# 5 May Local Election Candidates

#### **Chipping Norton Town Council**

You have two votes for two vacant seats (out of 16). One year remaining of a four-year term.



Steve Akers – Labour Party Steve has lived in Chippy for over 20 years. He will be known to many residents for his campaigning work, most recently against sewage pollution to our rivers. He worked closely with Eve Coles in defence of our Hospital as a member of the Hospital Action Group, and against Tory cuts to our public services. He was a key member of

the Save the Ace Centre Campaign. Steve has worked for the NHS and for UNISON. He will bring a wide range of campaigning, negotiating and organising skills to the Town Council. He is married with two teenage sons.



Scott Fisher – Independent I've lived in Chipping Norton for many years and have seen many changes in that time - some for the better, but not all. I wish to encourage a greater sense of community and firmly believe Chippy can be a better place to live and work if more people get involved in the life of the Town. Local facilities such as public amenities, charities and recreation

facilities would all benefit from greater community involvement. Issues such as housing, public transport and traffic etc, all need improving and, in some cases, fighting to protect. If I am elected, I will bring determination, accountability and transparency to the position.



Chris Knowles – The Conservative Party I moved to Chippy in 2010. Always interested in the welfare of the town, I have worked with Chipping Norton Health Centre, banning HGVs from the town, and promoting business facilities for East Chipping Norton. The latest ECN plan must solve traffic problems as well as houses, and do so now, not in another 10

years. There is local discussion about a long-term vision for Chippy, but we need short term action now, not another opportunity for delaying progress into the unknown future. Discussion about a relief road started in 1968, only 54 years ago. Absolutely not good enough.



Sharon Wheaton – Labour Party I have lived in Chipping Norton for six years, before that in Little Compton. Chippy has always been my go-to town and it is special to me because it is a community made up of vibrant, freethinking people; it is a town with values. As a young mum of two, I set up a mail-order business and then went on to run an

independent art gallery. I believe that my financial and business experience would be useful to other independent traders seeking to take up and retain their rightful place in our High Street, as well as to the Town Council's broader agenda.

#### **West Oxfordshire District Council**

Voting is for one of three Chipping Norton Ward seats, each a four-year term.



Ivan Aguado Melet – Liberal Democrat The candidate for the Chipping Norton ward District Council seat for the Liberal Democrat Party will be Ivan Aguado Melet. Ivan, (46 yrs old) is a horse trainer and equestrian working nearby in Churchill where he lives. He believes passionately in animal welfare and environmental issues. He has lived in the

area for seven years and supports the Chipping Norton Theatre as well as the local independent shops, restaurants and cafés as the heart of the local economy. He is also a keen gardener and believes we should support sustainable farming and the promotion of local produce. Ivan will work to support young people and welcomes the youth service coming back this year. Ivan is engaging and easy to talk to, a great listener and willing to act to get things done on behalf of all residents.



Rizvana Poole - Labour & Cooperative Party Hi! I'm Rizvana Poole and I live near the Town Centre with my husband and two sons, one at primary school and the other at secondary. I've served on Chipping Norton Town Council for three years and one of the reasons why I am standing for election to the District is to support Geoff and Mike in their efforts

to get the two Councils to work more effectively together. Provision for our young people needs to be a high priority and I secured funding from the County for two years and the Chipping Norton Youth club opened its doors last month. The crisis in Ukraine has shown how willingly and generously our community will come together given enthusiastic leadership. Chippy Larder is a community hub where people can obtain help and advice — or just have a chat. If elected. I want to work with others to make more things happen.



Emma Leeming – The Conservative Party Emma is married to Wayne, with two children, Lily who is 6 and Arthur, 3 and the family live in Carterton. Emma has worked and lived in West Oxfordshire for over 25 years. Since moving here she has seen the political landscape in Chipping Norton change from Labour to Conservative and back to Labour. Having

spoken to residents recently she understands the frustration the people of Chipping Norton feel at not being listened to. She will work with local people to get their voices heard and be available to speak to anyone should they have any concerns. Emma believes that action must be taken on HGV's travelling through the centre of town, the tragic fatal accident recently highlights how unsafe the narrow High Street is. Emma supports plans to solve traffic problems in Chipping Norton and if elected in May, she pledges to be a strong voice for the Town.

