

WODC Cabinet coming to Chippy

WEST OXFORDSHIRE Have you ever wanted to give West DISTRICT COUNCIL Oxfordshire District Council a piece of your mind or urge them into action? Now's your chance - at 2pm on Wednesday 16 November come to the Lower Town Hall. The ruling WODC Cabinet (pictured) are holding



their November meeting here in Chippy - in public. Their formal agenda is published in advance, but any local resident can request a three-minute speaking slot to ask about issues that affect the District. See www.westoxon.gov.uk. Here are some example items for which WODC is responsible which we could quiz them about:

- Zero carbon East Chippy plan WODC colluded with landowner OCC to allocate 1200 homes in the 2018 Local Plan. There's still no Masterplan, no commitment to Zero Carbon by OCC, and no 5 year housing supply. Exactly how are WODC working proactively with OCC's Leader and Cabinet to sort this?
- Getting HGVs off the A44 WODC declared illegal pollution and an AQMA in Chippy in 2008. They were meant to ensure action. Depriming the A44 was the then solution. It hasn't happened. Are WODC still monitoring pollution (the Black Box was removed 5 years ago) and how are they lobbying OCC to act?
- £££ for Town infrastructure WODC's official list of Chippy's 'infrastructure' needs is over five years out of date, unfunded, and ignores 1200 extra East Chippy homes. WODC are now consulting on 'what we want' (see right) - but how do they propose to fund it adequately, including with any proper long-shelved plans for any Community Infrastructure Levy?
- Public sports pitch provision This is a disgrace, with nothing in the Local Plan to require sports pitches for the 1200 new homes or make up the existing shortfall, and failure by WODC to meet their own Open Space policy. What's the response?
- No affordable housing How much new social rented housing for young Chippy working people has WODC supported in the last 10 years? What is planned for the next three years, given the huge delay at East Chipping
- Lack of Town parking WODC's last parking study for Chippy was 2016 - concluding that more than 100 new town centre parking spaces were needed. What action are they planning?
- A welcome for visitors WODC long ago closed our tourist centre and one stop shop. Our visitor signposting is years out of date or absent, and our street name signs need major refurbishment. WODC know all this. What plans for action are there?

Chippy's aging Leisure Centre – This was a welcome facility over 20 years ago but when are WODC going to invest in upgrade, maintenance (those leaks!) or even replacement?

Important: To speak, you must book a slot in advance via democratic.services@westoxon.gov.uk, with your name and topic, by 2pm on Friday 11 November. The relevant Cabinet Member will either respond verbally or write a note for the minutes.

Chippy's 'infrastructure' needs?

What infrastructure does Chippy needs to support existing and future residents. WODC has launched a consultation about this - and it's important that our local knowledge helps WODC prioritise their 'shopping list' when negotiating financial contributions from new development. This will be key in the upcoming East Chipping Norton Strategic

Development Area (1000 +homes). Recent schemes funded by developers include the 80 affordable homes at Willow Gardens,



Evans Way playground, improvements to Over Norton play area and money towards creative educational space for The Theatre. Future projects will include a new primary school as part of the Easy Chippy development, doubling the frequency of the S3 bus service to Oxford and a changing places WC at the Leisure Centre. But what else is needed? More town centre parking? Road and traffic improvements? More sports facilities? Improvements to the library? More health facilities? Affordable housing? A bus link to Kingham station? This is

To make consultation more accessible, WODC has devised a website with interactive tools that are simple and fun to use. They explain what 'infrastructure' is, what 'developer contributions' are, ask us to say what is needed in our area and even to play an 'allocation game' to set priorities. The full draft consultation document is available online for those interested. Why not have a go yourself - find it at communityinfrastructure.commonplace.is. But be quick! The consultation closes on 14 November!

Legion's Remembrance plans

The British Legion, Chipping Norton Branch, will be marking Remembrance in early November. **Saturday 5 November** will see singer Vintage Ruby on the steps of the Town Hall (inside if wet), from 11.30am to 1pm with a 40s-style tea room inside the Town Hall and fundraising for the Poppy Appeal with poppies, poppy pins, crosses, wreaths, and more available. On **Friday 11 November** the Armistice Day

service at the town War Memorial starts at 10.45am — marking the 80th Anniversary of the 2nd Battle of El Alamein which ended on 11 November 1942 and remembering some of the Chipping Norton men who fought there. On **Sunday 13 November**, the Remembrance Sunday parade leaves Sainsbury's about 10.30am, then the Service in St Mary's Church will include tributes to the three men from the Town who died in 1942.

