

THE THEATRE REACHING OUT CHIPPING NORTON TO EVERYONE

Holiday workshops, free lunches (and free cinema!) for those who need it, bursaries, Community Tickets, outdoor Cinema events at the Rugby Club and Cotswold Crescent, a Fun Run at New Street Recreation Ground — and more likely in the future. All part of a quiet revolution at Chipping Norton Theatre led by Director John Terry and 'Take Part' director Vanessa Managhan. But they need our help — as Take Part's Community Producer Will Arnold told The News:

Roots in Chippy's community -Back in the 1970s it was the community that helped to set up the Theatre as a Charity, rebuilding Spring Street's derelict Salvation Army Citadel, with jumble sales, fun runs, and hundreds of 'Friends' paying for bricks! More recently, as Will told us, in the Covid pandemic, the building was closed but the people of Chipping Norton helped keep everything afloat with the 'Head above Water' campaign. Alongside continuing the top-quality arts and entertainment programme, it meant being able to offer the

popular 'Take Part' programmes of youth and adult theatre workshops and projects – that are fun but also inform and inspire.

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Some of the Take Part Team pictured at The Theatre offices

team have been 'getting out' to do things in and with the community, including open air cinema shows last summer. Take Part's Head of Outreach Claire O'Hara presented enthusiastically in May to Chippy Town Councillors – telling them about the recent free 'Acting Out' workshop term for Chippy young people at Glyme Hall, bursaries and cheap Theatre Community Tickets, and hopes that the future will see more such as fun days with arts, creative activities

for local families, and hopes that the future will see more outdoor events such as fun days with arts, creative activities and cinema – perhaps at Cotswold Crescent playground and elsewhere – some of it free and aimed at nearby residents. Theatre boss John Terry wants to keep up this direction.

Free holiday lunch scheme – When the pandemic hit, the Theatre saw the Town's needs shifting, resources for

many Chippy families dwindling, more children going hungry, more loneliness and isolation. In October 2020, when nationwide campaign took off as the Government decided not to extend its Free School Meals

holiday time, the Take

Part team started giving free lunches during half-term to families who needed them – and connected with The Chippy Larder and St Mary's Church. Will said: 'It was very simple: if you need lunch, come to the Theatre and we'll give it to you, no questions asked'. That first half term they gave out around 10 lunches a day. The scheme grew. Recent Easter holidays saw 80 lunches daily – and with great support from a local business, those who came had free cinema screenings of *Paw Patrol* and *Encanto*, with some families seeing the Theatre itself for the first time.

How can you help? – First, Will told us that with food poverty and household

costs increasing, the Theatre team want to provide free lunches for families who need them for the whole of the Summer holidays, probably 100 a day. He said: 'we are hopeful that local businesses will offer their financial support for this, and we will apply for a grant to help

from the Town Council'. However, the Theatre will need more help from all of us for both this and its other valuable Take Part activities. As Will says: 'The Theatre belongs to its community, and this means we should be accessible to all. Thanks to you, our Take Part projects – including those free meals – will mean that everyone can find a little bit of home in Chippy Theatre'. Cycling whirlwind hits town



For a few hours on Saturday II June, Chipping Norton town centre hosted a spectacular invasion of cycling enthusiasts, bikes, team buses and cars - and hundreds of spectators. It was the start of the final stage of the 2022 Women's Tour. Around 100 professional cyclists, rounded by all the paraphernalia of an international race, set off from the Market Place - to Over Norton, Rollright and a winding route ending Oxford's St Giles. But not just

with their bikes – to watch the start and then ride off on their own informal local jaunts. Race organiser, Sweetspot, had closed the road with police and marshals all geared up – and the sun shone! It was broadcast around the world.

Local Councillors welcomed the event to showcase our market town – attracting hundreds of fleeting visitors. Mayor Sandra Coleman was there at the start and Town Councillor Steve Akers said, 'What an absolutely brilliant day in Chippy! A fantastic turnout from the Town to cheer the riders off. This was a massive event with cycling celebrity, fashion and lycra everywhere! A huge boost to promote cycling in Chippy and the surrounding area. So proud of our town and all that our Councils are doing to promote women's sport, women's cycling and cycling for all.' Local Cycling Chippy group members, including Marcus Simmons and Mark Walker, had a busy day by the Town Hall talking to people about cycling and running a 'tricky trail' session in the Market Square.