# **Ukraine support & refugees**

March and April saw Chipping Norton respond to the Ukrainian crisis. First up were local groups, schools and individuals collecting essential supplies for humanitarian relief. Loaded trucks made it to Poland - including from the Chippy Larder, with its organiser Rizvana Poole joined by Bruern Farm's Henry Astor and our ex-MP David Cameron sharing the driving.

Attention has now turned to offering support and accommodation to refugees arriving in the UK. Val Parker, Chair of the Charlbury Refugee Action Group (CRAG), told the News how local support is being marshalled. She said 'At the time of writing, at least seven Charlbury families and others in Chipping Norton and surrounding villages are preparing to welcome Ukrainian guests. CRAG is becoming a central point for co-ordinating our local response and disseminating information and advice to those who wish to help. Individuals and community groups are coming forward with offers such as hairdressing, riding, therapy, cooking meals, language teaching, interpreting and social events. It is heartwarming to see so many volunteers coming together to provide sanctuary and welcome.'

https://bit.ly/crag-ukraine. It could be that you are willing to offer transport to appointments, that you speak Russian or Ukrainian, or have a TEFL certificate. Maybe you could help families register with a school or take them to the Polish shop in Witney to buy supplies. There is a myriad of ways in which help will be welcome. Meanwhile CRAG continues with fundraising - including for other global refugee challenges. (More in Clubs on page 29). A local quiz team from the Chequers, Chipping Norton has





# Town traffic and safety issues

March's urgent Ton Hall meeting saw Oxfordshire's Cabinet member Duncan Enright and Chippy Cllr Geoff Saul hear over 100 people raise traffic pollution, congestion and safety issues. As reported in April's News, top was a 20+ year wait for OCC to find a proper solution to HGVs and heavy traffic through town. 400 HGVs drive through Chippy each day. One strong view insisted 'No Masterplan for 1000+ new homes' until a traffic solution is agreed and fully funded. OCC, as major landowner, should use some of their land sale £millions to do this. The two councillors said work was continuing on options. The audience had many ideas for town safety, including: traffic lights at the top of New Street; changing junction layouts; dealing with Horsefair's narrow pavements; extending 40mph limits to the Shell garage; extending new 20mph limits beyond the town centre up to or beyond schools; educating haulage associations; and dealing with dangerous crossings such as at ACE Centre and Albion Street.

enforcement was also needed. Cameras and penalties for breaking 20mph limits needed with action, police backing. There is a Speedwatch camera available for volunteers to use but it needs

championing, coordination, training and police help to work. Contact the Town Council for information. One menace was noise and disruption from motorbikes, HGVs and

'performance cars' parading through town. One practical idea could deploy 'acoustic cameras' (currently used in France) to penalise excess noise. Cllr Enright mooted that Chippy might close to traffic more regularly, as in France, for community events! So what action? Cllr Mark Walker, on our Traffic Advisory Committee, acknowledged that there had been more 'engagement' on this by OCC since last year's local elections. OCC was now aiming to prioritise cyclists and pedestrians. Cllr Enright said they were listening and would be back for another meeting in six weeks. But all this will need real plans, funding and action. Watch this space.

# More delay for East Chippy plan



It'll be a while before the bulldozers move on to Tank Farm, allocated for 1.000+ homes as East Chipping Norton with another delay in the main 'Masterplanning' process which is being led by the main landowner, Oxfordshire County Council. They had

set up a Liaison Group, involving the other major landowner Cala Homes, plus representatives from third landowner Field Reeves, Town Council, William Fowler Trust whose allotments are probably affected by the new road, and some community representatives. The first meeting on 31 March set out their intended rapid process, first to get a broad-brush Masterplan for the whole site agreed by WODC before summer, followed by individual detailed applications for each phase. There would be no overall outline planning application for the whole site, and potentially no total site Environmental Assessment. All an unusual process and not one welcomed by the Town Council.

The Liaison Group's next fortnightly meeting, looking at green issues, was set for 14 April. But just before it, attendees were told the Masterplan process was to be 'paused' until some other further survey work had been concluded. Town Councillors were told that there may have been unexpected archaeological findings, but confirmation is awaited from the developer's team. Public consultation events programmed for May seem now seem unlikely. The *Chipping Norton News* was expecting to advertise these events, but no details have yet been received.