MP returns to backbenches

Robert Courts, MP for Witney, including Chipping Norton, returned to the backbenches after Liz Truss took over as Prime Minister. Mr Courts was appointed Parliamentary Under Secretary of State in the Department for Transport, with responsibility for aviation and maritime, in September 2020. After losing his current position he tweeted, 'I am sad to be leaving Government and the honour of representing our country's truly world-leading aviation and maritime sectors." In his leaving letter to the then Prime Minister, he mentioned tough challenges in office,

including 'the almost total shutdown of parts of the sectors to protect the public' during the pandemic and 'avoiding significant airport disruption over the recent summer against a challenging global backdrop'. He rounded off saying, 'West Oxfordshire has always been my primary focus and I look forward to continuing to represent the wonderful people among whom I live, with undimmed energy, from the backbenches.' Before this recent ministerial post, Mr Courts had previously served as a PPS in the Foreign and Commonwealth Office in 2018, a post from which he resigned so he could rebel against Theresa May's proposed 'Chequers' Brexit plan. The ministerial re-shuffle plans of the new Prime Minister, Rishi Sunak are awaited at time of writing.

Grants for local businesses

Do you run a Chipping Norton business in retail, tourism, arts, culture, or heritage sectors that supports tourism? If so, you could be eligible for a grant of between £5,000 and £24,999. OxLEP (our Local Enterprise Partnership) secured Government funding for the Business Visitor Economy Grant Scheme to support re-emergence from Covid. Find out more from oxlepbusiness.co.uk/business-support But you'd better be guick, as applications must be received before 5 November. OxLEP is also inviting small and medium-sized enterprises to bid for grants of between £5,000 and £50,000. Their Go-Create Grants aim to help SMEs implement innovation projects bringing economic benefit to Oxfordshire, for example product or service development, technological and applied research, early product validation, supporting advance manufacturing capability and first production. Previous successful bidders include EcoSync, who developed a dynamic energy management system helping businesses save 50%

energy costs during the heating season, or Reward4Waste, a re-use and recycling platform that educates and incentivises people to recycle better with redeemable rewards. See www.oxlepbusiness.co.uk for guidance on submitting bids for the next round, which closes on 18 November.

Progress at The Branch

Look out for action starting by the end of November or early December on the project at 16 Market Place, 'The Branch', in Chipping Norton. Hoardings will be going up for safety throughout the build. The Branch's Emma Kennedy told the News' we recognise that this will cause some disruption to the Town, particularly to neighbours and market traders. We apologise for this, and hope to be able to keep disruption to a minimum. Once hoardings are up, we will use this space to tell the story of The Branch, keep you informed of progress, and provide details of who to contact with questions or concerns. Thank you for bearing with us, we really hope that you look forward to late 2023 when we will be able to welcome you through the door!'

National Road Safety Week

Local communities, including Chipping Norton, are invited to take part in this year's national Road Safety Week, from 14 to 20 November. Run by BRAKE, the



road safety charity, the campaign gets schools and communities to support our right to make safe and healthy journeys every day. The theme this year is SAFE ROADS FOR ALL and fits Government initiatives including safe roads, safe vehicles and speeds, the new hierarchy of road users, and inclusivity to keep us all safe, no matter who we are, or how we travel. Anyone can join in - see brake.org.uk/road-safety-week/take-part. Ask your school or employer. Chipping Norton Town Council is pursuing a range of road safety issues for the Town - from 20mph limits, safe cycling and walking routes, to road junction and crossing improvements. Councillor Mark Walker said they are planning to engage with schools and other parts of the community one focus will be on results of the 20mph survey (see article p5) and canvassing opinion on potential safe crossing routes. Watch out on their website for progress on safety and for involvement in Road Safety Week.

Proud Town Standard Bearer



Norton's Chipping ceremonies to mark the death of Queen Elizabeth saw our Branch of the Royal British Legion take a major role, guarding the Town Hall Book Condolence, organising the service Flag at Millennium Garden, and proclaiming King Charles on the Town Hall steps. Our standard bearer, former **RAF** Corporal Andrews, took a lead part, but Tjark's 'final duty for the Oueen' was the honour of travelling to London and raising the Standard at The Cenotaph (left) as one of 72

British Legion representatives at the Queen's funeral procession. Tjark had disappeared to London at the beginning of the week for practice and rehearsals, postponing his holiday. This was a great honour for him and for the Chipping Norton Royal British Legion. He was an RAF corporal and weapons engineer for 16 years until 2013 and has been a



committee member of the RBL's Chipping Norton Branch for nine years – acting as its standard bearer for three Festivals of Remembrance and at the 90th Anniversary of the Great Pilgrimage in Ypres. Tjark was recently awarded a rare certificate of Appreciation for exemplary service from the Royal British Legion president (pictured above).

Planning setbacks for Chippy

As reported last month, years of delay on plans for 1000+homes at East Chipping Norton are contributing to a big headache for our planning authority, West Oxfordshire District Council. Our County and District Cllr Geoff Saul reminded Town Councillors in October that WODC now cannot demonstrate it has an adequate supply of land available for housing, as set out in the 2018 Local Plan. This leaves the door open for developers to put forward speculative planning applications for piecemeal development of unallocated land not in the Local Plan – a potential free-for-all with no joined-up view on sustainability or much-needed infrastructure.

