town Hall. They are also recruiting a new staff member to look at marketing and using the Town Hall – particularly for the community (See advert p7). Councillors recently looked at improvements and usage at both Witney Corn Exchange and Brackley Town Hall, which is a Palladian-style building similar to Chippy's. Brackley were, in fact, awarded £3.5m from the Heritage Lottery and have restored their building beautifully to include a café/wine bar, which helps with income. Witney Town Council run the Corn Exchange as an Arts and Community Centre with a lobby bar/café open to the public and for hiring. Future projects for Chipping Norton might also look at schemes involving Heritage Lottery Funding. Meanwhile, a properly documented and measured survey of our Town Hall is in progress.

Diddly restaurant 'loophole'

After planning permission was refused for his Diddly Squat farm shop site restaurant, Jeremy Clarkson duly opened a restaurant this summer at a different barn some distance away. Expressing some satisfaction, Mr Clarkson told journalists, 'we're opening anyway. Everyone at Diddly Squat has spent three months becoming expert in planning regulations and we've found a delightful little loophole'. With little public explanation of the said loophole the News investigated. A 2015 change to Planning Regulations allows conversion of an agricultural building to other uses, subject to conditions. It must have been solely in agricultural use since 2012, or at least 10 years, not listed nor scheduled. Buildings under 500m² can be used for storage, distribution, commercial, business or services, including a restaurant, or even hotel, once the Local Authority has been given what is called Prior Notification and proof of no harm to highways, noise, contamination nor flooding. The Times quoted Mr Clarkson saying the chosen barn met the criteria and 'We sent the Council an email on Wednesday night and on Thursday it was like something from Challenge Anneka to get it ready'.

However, any associated building changes could need planning permission – which Mr Clarkson was clearly keen to avoid. The Diddly Squat website warns restaurant bookers 'it's small, mostly outdoors and very rustic. Ordering a beer or going to the lavatory isn't as easy as in your local pub and we don't cater for the faddy. We've done our best to keep you warm and dry, but this is England'. Guests climb into a trailer towed by tractor from the shop to the barn. Apart from a tiny VIP shepherd hut, eating is entirely al fresco, and the WC is a port-a-loo a tractor-ride away, with 'quad bikes available for those in a rush'. But fans don't seem put off – travelling miles for the unique outdoor dining experience. The Chadlington Road car parking issues remain – with just the small farm shop car park, a bit of field and the roadside (despite cones). The new restaurant has a temporary food licence. To be permanent, more stringent regulations would apply, a potential source of more planning battles. Wet weather could limit al fresco dining but Amazon Prime costar Kaleb Cooper was quoted saying, 'We'll cross that (bridge) when it comes. I will come up with a solution, I am sure of it'. WODC are looking at the new restaurant set-up 'to ensure it is compliant with local and national planning law and policies, and licensing and food hygiene regulations'. Meanwhile, beer, burger and souvenir sales in the Farm Shop continue as ever, or should we say beer and burger sales continue, as does sale of potatoes at £24 each with a 'free' Tshirt. Planning rules ... what planning rules?

Walterbush Road bus shelter

After another bus user's request, Chippy Town Council has agreed to get perspex ends fitted on the recently reerected bus shelter on Walterbush Road, to provide some protection from our chilly wind and rain. Also, after the somewhat mysterious appearance of four large empty wooden planters (where the old bus stop seat used to be), Councillors have taken action because passers by were depositing rubbish. Soil has



appeared along with newly installed plants – including several herbs. Watering and maintenance of the planters will be needed -- especially during the hot weather!

'Build Chippy Better' - latest news

The County Council's long awaited Masterplan for the 1000+ new homes and community facilities at East Chipping Norton is still delayed. Chipping Norton Town Council's 'Build Chippy Better' Working Group, now chaired by Mayor Sandra Coleman, meets next on 12 September, working hard to influence how any plan can best ensure a sustainable future for Chippy. Here are some updates.

What's best from elsewhere?