But, meanwhile, behind the scenes, the Town Council are putting in a lot of work to feed ideas from the Town into the Masterplanning. Their own Working Group, meeting regularly and using the skills and knowledge of local people, is full of ideas as to how this big urban extension should be designed and relate to the existing town. Early thoughts include protecting the sensitive biodiversity of the Glyme Valley, ensuring sufficient open space, particularly sports pitches, and ensuring any allotments lost to the new road are re-provided. These will all be put to the landowners. # **Annual Town Meeting: 23 May**

Everyone in Chipping Norton is invited to attend a Community Meeting to be held at 7pm on Monday 23 May in the Upper Town Hall, facilitated by the Town Council on behalf of the electorate. This is not a Council meeting, but an



official Annual Parish Meeting of the Town's citizens as an opportunity for residents to raise and discuss matters affecting the Town, and about the future. Registered electors are entitled to vote on any resolutions proposed. The meeting is legally required to be held between March and May at the end of the Civic Year. Because of Covid, this official meeting has not been held for two years, but the Town Council organised a Community Meeting last October which covered similar ground.

A Town Council statement said, 'The Mayor will open the meeting and the Town Council committee chairs will present brief reports to let you know what the Council has been working on for the last year, and its future plans. We also hope to have local groups and organisations with information stalls at the Town Hall. If you are interested, please get in touch with us. Residents are encouraged to take part in the public question session, which will focus on the East Chipping Norton Development. If you have any questions you would like to raise, it would be helpful if they could be submitted in advance of the meeting. You can submit your questions by letter or send an email to the Deputy Town Clerk deputyclerk@chippingnorton-tc.gov.uk or in writing to the Guildhall. The agenda will be published on our website, noticeboards, and on the Chipping Norton Town Council's Facebook event page.

# Town Council starts new year

Chipping Norton Town Council holds its first full Council meeting of its Civic Year at 7.15 on Monday 16 May in the Upper Town Hall. Two new Councillors, elected on 5 May, will be able to attend making 16 in total. This is the 'Annual Meeting of the Council' where

the Mayor and Deputy for the year will be nominated and elected, and new Committees will be agreed. The public are welcome to attend and can speak at the 'Public Participation' agenda item if they request this of the Town Clerk in advance. After two disruptive years with Covid and staffing, the Town Council moves forward with a full plan for services and projects. The budget (from April for 12 months) has increased, with a 5% increase in Council Tax, and some planned use of reserves. However, the Finance Committee heard in April that spending for the year ending March 2022 was lower than budgeted, with over £60,000 likely to be

added back to reserves and carried forward. Considerable work, for example, on the Town Hall repairs, will still need to take place. The Town Council also aim to increase public engagement with an imminent new website and plans to start a regular newsletter also available free online. was the recipient of massive pre-race publicity. A feature on national BBC News, articles in the press and much hype by ITV Racing's Alice Plunkett (breeder/owner Marietta Fox-Pitt's daughter-in-law) dominated the week before the world's most famous

steeplechase. A grey 10-year-old mare, Snow Leopardess had a foal whilst off with injury and had been nursed back to peak health by Marietta, Charlie and her loyal lass Jess Benfield. Charlie's brother-in-law, Ben Pauling, now based at Naunton Downs near Bourton on the Water had his first runner in the race with Kildisart.

But maybe one runner with local connections had got overlooked in all the hype. Amateur jockey Sam Waley-Cohen, whose family live at Upton Stud near Banbury, has previously won six times over the National fences. Having announced his retirement earlier at the meeting, he knew he was riding his very last race over the famous fences. His horse, Noble Yeats, won at 50/1. His father, Robert, owns the horse so it was very much a family affair. Snow Leopardess's jockey, Aidan Coleman decided that Snow Leopardess was not enjoying the race and pulled her up at the 17th fence whilst James Bowen aboard Kildisart got unseated at The Chair. Both the horses were reported to be safe and sound after the race.

# **Over Norton Road closure**

Part of Over Norton Road will be closed on 7 and 8 May for resurfacing work. Stagecoach have said their Route 50 will have to run a different way. Buses will run via A3400 and Banbury Rd between Long Compton and Chipping Norton. Bus stops on Over Norton Rd and in Over Norton village

will not be served. The 488 to Banbury is also likely to be affected.

# Chippy's national cycling start

Put Saturday II June in the diary for a Chippy cycling bonanza! The 2022 Women's Tour, Britain's biggest and longest running international women's cycling stage race, will end with a spectacular Oxfordshire finale in June. Over 100 professional riders will complete the 90 mile Stage 6 starting in Chipping Norton, then going via Carterton, Faringdon and Didcot to the finish line in Oxford City. Race organiser Sweetspot have a three-year partnership with Oxfordshire councils, and this stage visits parts of the County not featured before. Race Director Mick Bennett promised the 'beautiful market town of Chipping Norton' would 'put on a show' to start the stage. WODC's leader Michele Mead was delighted, saying, 'Chipping Norton is already a popular destination for visitors; this event will give a great boost to local businesses and traders as well as showcasing the beauty of our District.'