The other cause of WODC's big headache was a Planning Inspector rejecting WODC's policy guidance that would have required the Salt Cross Garden Village in Eynsham to be zero carbon. The Inspector said that national Government policy did not require it – the implication being that similar ambitions for East Chipping Norton, promoted by our Town Council's 'Build Chippy Better' group, would also be frustrated. WODC in September consulted voters on their

revised Eynsham Salt Cross plan – 'watered down' after the Inspector's report. This has resulted in a backlash from environmental campaigners such as CPRE, Friends of the Earth, the Town & Country Planning Association and Eynsham Parish Council, demanding that Salt Cross should maintain zero carbon standards and be a 'test case' for national Government. All this might be helped if Oxfordshire County Council, the major landowner at East Chippy, had produced a proper Masterplan and set 'zero carbon' ambitions for developments on their own land, as a responsible public authority. More to go on all this.

Your views on East Chippy plans

Chipping Norton Town Council's Build Chippy Better group want to make sure they have our latest views on what the 1000+ home development should bring to the Town. They have devised a simple online survey — asking how important various



issues are to us, for example what type of open space, housing, community facilities, employment development are needed, how can green energy and protecting biodiversity be incorporated and what the ingredients are for a well-designed development. The results will help the Town Council stand up for what is important to the people of Chipping Norton, when it comes to a dialogue with the landowner and planning authority - something that, four years since the publication of the Local Plan, is yet to really start. When it does, the chances are pressure will be on to deliver homes on the ground very quickly. So don't say you weren't asked! Positive vote for 20mph Town

Support for scheme - Oxfordshire County Council is



encouraging towns and villages to join their '20mph Scheme for Towns'. In September the News publicised the (mainly online) public survey, being

run by Chipping Norton Town Council. The results are in—with 256 responses (79% were town residents, plus visitors, school attendees and local workers). The Town population is just over 7000. The survey saw 64% of respondents 'fully supportive' of a 20mph scheme and 9% 'somewhat supportive', with 21% 'not supportive' and 6% with concerns about implementation. Supporters cite preventing accidents, pedestrian safety and pollution reduction. The full report, including respondents' comments, is on www.chippingnortontc.gov.uk.

Which roads would be 20? – Some places nationally, such as Edinburgh and Wales, are going for 'blanket' reductions to 20mph on all current 30mph roads. In Chippy's survey, 64% said they wanted this. Roads past schools were highlighted in particular, but others thought that parts of main roads such as Worcester Road might remain at 30mph. In fact, the County Council doesn't propose 'blanket' coverage – they set out

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criteria and priorities – for example, in areas where safety is known to be an issue. All this will need to be looked at.

Likely practical issues – Supporters and some research say that wide 20mph coverage does change behaviour and habits, but many people add that enforcement will be needed. This could be an issue, as Thames Valley Police say they don't have resource. Neighbourhood volunteer Speedwatch schemes, with moveable cameras and flashing speeds (such as down New Street) can help, but even there, frustrated residents see hundreds of infringements that go unreported and unpunished.

When, and what will it cost? – OCC promise £3m of funding for signage and road markings over three years— but funds for a whole single town might peak at £35,000. OCC have three 'tranches' of funding, but the first two are already allocated. Chippy would have to wait until 2024/25 for 'tranche three' unless our Town Council can persuade OCC to bring that forward. County Highways authorities also say speeds on our main A roads into town are 'too high' for signage alone to work. Significant funds could be needed for road barriers such as chicanes – potentially on the London Road past Holy Trinity School, Burford Road past Chippy School, and the Worcester Road past and beyond the playground. OCC say the Town would need to find its own funding.

Town Council support – Chippy will now submit survey results to OCC and discuss next steps. Cllr Mark Walker told the News, 'I am really pleased to see such enthusiasm for 20mph, which reflects the same feelings as communities right across Oxfordshire, the UK and around the world. Almost 80 other towns and villages across Oxfordshire have already signed up for 20mph. We will continue to work with OCC to bring the signs to Chipping Norton. Meanwhile we will work



with our community to reinforce benefits of 20mph in terms of health, safety, and improved environment'.

Grants for Town organisations

At a special meeting on 19 October, Chipping Norton Town Council agreed to award their planned total of £26,000 in grants from the current 2022/23 year's budget to local clubs, charities, and 'voluntary bodies', who submitted requests by last September. The larger grants were £5000 to The Lido and £3000 to the Theatre. Grants between £1000 and £2000 go to Thrive North Ox, Volunteer Link-up, CN School PTA, CN Swifts, Little Footsteps, Remix Youth Club, I-I Mentoring (St Mary's Church), Green Gym, and CN Music Festival. Grants from £250 to £750 went to Cleanslate charity, ChipLitFest, 4Shires Swimming, Armed Forces Chipping Norton, St Mary's Minis, CN Parkrun, CN Rainbows and Community Suppers (Community Church). A total of £35235 was requested from applying organisations. A further grant of £2500 (outside the



£26,000) had already, earlier in the year, been awarded after a special request from Chipping Norton Theatre to help continue a programme of free lunches for families in financial difficulties.