In July the Council's Working Group visited some relevant new sites elsewhere – asking how the 1000+ new East Chipping Norton homes could make a positive contribution to our town. At Kingsmere, SW Bicester, they saw a variety of design approaches, led by a comprehensive Design Code, for a major spine road through a development. At Graven Hill



pment. At Graven Hill they appreciated the need to integrate housing of all tenures. At Elmsbrook, NW Bicester, the country's only remaining 'Eco Town'they were impressed by the green credentials of the 'true net zero' homes (pictured), and

by the community engagement and after-care from the lead developer remaining on site. Cala Homes (one of the East Chippy landowners), offered a guided tour of their site at Wolvercote Mill, which follows a strict Design Code showing that high volume home builders can 'build better' when required to. The Working Group looked at what works well and what can be improved on at East Chippy – and will produce notes that others can use if they visit.

Eynsham ruling 'disaster' for Chippy?

In July a crucial planning decision about plans for the new Garden Village at Eynsham (now called Salt Cross) have put a black cloud over prospects for East Chippy being a fully sustainable development. Our Town Council are particularly strong on achieving net zero carbon homes in line with national (and indeed Oxfordshire's) objectives. But one big barrier is that national planning policies for new housing currently don't make this compulsory, even though many local planning authorities are trying to set such tougher standards. For the 2200-home Salt Cross project, local WODC planners proposed strong policies saying that all Salt Cross development specifications had to demonstrate net zero carbon outcomes – using ultra low energy fabrics, low carbon technologies and on-site renewable energy generation. Any planning applications and building work would be monitored to ensure this happened.

But the Salt Cross developers and landowners were not happy and after a public enquiry the Planning Inspector ruled that the policy could not be enforced – it did not align with national legislation. Instead of WODC's exemplar plan, the Planning Inspector wants WODC to adopt the policies considered by many as ineffective, which have led to the 'anywhere' and sub-optimum housing developments nationally. So much for the COP26 aims in Glasgow! WODC




are, naturally, furious after all the work put in to mitigate climate impacts. Similar constraints on WODC planners at East Chipping Norton could threaten the exemplar development that the 'Build Chippy Better' team are hoping for.

The pressure will turn to Oxfordshire County Council as major landowner, and Cala as owner/developer to decide for themselves how 'green' to go. With extra financial pressures being placed on local authorities by the Government, OCC may likely want to take as much of the East Chippy land value to balance their books – rather than spend it on greener homes and improvements for our community. Such action could have long-lasting negative effects. We can keep the pressure up, perhaps now on our MP and the Government to update a failing national policy.

Glyme Lane's Roman news

As reported before, planning for the East Chipping Norton housing site stalled back in May while archaeological investigations were carried out in fields off Glyme Lane. Amongst other things, evidence of a significant Roman settlement has been





suggested. Results are unlikely to be public for some time. Fieldwork was carried out in May and June with findings and results now being evaluated. Oxfordshire County Council's Lead Archaeologist Richard Oram advised on the need for, and standards expected of, this work, but is not himself managing the evaluation work. This is being done by experts Wessex Archaeology on behalf of Cala Homes' archaeological consultants, RPS. In July Mr Oran told Chipping Norton Town Council that, 'The post-fieldwork stage of the evaluation of, cleaning and analysing the finds, processing and analysis of environmental samples and interpretation of what was found to aid in the production of an acceptable report, has always been the larger part of the evaluation process.' Wessex Archaeology were initially aiming for a draft report in August but complexities with the findings could delay that. Chippy's Deputy Town Clerk Katherine Jang is following developments closely but said that Town Council and public may not see any report until it has been reviewed by bodies such as Historic England and the County Council.

Have you found something?

Town centre shop news

At 9 Horsefair, **Hugo's**, the erstwhile pop up smoothie/coffee/gift/yoga shop, closed in July after a short tenure, and the property is likely for sale. The 10 New Street site that was **Wild Thyme** 'restaurant with rooms' is now empty (Sally and Nick have moved premises to Elmsfield) and the property landlord could well develop it as residential or Airbnb. The old **solicitors' offices** above Fairfax estate agents at the top of New Street are 'under offer', so hopefully someone might develop the upper floors.