The Women's Tour is the UK's first international stage race for women, bringing the world's top riders to compete in Great Britain as a part of the UCI Women's World Tour. It attracts an annual roadside audience of 300,000, as well as over three million media fans. Last year, in Banbury and Bicester, large crowds and cycling enthusiasts turned out. Chipping Norton Town Council were consulted on the plans and welcomed the event coming to the Town Centre. Organisers hope that local schools and clubs will be inspiring

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everyone to organise cycling, sport and fitness lessons. Town Cllr Mark Walker, an active cyclist, will be working with colleagues and Transition Chipping Norton on their 'Cycling Chippy' initiative to promote cycling even more in Chippy with events in and around 11 June. Further details, including the Women's Tour Oxfordshire stage full route, locations and timetables, will follow in due course.


# Out helping to Fix our Streets



Last month the News reported on the new 'Fix My Street Super User' scheme asking for volunteers to train up to report pothole and kerb damage and directly initiate action by the County Council. Chippy's Deputy Mayor Sandra Coleman was pleased to see the article - she had already signed up to join, but was worried she couldn't cover the whole town - 'we need more!' Sandra explained that trained local residents, who know the local issues,

can mark up potholes in side streets and pavements and report direct to the County works team to fill them quickly. This removes the need for a County Officer to come, inspect and then authorise action. Sandra joined other volunteers for one hour of Zoom training - then a walk around streets with a trainer, complete with fluorescent jackets and spray cans, looking for suitable potholes.

In practice, she said, although there were many potholes, relatively few actually met the strict criteria for this scheme. Potholes have to be quite large - 40mm deep by 150mm across in two directions, or 20mm deep on pavements. Sandra has been eyeing up the cavities along Churchill Road, but A and B roads are not included for the volunteer work, probably for safety reasons. These, and other poor road surface issues, have to be discussed with the Highways officer for separate repair. The Leys, however, did provide a suitable culprit. It was duly marked with white spray paint, a works order was raised, and the pothole should be fixed in 28 days. Sandra added 'If you would like to help, you will need to contact volunteercoordinationscheme@oxfordshire.gov.uk.

# Special award for FarmED

farming FarmED, the sustainable education centre near Shipton under Wychwood, has received special recognition for sustainability in the Civic Trust Awards. It was one of 45 projects Farm ED selected this year by the Civic Trust FARM & FOOD EDUCATION



whose awards are the longest-standing architectural in the built environment awards in Europe. The award, jointly with architects Timothy Tasker, was for exemplary work in design, material selection, construction methods, long-term energy consumption, et al. The architecture reflects FarmED's mission with sustainable materials, local craftsmanship regeneration and carbon efficiency in the design. Research by the University of Bath helped Timothy Tasker meet neutral carbon targets. All buildings are powered by air source heat pumps and solar energy. Sheep wool was used for roof and wall insulation and special roofing allows maximum heat in winter but deflects the sun in summer. Ian Wilkinson, founder of FarmED, said, 'We are very excited: around every corner, there is something exciting happening; we encourage people to come and visit.'

#### Rodents under the bonnet!



The perils of living in rural Chippy! Returning from a few weeks away in the sun, local resident and member of the News Team Charlotte Bird made a starting discovery in her car — and tells a

cautionary tale for others. In the olden days some of us veteran drivers were drilled in regularly checking under the bonnet of oil, batteries, water, especially in old bangers with leaky radiators. Fast forward to the modern automobile. Everything is computerised, sealed and too clever by half'. Charlotte's tale continued, 'No-one told the rodents! Mice, rats and squirrels see your engine as fair game - a nice warm place to spend cold winter nights. How do I know this? To my cost sadly. Returning from sunny Cape Verde, the little \*\*\*\* had lined up a nice welcome home present. Despite the car seeing regular use in my absence, a four legged saboteur chewed through the fuel pipe. When I switched on the ignition diesel poured onto the ground. An RAC Knight in Shining Armour diagnosed the problem immediately, also pointing to plastic casing around electric wires that had been snacked upon. His sharp intake of breath led to saying "we are seeing many more examples of this", apparently really costly depending on the extent of the chewing. I later found out that, in extreme cases, vehicles are written off. After two weeks the correct (very expensive) fuel pipe on my trusty Dacia had been sourced and my car was ready to collect. All I needed to do was hand over £550. The moral is to, still, check under your bonnet regularly. You have been warned!!'