Pressure on Chippy's NHS



With NHS waiting lists at a record high, and A&E and hospital beds at capacity, pressure on GP practices – including across Oxford-

shire – remains intense. Government Health Secretary (at the time of writing) Thérèse Coffey said she was 'expecting' all GP practices to see routine patients within two weeks and on the day for emergencies. In Oxfordshire's NHS region, in July, of nearly I million GP appointments, around 86% were within two weeks – but that left over 100,000 taking longer. Dr Joe McManners, the Oxford GP who was chair of our Clinical Commissioning Group, said the Minister's demand was just a 'gimmicky aspiration' given the rising demand and staff shortages throughout the system.

Chipping Norton Health Centre's Patient Services Manager, Kris Chodyniecki, said routine appointment wait times for their Practice GPs were around three weeks but some earlier appointments with other qualified clinicians were possible. Kris added that the 'urgent daily' GP list is high, averaging 70 patients, with the very busy practice receiving 250–300 calls a day. From November, they are increasing the

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
number of 'face-to-face' GP sessions to be 50% of the total alongside telephone appointments, The Health Centre is encouraging more patients to use the NHS App on phones for online access. For example, patients aren't usually contacted with 'normal' blood test results but you can see them yourself if you register for an online access account via access.login.nhs.uk.

Our **South Central Ambulance Service**, under pressure with increased demand, has promised local Councillors to make progress with improvements (see letters and last month's News). SCAS is also putting an emphasis on its local 'first responder' and life-saving support. New paramedic vehicles have been announced, together with better communications about CPR and defibrillators. For Chipping Norton you can download SCAS's Save a Life smartphone app for a step-by-step guide to CPR and locations of defibrillators. Also see British Heart Foundation's website www.defibfinder.uk.

Keep healthy during winter

Oxfordshire's Public Health chief, Ansaf Ashar, warns us to expect more Covid this winter, but says flu (scarce during the pandemic) could pose a greater risk, and respiratory illnesses are already rising. He urges people to get the latest vaccinations for both. **Covid-19 Autumn Boosters** are on offer for those aged 50 and over and for those vulnerable with medical conditions such as heart, kidney and diabetes issues (or their carers). Covid jabs are only bookable at Chipping Norton Health Centre if you are contacted by them – otherwise you have to book via telephoning 119 or the NHS website for an available vaccination centre.

Flu Vaccinations are being offered to qualifying Chipping Norton Health Centre patients between now and December. Please make sure CNHC has an up-to-date mobile telephone number so that they can text you. You can submit your correct number on a 'change personal details' website form, or drop a note into Reception with your mobile number, name, and date of birth. If you are 50 or over, or if you are 18–49 with a chronic condition, you are eligible for vaccination. Children aged 2 and 3 (born between 1 Sept 2018 and 31 August 2020) are eligible for the nasal flu spray. Contact the Health Centre to book an appointment if your child qualifies.



Topside Pharmacy and Boots in the High Street are also offering flu jabs. Drop in to book an appointment.



Free NHS Health Checks are offered by your GP practice every 5 years if you are aged 40-74 with no pre-existing chronic conditions. The NHS encourages you to book the 20 minute check, if you are invited,. It can help to identify the warning signs of heart disease, stroke, kidney disease, type 2 diabetes and some types of dementia. More information at oxfordshire.gov.uk/nhshealthchecks.

Willow Gardens celebration

October saw a celebration at the new Willow Gardens development at Russell Way, marking a successful first six months and now 'officially' open. The £12m project is led by Housing 21, a national leading provider of Retirement Living and Extra Care. It provides much-needed accommodation for



local people over 55, offering 80 one- and two-bedroom apartments for social rent and shared ownership. Housing 21 worked in partnership with Oxfordshire County Council, West Oxfordshire District Council, Midlands-based Deeley Construction, and Quattro Design Architects. The scheme promotes independent living but with community facilities including gardens, restaurant, lounge, and salon – also available to the local wider community. There's an on-site Care Team available 24/7 to deliver planned extra-care packages for residents that need it.

The ribbon-cutting ceremony by Councillor Tim Bearder OCC's Cabinet member pictured above, included Bruce Moore, Housing 21's Chief Executive, Eleanor Deeley, Deeley Group's joint Managing Director, Craig Andrews from Quattro Design Architects, Deborah White, OCC's Adult Social Work Team Leader and members of the Housing 21 team. After speeches, Willow Gardens' new residents were entertained with songs from local children. Emma Taylor, Housing 21's Housing Manager said it had been 'a fantastic first six months', with residents moving in to occupy almost all the apartments, enjoying privacy and peace of mind in an

ideal place for over 55s to live in Chipping Norton. The County Council say they want to work with similar extra care providers using Council land, grants, and private finance schemes. For more information visit www.housing21.org.uk.