The owners of the former **HSBC bank building** say they are still positive, looking for a hotel operator for their new boutique hotel development. The empty **Fish and Pizza** shop next to Café le Raj in Horsefair is still to let. The current **Cotswolds Newsagents**' premises on High Street is still to let pending proprietor Jeremy Catling's planned move of the Newsagents to the empty old Post Office nearby. Work on the long-empty old **Newsagents** shop and listed building a few doors down continues. The building of new homes and two boutique cinemas at the old High Street **Harpers** store is progressing apace

The News understands there might be a new business ready to move into the old **Wine Bear/Antiques shop** at Hitchmans Mews – but scaffolding and important roof repairs will need to be completed first. Finally, the empty **Bannor** **Electrical** shop down the alley next to Corbetts in Market Square is to let.


Chippy Mop is back!

the Sunday morning. Chipping Norton's original 13th century annual fair was a commercial affair with sheep, cattle and produce stalls. It declined following the Black Death but the fair survived and the 17th century saw a Wednesday market and three fairs. But it was a 1677 Statute for hiring labourers on a binding annual contract that saw the October 'Hiring Fair' start with job seekers displaying the tools of their trade – including mops! It was only later in the 19th century that entertainment developed – ropedancers, jugglers, donkey racing and more – evolving into today's funfair. Enjoy!




Apple Day at Orchard

Time for Harvest Festival

It's harvest time and Chippy is surrounded by parched fields echoing to the rumble of combine harvesters. The heat has meant that harvesting is two weeks earlier than usual and some yields are low due to the drought.



This, and the effects on grain supplies of the war in Ukraine, have taught even 'townies' who thought that bread came from supermarkets, to understand more about challenges of getting food from field to table and to be very grateful for the food we eat. Giving thanks for successful harvests is as old as humankind, and Harvest Suppers were an important event in rural communities. The Harvest Festival traditional in Christian Churches was a Victorian invention. A News Team member on holiday in Cornwall recently visited the church at Morwenstow and learned that the first Harvest Festival was apparently held there in 1843, when the Vicar invited his parishioners to a special service to give thanks for the harvest. Subsequently Victorian hymns such as We plough the fields and scatter and Come ye thankful people, come helped to popularise his idea and spread the annual custom of decorating churches with home-grown produce for the Harvest Festival service.

Town Cemetery news update

Chipping Norton Town Councillors, at July's Community Committee meeting, agreed to set aside an area of Worcester Road's town cemetery for families requesting special raised kerb designs for their memorials. In recent years, Chipping Norton and other towns and parishes have discouraged this, as it causes difficulties for maintenance and grass-cutting. This has caused some upset. One local family already had a raised kerb grave and recently wanted to bury a loved one alongside with a matching design. Councillors, as part of their decision, took note of some preferences for different groups in society – for example as explained in a recent helpful document on 'Cemetery Burials and Traditions for Gypsy and Traveller Communities'. For a memorial in the new area, there will be an extra moderate charge for installing kerb sets, to cover additional grounds maintenance. The Council is not



responsible for structural maintenance of the kerb sets themselves. Councillors have also agreed to put up a new and improved Cemetery Welcome and Information/Regulations Board at the entrance.

Cottsway grants for projects

Recent high temperatures demonstrated the extreme challenges that exist for all our local fire and rescue services. On 20 July Chippy crew dealt with a (suspected arson) barn fire in Chipping Norton, then on I August assisted colleagues at a large field fire near Paxford. Six fire engines were needed to deal with the incident. The cause is not yet known, but it had spread rapidly,

involving approximately 35 acres of stubble, cut crop and hedgerows. Quick intervention saved a barn and stopped the fire from affecting a nearby railway. FLYING THE FLAG

Chipping Norton Town Council have erected a new 'stand alone' flagpole in the Millennium Garden along West Street. Easy access provides the chance to display the Union Flag, and other flags to mark particular important occasions. Here's what's happening:

Union Flag – The de facto UK national flag – although there's no law making it official! It has become such through precedent. The design dates from a Royal proclamation following the 1801 union of Great Britain



and Ireland. The flag combines the red cross of St George for England, white saltire of St Andrew for Scotland and red saltire of St Patrick for Ireland. Of course it's just Northern Ireland now. Wales loses out, but the Welsh Dragon appears in the English royal coat of arms.