# Chippy's birth unit concerns

Concerns are being raised that Chipping Norton's highly valued midwife-led Cotswolds Birth Unit has now been closed to births for seven months —



apparently still because of wider staffing issues, mainly at the main JR Hospital Oxford. Midwives at Chippy's unit, as well as the other small midwife-led unit in Wantage, have, for months, been reassigned to Oxford or Banbury. Staffing issues with Covid were mentioned but, like many maternity units across the UK, there have been continued problems recruiting sufficient midwives and other trained staff. In recent years, the consultant-led service at Banbury's Horton Hospital was also 'centralised' to Oxford because of difficulties recruiting obstetrics consultants.

Oxford University Hospitals Trust was asked to update Oxfordshire's Health Scrutiny Committee in March about progress with their waiting list and access issues, and their written report actually said that they 'aimed to reopen' Chippy's unit in March. But a senior manager immediately said that this was 'dependent on staffing' and they could not give a reopening date. The News asked OUH for a statement. They said, 'we aim to re-open these units as soon as we can do so

safely'. They insist that patient safety overall must be their priority and they remain 'disappointed' the situation is still the same. They said the home birth service is still available. Staff at Chippy's unit have found themselves working busy shifts at JR — one staff member indicated to the *Chippy News* that they still have no plans for reopening. They, contrary to the OUH statement, also said that women planning homebirths are 'frequently told there isn't enough staff' and they will need to attend the JR. They added, 'as a team we are becoming increasingly concerned about the situation, and the support of the local community would be much appreciated'. The *News* has asked OUH for a further statement.

# Finance wizards in Chippy barn




Many people imagine successful financial institutions housed in shiny skyscrapers in Canary Wharf. However, on 12 March, The Times ran a double page spread about a very successful home-grown business in Chipping Norton situated in converted Cotswold barns just outside the Town. In 1992, Chippy resident Tony Yarrow founded Wise Investments followed by Wise Funds in 2004. Tony and his artist wife Judith have lived here for many years, brought up their children in Chippy and, among his other recent roles, Tony is Chair of the Lawrence Home Nursing Team. In addition, in 2009 Tony's son Hugh (previously a fund manager at Rathbones) and son-inlaw Ben Peters (an ex-physicist) co-founded the Evenlode Income Fund here, which has been one of Britain's best performing income funds over the last five years and now manages £3.28 billion. Since then, the business has also launched the Evenlode Global and Evenlode Global Equity funds.

The companies are employee-owned along the John Lewis model and staffed by enthusiastic local people who enjoy living and working here and avoid the daily, crowded London commute. Two of the fund managers and two of the operations team are ex-Chippy school pupils - a tribute to the School's Maths department. Although they work hard, they have the benefit of the surrounding countryside where they can take occasional stress-busting lunchtime walks. The Times reporter commented on the calm atmosphere on a day of high stock market tension (which settled later in the day). He also mentioned the chickens (in fact pheasants) in the car park, the Yarrows' beekeeping and the use of Ben's Tesla rather than flying for business trips abroad. The media image of fund managers working very stressful long hours in central London, to the detriment of their health and family lives, is challenged by this hard working and very successful fast growing business. Let's hope Chippy's investment groups show a way forward for others.


# Looking after the allotments

Collectively, all Chipping Norton Town Councillors act as Trustees of the William Fowler Charitable Trust which owns the allotments. The William Fowler Allotment Committee, reporting to the Trustees, manages the day-to-day running of the allotments. Elections were held recently for two places on the William Fowler Allotment Committee and members serve a three-year term of office. Almost 70 votes were cast with Rachel Faulkes (plot 25) and Natascha Cavers (plot 20) elected. They join two other allotment holders Wayne Richmond (plot 34A) and Sarah Holmes (plot 82B), alongside four Councillors and the Mayor. The Committee tries to meet four times a year, twice as a committee and twice to inspect the allotments. It has limited delegated powers, for example the provision of skips to clear allotment waste. It has no financial responsibility but can make recommendations to the Trust. Allotment holders with an inquiry should contact the Guildhall (the Town Council office

provides an administration service to the Trust) in the first instance, who will pass on comments.