Daylesford 'hacked by Russians'

Lady Bamford's Daylesford Organics business hit the national press last month (well the Mail OnLine at least!) with news that its customer database had been hacked, apparently by a Russian-speaking gang called the 'Snatch Team'. The Oxford Times then reported that the gang, probably using 'ransomware' hidden in email attachments, tried to blackmail Daylesford, but the company refused to pay. Data, including customer order sheets for wealthy clients, was then uploaded to the 'dark web'. Daylesford (whose clients - the Oxford Times said - include the Duchess of York, Tim Henman, and Jeremy Clarkson) said no personal information had been compromised. The 'Snatch Team' allegedly hacked McDonald's earlier this year - so no class distinctions here! So it's watch out Chippy! Our town businesses, whether butchers, bakers or candlestick makers, could be next and might need to brush up on their 'spyware'!





West Oxfordshire District Council, working with developer Green Axis, are planning this with their 'Net Zero Carbon Tool Kit' - using renewable energy generated on-site and natural materials with embodied carbon. The includes space for community activities such as growing food and composting, provision for electric vehicle charging and car club. It's

'custom build' compared to a conventional new build but more 'hands-off' than traditional self-build. Each home can be configured and personalised to match buyers' lifestyles and design preferences - e.g. choices such as two or three bedrooms, different footprints, options for ground floor or first floor, or three storey living! There are different floor plans, a range of choices on external materials, internal finishes, joinery, kitchens, and bathrooms. WODC has used Section 106 funds allowing a 20% discount on market rates, offered exclusively to local buyers who meet eligibility criteria. The agents say the 'exemplar scheme will demonstrate how zero carbon affordable homes can respond to both climate emergency and the interests of local people wishing to customise their new home'. 

More ding-dong at Diddly

Jeremy Clarkson's planning battle with WODC has entered a new round of what's becoming a marathon Ding-Dong. Here's a quick reminder and an update:



- DING! WODC refuse permission in January for a café/restaurant in a defunct lambing shed next to Diddly Squat Farm Shop.
- DONG! Jeremy Clarkson announces he's discovered a 'cunning planning loophole', shop and café continue, but added are three-course meals also being served in a further separate barn and even a pizza place popping up.
- DING! WODC serves an Enforcement Notice in August against a 'mixed agricultural and leisure attraction' of café, restaurant, gift/farm shop, parking, and lavatory facilities. The Notice requires: the café/restaurant and sale of food and drink to stop; the sale of goods in the farm shop produced beyond 16 miles to stop; landscaping at the further barn, lavatories, tables, chairs, parasols and units for preparing food or drink to be removed. And within 6 weeks. This doesn't happen. The reason?
- DONG! Another cunning planning loophole? Consultants lodge an Appeal against the Enforcement Notice, claiming that planning permission should be granted, it is not a mixed agriculture and leisure attraction, there is no breach of planning because it is Permitted Development, the

Enforcement Notice was not correctly served, the steps required go beyond what is lawful and, anyway, six weeks is too short a time. Whilst waiting for a Planning Inspector to decide the Appeal, the activities can continue.

So, this Ding-Dong looks set to carry on for quite some time; other Appeals in the area are still waiting to be heard by an Inspector three years after being lodged. Some might treat this as just a game, but it is a game at the expense of WODC council tax payers, and that's all of us!

Rustic Bean comes to Chippy

November sees the opening of The Rustic Bean coffee house – next door to The Fox Inn in the formerly empty No I Market Place (vacated by Mash Pantry). A News team member caught up with the entrepreneur behind it – Stacy Parsons (pictured below) – at his current 'Rustic Bean' in Banbury.

With winter fast approaching, we can be tempted by the aroma of steaming coffee, hot chocolate, baked goods, and a warm and welcoming place to set up a laptop or meet friends. The opening of The Rustic Bean in Chippy will complete a trio of cafes created by Stacy Parsons, a man who knows how to brew a cup with a difference, his coffee machines being

identical to that used at the World Barista Championships. 'Our coffee beans come from Square Mile Coffee Roasters in London,' Stacy explains. 'Every shot of coffee is weighed and then precisely extracted to make the perfect coffee. If it isn't to our standard it's simply thrown away and made again. You can also buy resale coffee beans to take home.'

Before he opened his first café, Stacy made his living as a soul singer, which kept him busy most nights! 'It wasn't something I felt I would do forever' Stacy smiled. 'I love people, and enjoyed meeting friends in coffee shops in London. I often thought it would be fun to open one.' He said the experience with his first Rustic Bean taught him to use space effectively, instinctively creating the ambiance for wellbeing of both customers and staff behind the counter. 'After I opened The Rustic Bean on Banbury's Parsons Street, the creators of Lock 29 asked if I would like to open another

coffee shop there, so I designed it during lockdown and built the premises with my uncle. I've always loved design and branding from working as a graphic designer in my twenties.'