Other flags on the Council's calendar

The Town Council's protocol, agreed in July, includes other dates for flying specific different flags associated with other important occasions. They've so far agreed the following and will purchase flags for: Commonwealth Day; Earth Day; Pride (the Rainbow Flag); Armed Forces Day; NHS Birthday; International Women's Day and Refugees.



Flying the Union Flag

National rules say the Union Flag can be flown anytime but MUST be flown on Government buildings on certain designated dates. These include: the birthdays of The Queen and Prince of Wales, Her Majesty's official birthday, date of Accession and Coronation, Remembrance Day, St George's Day for England, plus the opening and prorogation of Parliament. The Town Council will be finalising a version of this guidance, adding Armistice Day (11 November).



Commonwealth Flag – The official flag representing the Commonwealth of Nations was designed in 1973 at the Commonwealth Heads of Government meeting in Canada. A globe is surrounded by 64 radiating sunrays, forming a 'C' for Commonwealth (unrelated to the number of nations). In 2013, the globe was tilted, and sunrays reduced to 34!



Earth Day – The official version is the Earthday or ECOLOGY Flag created by artist Ron Cobb in 1969 as part of the '60s environmental movement – supposedly created from letters e and o, meaning environment and organism. With echoes of the Stars and Stripes, the green, for pure air and green land; was substituted for that flag's blue and red.



Armed Forces Day – The 23 June Day next year will use a flag with Union Flag parts showing 'support'. The Day is a chance to show support for the men and women who make up the Armed Forces community: from currently serving troops to Service families, veterans and cadets.



Rainbow Flag – Known as the Gay Pride flag or LGBT pride flag it reflects the diversity of the LGBT community and the spectrum of human sexuality and gender. Originally devised by artist Gilbert Baker and other activists around 1978, it originally had eight colours but most now use only six.

Refugee Flag – A refugee nation flag was designed and made by Yara Said, an artist and Syrian refugee – inspired by the orange and black of the life vest that she wore when she fled her country in search of a safe haven. It was first used at the Rio Olympics in 2016.

Suffrage Flag – For International Women's Day, some choices here. Perhaps this UK, green, white and purple Suffrage Flag showing the colours of the militant Women's Social and Political Union, led by Emmeline Pankhurst. Or perhaps use a flag of the more moderate National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies – often green, gold and white.

Requests from the local community – The Council will consider special requests to fly other flags to mark local or national commemorations or campaigns but can refuse political or other flags that risk bringing the Council into disrepute or losing political neutrality. Chipping Norton's Community Hospital A 'thank you' to the League of Friends

Tributes to years of support – Back in 1948, the NHS took over Chipping Norton's old 1920s War Memorial Hospital at Spring Street. For years, the community rallied round with both financial and volunteer support through an enthusiastic League of Friends. Over time, significant funds were raised. When the new facility was opened in 2011 up the London Road, the remaining Friends' funds continued to provide valuable support. In August, the Hospital paid tribute with a display board showing past gifts and gave an update for the News.

A thriving community health hub



Chipping Norton's War Memorial Community Hospital is run by Oxford Health NHS Trust who provide community and mental health services across several counties. Clinic Nurse Fran Boone told

us about its role in Chippy, mainly running specialist outpatient services and clinics avoiding local patients travelling to Oxford and Banbury. Key community health professionals are based here with specialist clinicians coming from our main hospitals to see patients. The Hospital also houses the midwife-led Cotswold Birth Centre run by Oxford University Hospitals Trust (OUH), and a base for the Lawrence Home Nursing Team, the local charity providing end-of-life palliative home care. The NHS's local district nursing team, based on site and as busy as ever, provides community-wide support for people returning home from hospital or preventing hospital admissions.