# Parking charges for Chippy?

For years, West Oxfordshire District Council haschampioned district-wide free parking for its car parks. Other Oxfordshire districts charge for parking. Good news for parkers? Maybe so far, but visitor numbers and town centre users for our small towns such as Woodstock and Chipping Norton have significantly increased. Parking at busy times has never been more difficult and neither WODC nor the County Council have invested in any more parking space. In a new move, from 2023 Oxfordshire County Council (not WODC) is likely to take over all the 'on-street' parking control which will include the main Market Square in Chipping Norton. At the same time, in Woodstock, after discussions with their Town Council Traffic Advisory Committee and local groups, a consultation is now starting to look at introducing on-street pay and display and residents' permits. All this is partly responding to the parking chaos in Woodstock and aims to make parking fairer and shared around with more town centre users. Could this be something worth considering in Chippy or do we have more than enough parking space? WODC's two car parks would remain free (at New St and Albion St) but the other ideas could be looked at. OCC's Cabinet Member responsible, Tim Bearder, says this is, for the moment, only about Woodstock. But unless there are other parking solutions in Chipping Norton, this could be a glimpse of Chippy's future as well. What do readers, parkers and town centre users think?

# Time Team at Broughton

# Mapping Chippy workshop

Sunday 3 April saw the Town Hall host around 50 local people inspired to attend a fun event organised by The Chippy



Exchange — all to explore what it is about Chippy that is important to local people and how they feel it could be improved. A variety of conversations and creative activities took place over the afternoon, led by Jenn Kidd of Seedbed Theatre and Ruth Shaw-Williams and Alex Brooks of The Human Restoration Project. The event was the brainchild of Mayor Georgia Mazower, who encouraged the organisers to seek Section 106 funding to work with a range of people from the Town over several weeks.



Alex told the News, 'We wanted to collect ideas on what really matters for people in Chippy. We invited people to map the Town – to tell us what they dreamed and hoped for Chipping Norton. Hundreds of mapping packs were passed to people, some posted, some through partner organisations. We tried to reach as many, especially young, people as possible – so we got creative in our approaches. We worked with artist Carol Harvey, who runs an art club at CN School; with The Theatre, supporting their half-term school lunch initiative where we chatted with families; at the ACE centre talking with pre-schoolers about place and identity; with pupils at St Mary's School to create a song about what they wanted for

Chippy; and with adults with learning disabilities at the Albion Centre. One sunny day, with Rizvana Poole and MOR Bakery we turned the outside of the Guildhall into a living room and invited patrons of Chippy Larder for a cuppa and piece of cake!' # **Restoring The 4 Shire Stone**


The Four Shire Stone, on the A44 south of Moreton in Marsh, marked the ancient boundary between the four counties of Gloucestershire, Warwickshire, Oxfordshire and Worcestershire until reorganisation of county boundaries in

1931 when several Worcestershire parishes were absorbed into Gloucestershire. The 15ft high pillar of Cotswold stone is thought to date from the late 17th Century, although mystery surrounds its exact origins. It has a colourful history and was a well-known meeting point and a venue for prize fights. JRR Tolkien was a frequent visitor to this area and it is said that this waymarker caught his imagination. Fans of The Hobbit and Lord of the Rings



will know of the Three Farthing Stone of the Shire. But the

Stone has not always been well cared for and even had to be rebuilt when a lorry demolished it in 1955.



it and formed the Four Shire Stone Restoration Committee with the aim of raising £20,000 to restore the Stone to its former glory'. The project involves restoring and repairing the stonework, replacing the railings and enhancing the engravings on all four sides of the pillar. Mr Hayman-Joyce added, 'We have the permissions we need to complete the work and we hope that the Four Shire Stone will be standing tall and gleaming once again by the end of the year. But we also realise that these are difficult and troubled times and the situation in Ukraine is an important pull on all our resources so any contribution to this project would be so gratefully received'. # Healthwatch's Chippy survey

Late last year, Healthwatch Oxfordshire - who champion us as NHS patients - conducted a survey on what life is like in Chipping Norton and the ease of accessing health facilities and essential services such as public transport. A total of 204 people took part via online and paper questionnaires - the majority were female, and ages ranged between 25 to 65+. Questions ranged from how long you've lived here to positive features alongside drawbacks. Their report 'Living in Chipping Norton' reveals few great surprises - the ease of accessing glorious countryside, the range of supermarkets and choice of leisure facilities were all mentioned. Outstanding features of Chippy life included the sense of community (strengthened and extended during lockdowns), the role of the Topside Pharmacy and the Chipping Norton News! Downsides include the volume of traffic through town, lack of public transport, and few facilities for teenagers and elderly. As is common in towns with many over 65s, there was criticism of much information only being accessible via computer.