The Chippy branch (pictured below) should radiate the same warmth and cosiness as the Banbury Rustic Bean, with Stacy's signature reclaimed vintage Singer sewing machine tables. But he also hinted at a few surprises. Look out for a



homey and welcoming atmosphere, a mixed playlist of relaxing background music, enticing food, and the now famous Rustic Bean coffee – aiming to be one of Chippy's favourite meeting places. Also

planned are fresh smoothies, similar to those at 'The Rustic Bean Juice'd' in Lock 29 in Banbury's Castle Quay, plus gluten free/vegan cakes and tray bakes made by Paul from 'Cotswold Baking' just outside Chipping Norton. In February, Stacy will add cooked breakfasts and brunches. Stacy brings an independent mind, eye for rustic charm, and vision for well-being, saying 'It's always been about my brand – customer service, ambiance and quality of coffee'.

Beckham's security warning



Could securing your Chipping Norton home be on your mind – especially as the nights get darker? Local celebrity couple in Tew, David and Victoria Beckham, hit the news with plans for a 'security cabin' at their grand mansion. Local village

residents wrote to WODC in support, one telling the press 'during these troubled times, I feel that any extra-security measures are welcome and will deter undesirable elements from venturing into our lovely little village'. So should we be worried in Chipping Norton? Well, in fact, Thames Valley police have been highlighting more criminal damage and theft recently – and over August there were 107 recorded crimes of which 30 were all forms of theft, burglary and criminal damage around Chippy (see below for Latest crime in Chipping Norton).

Now, not many of us will be able to commission a specialised cabin, but there's lots of advice on making your own home more secure, especially with double locks, windows locks, and alarms. Here are three other suggestions. First, invest in a parcel delivery box. The Beckham's cabin helps 'monitor deliveries' but for the more ordinary folk around here, this could be a parcel delivery box. These are large waterproof boxes which have codes on them, for deliveries to be stored in safely. Second, fix your outdoor lights, ideally with timers and sensors, and make sure the bulbs are working. Thirdly, be careful when posting on social media. Adding a location to your posts shows eagle-eyed tech-savvy thieves that you're either at home or not. Even the Beckhams are known to post on social media 'from the Cotswolds'. Make your social media settings private if you are away! More advice at www.police.uk/cp/crime-prevention/protect-home-crime/.

Latest crime in Chippy

At October's Town Council meeting, Chippy Councillors told the visiting police officer that they weren't given regular crime statistics. In fact, latest data for the Chipping Norton area on crimes and outcomes is readily available on the police.uk website, and the *Chippy News* regularly reports it. For example, 107 crimes were recorded for August, including:

 Violence and sexual offences 	34
• Burglaries, robberies & all thefts	21
Public order	17
Antisocial behaviour	14
Criminal damage and arson	9
Vehicle crime	6
• Drugs	2
Other	4

Police told Councillors they had dealt recently with particular incidents of underage drinking and antisocial behaviour. However, the stubbornly highest category (violence & sexual offences) is mainly crime 'hidden indoors' with domestic abuse. The Government is also shining a light on burglaries, getting police chiefs to promise that all break-ins will get a police visit. Only 5% of burglaries nationally result in criminal charges. In the last three years in Chipping Norton around 65% of all crimes resulted in no prosecution or no suspect identified; many others still remain 'under investigation'.

Restoring the 4 Shire Stone

If you drive from Chippy to Moreton, watch out on the right to see the now restored ancient Four Shire Stone, which is said to have inspired The Lord of the Rings author, J.R.R. Tolkien. The News covered the story a few months back after James Hayman-Joyce, a local semi-retired chartered surveyor led the campaign to raise £20,000 for the restoration. The 15ft high pillar, around a mile and a half from Moreton in Marsh, marked the ancient convergence of the counties of Gloucestershire, Warwickshire, Oxfordshire and Worcestershire until a government reorganisation of the county boundaries in 1931. Mystery surrounds the exact date the stone was built – possibly around 1741. It had a colourful history and was a well-known meeting point and a venue for illegal prize fights in the 1800s. A frequent visitor locally, Tolkien may have used it as inspiration for the Three Farthing Stone of the Shire. Details www.fourshirestone.org.uk.

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Help this winter

As the cost of living soars and winter looms, there's no doubt that this is a worrying time for us all. The Government's energy schemes have started, Oxfordshire County Council has announced £2m for local support, working with District Councils. Chipping Norton Town Council is asking higher authorities to help freeze social rents, and stop any evictions or energy disconnections through lack of funds. Many community organisations are helping. Here are some pointers for Chipping Norton's hard up households.

HELP IN TROUBLED TIMES

Help for all at Citizens Advice A good place to start if you are struggling, Citizens Advice West Oxfordshire has trained volunteers offering free, confidential and independent advice. They help people overcome their problems with debt, housing and much more. They can point you in the right direction, advocate on your behalf if you need them to, and help with vouchers to pay for things like food and utilities, and with school costs such as uniform and transport. WELFARE AND ENERGY HELP

Oxfordshire County Council are pointing the way to both welfare and energy costs



welfare and energy costs savings, although they admit this is a challenge. OCC are mobilisation funds of £500,000 per year with an **Emergency Welfare**

Scheme run through their customer services team – funded largely by central Government's Household Support Fund. Some funding also goes to local **Warm Spaces** initiatives including by businesses.