Vital help from League of Friends

When the old hospital had inpatient beds, the League provided Christmas gifts for patients, and continued with has Christmas trees. Donating important equipment has helped make sure that many patient needs can be met here in Chippy, avoiding a trip to Oxford or Banbury. Clinic Nurse Fran Boone and Receptionist Sarah Harvey are



pictured showing the News Team the Diagnostic Ultra-sound unit supported by the Friends, and Fran listed other important equipment bought with financial help: an ENT scope, mobile examination light, spirometry equipment, variable height trolley, and hand-held machines for clinical observations. Items have also gone to the Maternity unit. Fran said 'We have just wanted to say how grateful we are to the League of Friends for their time and effort in funding equipment over the years for the Hospital. They have at heart always wanted to help keep services for Chipping Norton and surrounding villages. A massive thank you'.

Specialist clinics – 'Ask for Chippy!'

Currently over 25 specialist outpatient clinics are run at the Hospital allowing patients to be seen much nearer to home – parking is free as well. There are consultant-led and nurse-led clinics for adults and children, with specialists coming both from Oxford Health and OUH alongside the local team. Oxford Health's local podiatry, occupational therapy and physiotherapy sessions which are run here help prevent more serious issues and empower people to live life independently to the best of their ability. X-ray equipment on site is bookable by referral from GPs and other clinicians. Sarah Barton, the Hospital's Clinic Clerk, provided the latest list of clinics and services. She urges News readers, when talking to their doctors about appointments or using 'Choose and Book', to ask 'Can I have it in Chipping Norton?'.

Latest updates from the NHS



NHS services very stretched – Nationally, all NHS services remain stretched, with demand backlogs, Covid and big staffing

issues. Oxfordshire is no exception with Urgent and Emergency Care having a critical incident declared, and with waiting issues over the summer made worse by delays in the whole 'flow' from ambulances into the hospital itself and then in getting patients released from hospital because of limited access to adequate care support at home. Please use NHS III if you can (not A&E for non-emergencies); our Oxfordshire NHS Trusts are trying to reduce pressure on the system with more 'Hospital at Home' assessments.

GP access still challenging – The latest national GP Survey of over 700,000 patients, carried out early in 2022 and published in the summer, showed the extent of issues in GP practices right across England, including Covid, backlogs, and delayed hospital treatments. In 2022, the 'overall good' rating for GP practices was down to 75% for our whole region (Bucks, Oxon, Berks), with Chipping Norton Health Centre scoring 60%. Only 56% for the region were satisfied with GP appointment times available (CNHC 37%) and only 56% found it easy to get through to the GP practice by phone (CNHC 40%).

Covid update and vaccinations - Covid rates rose again

rapidly in June and July, recording nearly 200 patients with Covid in



Oxfordshire's four main hospital sites. Vaccinations are still fully available: 95% of our over 50s have had at least one booster, 82% of over 75s have had the second Spring booster. The Government has announced further Covid booster jabs for over 50s starting from September using GP surgeries and pharmacies. At the time of writing, no-one could say if they might or might not be co-ordinated alongside flu jabs.


Flu vaccination programme 2022/23 – Chipping Norton



Health Centre will run weekday and weekend flu vaccination clinics this year. Dates and bookings (two weeks beforehand) await firm plans for actually receiving vaccine deliveries – to avoid having

to reschedule. CNHC hope to have a text message booking system (similar to Covid) in by the end of September – to cut down on telephone traffic to the Health Centre. See the CNHC website and complete a 'change personal details' form if you think they don't have your mobile phone number. For flu jabs, those clinically eligible will be invited first, then those aged 50–64 years old with no underlying clinical issues. See CNHC website for 2022/23 eligibility criteria. Other Chippy Pharmacies including Topside Pharmacy and Boots on the High Street will be doing Flu Jabs as well. Contact them directly. **NHS using your information** – From 1 August, all our NHS organisations must have a system in place that allows you to choose to 'opt out' if you want to restrict having your data used for helping with both NHS planning and research nationally. Our Chipping Norton Health Centre will continue to take part in primary care research. If they wish to 'opt out' of allowing this, patients need to register their choice directly online nationally. There is a form to do this on the CNHC website (please do not hand forms into Reception). Please visit chippingnortonhealthcentre.nhs.uk/national-data-optout-31st-july-2022/ to find out details.