On health services, 90% said they were registered with a dentist and most visit one close to home. The majority found it relatively easy to get dental appointments and are happy with care received. Clinics now run at the Chippy Community Hospital's Outpatient Unit were praised for helping avoid the stress of travelling to, and parking at, the larger hospitals. The siting of Chipping Norton Health Centre (for GP services) on the outskirts of Town drew a mixed response. Although there is a shuttle bus service, which incorporates an hourly stop at the health centre, difficulty in accessing the Centre, particular for those coming to the proposed additional new homes, is a

# John Grantham 1937-2022 **Chipping Norton Honorary Citizen**

The News compiled this tribute to John Grantham who died in March. A Thanksgiving service on 31 March at St Mary's Church, led by Revd James Kennedy, was followed by a Town Hall reception.

A Chipping Norton man - John was born in Chipping Norton War Memorial Hospital in 1937, grew up in Diston's Lane, went to the Grammar School and started work at GT Smith in the High Street - repairing all kinds of household items. In 1956 he did three years National Service in the RAF, including a posting to Hong Kong, as a radio operator. Returning to Chippy, he met and married local girl Marilyn Hill, bringing up two children. Attracted by a wage of £11 3s 4d, in 1962 John joined the new Parker Knoll factory – starting proudly 'on the bench' as a moulder, then training at night school and

progressing through all departments to become Member of the Institute of Industrial Managers, and Operations Director in charge of 500 people until retirement in 1997. Parker

Knoll's then Managing Director, Martin Jordan, called him, 'a quite exceptional man, a leader of men - a great boss and colleague who never lost sight that it is people that make things happen.'

**Dedicated Council service** - John's civic life started with election to the old Chipping Norton Borough Council in 1972 - in the days, as John Cox working at Parker Knoll stressed, when Chippy ran its

own affairs. He stayed on what became the Town Council until 1983, then again from 1994 to 2008, serving as Mayor in 1976 and 1977. Memorably for the Chippy News, he chaired a Town Hall meeting to launch the community's volunteer newspaper. He served on West Oxfordshire District Council 1974-1977 and 1996-2000. Former Mayor and friend Pat Lake, in a memorable tribute at the Thanksgiving Service, remembered a 'passionate, principled man' and a hard act to follow; 'like someone trying to follow Sir Alex Ferguson at Manchester United.' Pat mentioned his starting the New Street Recreation Ground and finding financial support for Highlands Day Centre - also noting how John, a Labour and Cooperative Councillor, always put party politics aside to reach decisions good for the Town. Current Labour Chairman Steve Akers remembers John greeting everyone warmly, always 'on the steps' on polling day but not necessarily with a Labour rosette! Former Chippy Tory County Councillor and friend, Hilary Biles, read his Thanksgiving lesson.

Preserving Chippy's heritage – John's pride in the Town led to 45 years' involvement with the Field Reeves to look after the Regulated Pasture, common land granted to the townspeople over 800 years ago. He became a Trustee, then Chair from 1997 until his death. Fellow Trustee and friend Paul Burbidge paid tribute at John's Thanksgiving, to the delight of Labour's Steve Akers, by reading the 17th century



poem condemning the enclosures taking land from the common people, which begins:

The Law locks up the man or woman who steals the goose from off the Common, but leaves the greater villain loose who steals the Common from the goose.

Paul called John 'a man of dedication and integrity, with an extensive knowledge of Chippy - his passing has left an unfillable hole'. John Grantham wrote two detailed and meticulous history books on The Regulated Pasture and the Town Hall. John was in great demand - from primary schools to Probus clubs - for talks on

Chippy's history and even light-hearted accounts of life in Diston's Lane.

A life's service to the Town – John's deep involvement in the Town included being Chairman of Chipping Norton and District Fire Brigade Charity, President of the Hospital League of Friends and a driving force on the Hospital Action Group, whose secretary Clive Hill praised his great campaigning persistence. John's love of the local countryside included leading 'Footsteps', a popular healthy walking group, for 15 years before passing it into Peta Simmons' capable hands.