The Government's Energy Bills Support Scheme has started, including £400 automatically off each household bill and price rate caps. The County Council is also supporting more schemes to help local residents reduce bills by making household and energy efficiency improvements. The Better

Housing Better Health programme aims particularly to reach fuel poor households with advice on reducing energy costs. You can phone 0800 107 0044 to arrange an assessment at your home. There are also Sustainable Warmth Fund grants, offering free financial help for improvements such as loft and floor insulation. Finally, ask your energy supplier, such as British Gas about help with payments and grants.

OCC also points to local organisations you can talk to – particularly if you have mental health and anxiety issues – including **Oxfordshire Safe Haven**, **Connection Support** and **Mind**. See www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/council/help-rising-living-costs for lots more information.

After 23 years of leading the Lawrence Home Nursing Team Jenny has decided to retire. 

Chippy's 18th century inheritance



Local historian Jan Cliffe has published her sixth book about Chipping Norton which started as a 'lockdown' project inspired by transcribing an C18th will and inventory. Margaret Bradley's Inheritance is an account of a shopkeeping family in our town. Thomas Bradley arrived in Chipping Norton with his wife in 1702 and soon established himself as a tallow chandler with a house and shop on High Street,

becoming a burgess in the borough corporation. When his spinster daughter Margaret died in 1775 her estate was valued for probate at £16,800, a surprisingly large sum worth over £2 million today. Her inventory contained detailed information about the contents of the house, shop and a vast property portfolio. Using other contemporary historical documents, Jan describes the way of life led by this family in a rural market town in the Georgian era. 



challenge.' There are dangerous cows, grain trailers to be loaded, and that 'local planning department and the red trouser brigade determined to frustrate his schemes.'



The real Richard Whittington – who died in 1423 – was not as lowly a person as portrayed. The son of a Gloucestershire landowner, he made his fortune as a mercer, trading in wool and other luxury fabrics. Apparently he was well in with Richard II, Henry IV and Henry V by lending them money and was Mayor of London three times. It does seem that he was a thoroughly nice person: after his death, his vast fortune was used to fund philanthropic projects, including an almshouse, a prison refurbishment and a block of public lavatories! Most shocking of all, he probably didn't own a cat.

CHARG's Archaeological Finds Day

Roman coins, buckles and pottery were among the fascinating objects brought in by local residents for the Archaeological Finds Day in Chipping Norton Museum on 8 October.

Organised by the Museum and Chipping Norton Archaeological Research Group (CHARG) this was a great opportunity for anyone interested in ancient history to discover more about the objects



they'd found in their gardens or local fields. The Finds Liaison Officer (FLO) for Oxfordshire, Edward Caswell, who represents the nationwide Portable Antiquities Scheme is pictured above helping to identify artefacts. He was joined by archaeologist Paul Booth who specialises in Roman pottery and the County Archaeologist Richard Oram, who has been supporting CHARG for the last three years.

Among the objects identified were: a 15th Century scatter gun shot from the Civil War, a coin dating to the reign of Henry III, a small Roman brooch, a 16th Century scabbard fixing, and a Roman coin or number from 307–351AD.

The aim of the Day was to gather information about the Town's past which is particularly relevant in the light of recent discoveries at the East Chipping Norton Development Site. The report of archaeologists employed by developers Cala Homes is not yet published but it is likely to indicate that a substantial Roman settlement once occupied the site.

Edward Caswell was enthusiastic about the day: 'It's been really rewarding. The objects have been brilliant, but the gold is that CHARG has drummed up so much support from local people who are interested in their historic past.' Following this success, another Finds Day is to be held soon.

Rob White, Vice President of the HMS Hood Association, had the floor. Known as The Mighty Hood, HMS Hood was a British warship sunk by the German battleship Bismarck in the Denmark Strait on 24 May 1941. Tragically, only three of



the 1,418 hands were saved, making it the worst loss of life from a single British warship. A ship's bell is symbolic of the vessel and is at the heart of the workings of the watches that set the rhythm of life afloat. In 2012 there was a failed attempt to recover HMS Hood's bell from the deep water where she lay; a later attempt, with more modern equipment, succeeded. The bell was unveiled at an emotional ceremony by the Princess Royal in 2015 and is now on display at the National Museum of the Royal Navy in Portsmouth.

Spotlight on Horticulture

If you have a love of gardening, why not come and share an enjoyable evening with the Chipping Norton Horticultural Association? This month, members shine a spotlight on this longstanding club.



We are one of the oldest associations in the Town and recently become affiliated with the Royal Horticultural Association (RHS). Meetings are held during the winter months on each 3rd Wednesday in the Methodist Church Hall at 7.30pm.

Over around 156 years since forming, the Association has had several name changes, was suspended in 1940, and reformed after WWII in 1948 and encouraged to support the 'surplus crop scheme' — no more details available. Meetings and local shows continued until 1996 but shows then stopped through lack of support and financial losses.