Summer walks with Chippy Ramblers

A slightly overcast July afternoon with a cheeky breeze made ideal conditions for a walk from the Long Compton mast all the way down to the village with stunning views of the Warwickshire Vale. An extra wide field margin provided an array of wonderful wild flowers: marbled white butterflies sat atop pyramidal orchids and electric blue damsel flies joined other pollinating insects enjoying the feast. What comes down must go up, so a climb back was inevitable; but a stroll through the village revealed The Red Lion as a welcome refuge for two weary walkers. The rest took a different route back up the hill to the waiting cars, one of which scooped up the pub crawlers on the way home.

On a sunny Sunday afternoon a month later in August three extra cars squeezed into Minster Lovell, vying with cricket fans cheering their teams and tourists enjoying the beauty of the area. Almost back, and suddenly the attractive ruin of Minster Lovell Hall loomed beside the river. Built in the 1430s the Dovecot still looks intact. A flock of pure white doves took off as though to say farewell; and finally The Swan supplied iced drinks to send us on our way. 

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Tremendous' A level results at Chipping Norton School

Students at Chipping Norton School faced the challenge for 2022 of a full set of A Level Exams – having, for their GCSE and A Level years, battled Covid, Lockdown and disruption to learning. They've also never sat any actual public exams! But on 18 August Head Barry Doherty announced a tremendous set of examination results – he praised the 'extraordinary commitment, energy and belief amongst our students and their teachers. Across every subject, our Outstanding Sixth Form can celebrate the impact of hard work undertaken by students and staff. Our community deserves this day after the challenges of the last few years.' Here are some highlights.

Excellent headline achievements - This year's 2022 results were significantly higher than in 2019 - the last 'normal' A level exam year. 39% of all grades were A* or A, 69% A* to B, 92% A* to C and 100% A* to E. Deputy Headteacher Alan Trainer pointed to good outcomes across a wide range of subjects. Over two-thirds of entries secured A* to B grades in further mathematics (100%), drama & theatre (100%), mathematics (89%), English language and literature

Grade successes & destinations - Sixth Form Head Peter Ward was delighted with grades and university places. He highlighted 10 students getting thirty-two A* and A grades between them: Oli Ball, Georgia Bell, Jake Briggs, Karina Graham, Rose Heppell, Zach Ibrahim, Anya Kennedy, Dan Large, Olivia Riley and Satu Noble. Examples of university places included Jake Petyt (Cardiff, chemistry with an industry year), Elinor Tomalin (Hull York Medical School) plus first

(86%), chemistry (85%), physics (75%), fine art (75%), history (71%), sociology (70%), biology and (69%) English literature (69%). Mr Trainer was also pleased with how teachers worked very closely with students, - with accurate assessments and a great joint effort committed to securing a superb set of results.





Road safety update from Town Councillors

Following the tragic incident earlier in the year at the junction of New Street/High Street, a Town meeting was convened with OCC's Cabinet Travel and Development Lead, Cllr Duncan Enright, and our own County Councillor Geoff Saul to express our concerns over the lack of safe crossing places in our Town. Since then we have had productive meetings with officers from OCC and can report that a traffic survey is planned for early autumn which is the first step in a formal assessment for new crossings on New Street and West Street. We are also working with the County Council on a bigger project around cycling and walking routes which will be submitted later this year for review by the County Council Cabinet in 2023. We have identified a number of priority crossing points and dangerous spots that need to be made safer particularly on school walking routes, and have also identified safer cycle routes which avoid the main roads - our ambition is for everyone to feel safer while walking or cycling through town. And on that note, a reminder to complete the 20mph survey - we believe this is a really important step in making Chippy feel a nicer and healthier place to live – but we want to know your opinions.

Chippy's War Service in Kenya

The British Legion, Chipping Norton Branch, have had an enquiry from Kenya asking for information on three Chipping Norton residents who served in that country in World War Two.