In 2012, John's work, dedication life were recognized by the Town Council and the then Mayor, Chris Butterworth is pictured here, presenting him with Honorary Citizenship - the



Town's fourth after John Hannis and Bruce & Sheila Parker. Cllr Butterworth, at this March's Town Council meeting, praised his talents as Councillor, historian, author and the 'most knowledgeable man of all Chippy information' adding 'Chippy was at the heart of John and John was at the heart of Chippy'.

Sadly, in 1985 John lost his wife Marilyn. A chance meeting later, at a Mayor's Ball, with Celia, a former childhood friend and dancing partner, led to their subsequent marriage sharing a love of walking and the countryside. In retirement John and Celia lived 20 years in Salford, enjoying gardening, travel and walking. They recently moved back to a Penhurst Gardens apartment with a wonderful view overlooking his beloved Common Land. John leaves behind Celia, his children Andrew and Joanne, grandchildren Luke, Daniel, Sian and Lauren, great granddaughter Lexie, and extended family. They thank all friends and townsfolk of Chipping Norton, who knew and loved John, for their kind words and support.

Thanks to Celia Grantham, Paul Burbidge, Martin Jordan, Pat Lake, Chris Butterworth, Steve Akers - and to John for his own eulogy.







#### Chippy Ramblers in the Glyme Valley



Whilst attention is turned to continuing

Whilst attention is connected warfare and the apparent perpetration of the same of the saddy we remind war crimes in Ukraine, sadly we remind a ourselves that elsewhere and further afield the conditions for many people remain dire. For example in Yemen, Syria, Myanmar, Afghanistan, Ethiopia, Xinjiang State and Israel-Palestine, wars, acts of genocide, practices of Apartheid, and man-made famines are resulting in deaths, deprivation and destruction, and denial of basic human rights. So we have been writing to authorities in these countries and to their representatives in the UK to ensure that the plight of individuals - including those wrongly imprisoned, often denied necessary medical care or legal representation, and/or suffering torture for alleged 'crimes against the state' - is not forgotten. # Blocked Ears?



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#### **Chipping Norton Yacht Club**



Sailing Super Yachts — designing, building, and operating their masts and spars was the subject of this month's talk given by Damon Roberts of Magma Structures.

From the days of the Vikings, masts have been held up by stays, originally rope, even in Nelson's day, more recently by wire. Traditional square-rigged ships split the sail area into several smaller sails, which required a large number of sailors to climb the rigging to set and take in the sails, with a forest of ropes both to hold up the masts and control the sails. For super yachts, the solution has normally been to have three masts to increase the number of sails, but with a large sail on each mast. Starting with the iconic award-winning Maltese Falcon (292 feet long), Damon designed three free-standing 200-foot carbon fibre masts rotating on bearings, with the square sails furled inside the masts and the angle of the sails controlled by electric motors rotating the masts. This has given this incredible yacht push-button sailing. The same

technology was then applied to the larger sailing yacht Black Pearl (106m), and the more controversial sailing yacht A (146m) currently impounded from its Russian owner.

#### Skateboard park and Council spending

As Town Mayor in 1998, I invited local youngsters to a Council meeting to tell us what they wanted in the way of skateboard facilities. A lot turned up. A half pipe was decided upon. Advice was taken from a local skateboarding professional and I raised the money to build it from local businesses in the Town. It cost the ratepayers nothing. The Field Reeves reluctantly gave permission for it to be built on the Common and a local builder built it. It remained for some time, but the Field Reeves Committee removed it as soon as they possibly could, saying it attracted vandals. I would suggest that it is not the Town Council's responsibility to provide recreational facilities, as they are only a Parish Council, who were responsible for The Town Hall, Pool Meadow, The Cemetery, Closed Churchyard, bus shelters and the Common. This would be up to the District and County. As the Town has grown out of all proportion over recent years, with another 1000 houses proposed, surely the responsibility should be put on developers to provide recreational facilities and not for the Parish Council to keep putting the Chippy precept up. Where are they going to get a quarter of a million pounds from? They have already given grants to unentitled bodies. Grants to voluntary bodies are for Chipping Norton clubs and organisations, not for other areas. I would suggest also that they invest in a new flagpole on the Town Hall which is their responsibility. The so-called mechanism is a rope and pulley.



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They should be looking at replacing this. Surely we should still be showing our patriotism especially with The Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations coming up!