Around then, it was relaunched as the Chipping Norton Horticultural Association, more as a gardening club, and grew from strength to strength. By 2020 there were 90 paid-up members but then Covid hit the world and, like many other organisations, numbers declined and now stand at around 50/60. 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

Ambulances had better days

You say that 'rural areas . . . have always had lower performance for response times' etc. ('Ambulance Services inadequate' - p5 October News). It was not always thus. Prior to Trust status, Oxfordshire Ambulance service had ten stations around the County, of which Chipping Norton was one. The response time target for rural areas was 20 minutes, in a time with no Satnav and before the M40 was opened. With seven paramedics and one long-serving technician, we met that target. We had emergency cover for the area from 0700-2300hrs, plus an overlap crew 0900-1700. Even when the A44 Chipping Norton to Woodstock stretch was deemed to be one of the most dangerous roads in the region, with a serious collision most weeks, we saved many lives. In 1996, I was named UK paramedic of the Year for my part in one such incident. When the idea of closing stations was first proposed, I challenged management, as it didn't take a genius to work out that an ambulance from a centralised station in Kidlington was NEVER going to meet the 20-minute target. As a result, management destroyed my career, and much besides, for daring to speak out. It seems that in the intervening years, NOTHING has been learned. Those managers and politicians who have brought about an ambulance service that is failing and putting lives at risk should hang their heads in shame. They won't of course - they will simply spout more meaningless rhetoric.

Former Mayor Albert Swann



Mr David Nobbs of Chipping Norton Museum suggested that your readers might assist me with my research on Albert Swann, Bandmaster and Mayor of Chipping Norton. I am constructing a biography, having recently become the custodian of his military medals, and also wish to understand the environment in which he and his family lived. I understand Albert was a native of Chipping Norton, leaving the Town

aged 17 to join the army in 1893. He had by all accounts a colourful yet challenging life, serving in the Durham Light Infantry in the Boer War and with the Indian Volunteer Artillery Company in Mesopotamia during the Great War. He subsequently forged a musical career in India serving in the Governor of Bombay's Band as a Sergeant Bandmaster and thereafter as Bandmaster at the Lawrence RM School in India. On his army retirement, he returned to Chipping Norton, c1926, and became active in the Town initially becoming conductor of the Brotherhood Orchestra and then forming the Chipping Norton Borough Band as Director. Living at the Mason Hall, he was elected to the Town's Council and was Mayor on three separate occasions, the last in 1946.

I haven't to date found a picture of Albert with the bands he created in Chipping Norton nor much as to his character, hence my asking about his involvement in local government and the Town's musical development. Essential details might include his date of death, an obituary or where he and his wife are buried. The fate of Chippy's butterflies

As an ex-Chippy man, I was fascinated to read your note from Richard Dixon (October News) about the lack of butterflies in Chipping Norton. In the 1950s and early 1960s, I was one of a small group who studied butterflies and moths in the area. Our main haunts were Glyme Lane, Old Chalford area and Sarsgrove Woods, and we did indeed have the Duke of Burgundy and Pearl-bordered Fritillaries mentioned in your

article. There were also Dark-green and Silver-washed Fritillary, Small Blue, Dingy Skipper, Grizzled Skipper and Wall Brown. These species had died out by the time I moved away in the late 1960s and in every case the cause was either habitat destruction or climate change - for example by a new conifer plantation replacing the habitat (several species), an unimproved field ploughed (dark Green Fritillary), a quarry filled in (Small Blue) or global warming (Wall Brown).

It's not all bad news though. I live in the Stroud area where all the species mentioned (except Wall Brown) still flourish. From my window, I can see one of the Large Blue reintroduction habitats, a species I helped to reintroduce. Residents can make a huge difference by letting an area of their lawn grow throughout the summer. Many wild flowers will soon establish themselves, followed quite soon by butterflies such as the Meadow Brown. Most species actually feed on grass - simply cut it at the end of the summer and remove the clippings. I have recorded 33 species of butterfly in our garden. You CAN make a difference. We need to get out of the habit of pouring chemicals on to our lawns and cutting the grass to within a millimetre of its life. Our garden is a blaze of colour, buzzing with wildlife throughout the summer. I call it our tidy wild garden. (from a longer letter)

Looking after our birds

As a local birder and representative for the British Trust for Ornithology, can I send a reminder regarding bird-feeding hygiene? As the weather turns colder, many of us put out treats for the birds and, being more confined to the indoors, it is great to see our colourful visitors. It is best to put out purpose-bought seeds or peanuts rather than food waste which might attract the wrong sort of visitor. The BTO has reminded us that with avian diseases around we should be extra careful to keep the bird-feeding stations clean. If possible, relocate feeders and wash feeders in warm soapy water regularly. Even if you don't feed, a suitable container for water is appreciated but again, clean regularly and refresh daily. If you do see sick or dead garden wildlife, you can report it to

www.gardenwildlifehealth.org who are doing research into the health of garden birds. It is best not to touch dead birds and always wash your hands after feeding your garden birds.