Quest to stop traffic noise!

At the recent Annual Town Meeting, Patrick Neale (of Jaffé & Neale Bookshop) raised the idea of noise cameras to catch loud motorcycles, performance cars, HGVs and road racing bangers roaring through town. He wrote to MP Robert Courts, who got enthused and wrote to OCC's Cabinet Member, Duncan Enright, for County Council support for a Chippy pilot. But Mr Courts then spotted an existing Government scheme to propose pilots. With what he said was a 'fair democratic approach', his own website rapidly asked for nominations. Three places made it to a shortlist: Bladon, New Street in Chipping Norton and Corn Street in Witney. Our MP then ran a quick online public vote, and

Bladon, the small village (coincidentally where Robert Courts lives), was the winner by a whisker – with bigger Chippy, which had suggested the idea, losing out.

Patrick Neale spoke for many in Chippy when he told the News, 'I'm disappointed that Bladon with its small population is getting the acoustic camera, when far more people would benefit in Chipping Norton. Especially as it was selected in such an ad hoc manner'. Undeterred, Patrick plans to contact a contractor who might trial one in Chippy. OCC's Cllr Enright was back at Chippy Town Hall in May to discuss traffic issues. So, might OCC and Cllr Enright champion the noise camera themselves, as Mr Courts had originally suggested? According to Cllr Enright, OCC were not involved in talks about noise cameras and he was surprised to hear news of the vote. Later, he told the News that he 'hadn't received Mr Courts' letter directly' (except the copy the News sent to him early in the process which he said he would pass to his officers) and he knew nothing about any camera locations. Hopefully our two leading local politicians - from left and right - can connect on this.

Matthew's trip to the Palace

Matthew had a wonderful time! The bands played songs from the musicals, the tea was delicious, the gardens beautiful and he saw William and Kate who were hosting the occasion for Her Majesty. Matthew Carpenter was nominated back in 2020 for his voluntary work, especially with the elderly. He helped at Highlands Day Centre while at college which led to a role



in one of the local care homes, playing games with the residents, for nine years. He has volunteered for even longer at St Mary's Church helping out in the office, setting up for groups and making teas and coffees. He is particularly valued at the monthly Come for Tea that meets on the 2nd Friday at 1.45 in the Parish Rooms. He is a totally reliable support to the leaders of the 8am Sunday service, opening the church and setting up each week and is usually one of the first to greet people coming to church at 10.30. Well done, Matthew and we're glad you enjoyed your treat!

Christmas lights plan

May's Community Committee meeting saw Chippy Town Councillors agree an outline plan for this year's Christmas lights. The 'little trees' and lights on town centre buildings will continue, hopefully with the help of volunteers and local contractors with ladders. The Committee liked last year's snowflakes hanging in the large town centre trees and will seek something similar this year. Wrapping will probably be avoided – and two large trees near the pelican crossing will

be left for wintering pied wagtails to roost again (thanks to a bird-watching new town councillor). The Town Hall will again have its curtain lights, some little lit trees in the niches, and this year a large Christmas tree will probably be put up next to the Town Hall steps. Lights inside Withers Court will also be considered. A contractor will be chosen for the main work after bids later in the summer.

East Chippy – your feedback

How to Build Chippy Better? That was the question a dozen Town Councillors and volunteers posed at their Town Festival stall. The Town is set to almost double in population including with 1000+ homes at the East Chipping Norton development, With a Masterplan for East Chippy looming (led Oxfordshire by Council), Chippy Town Councillors want to find out from existing residents what the Town is lacking that this new development

could bring. Volunteers were kept busy all day in conversations – and 145 post-its were collected with your views. Councillors noted concerns such as:

- need for properly affordable 2- to 3-bedroom homes for local families and homes for young single people
- · capacity of the Health Centre to cope
- · existing Town sewerage problems being exacerbated
- traffic and how to integrate the new development with the existing town, while avoiding extra cars coming into the town centre
- · safer road crossings
- the need to protect Glyme Lane and provide public sports pitches.

The Town Council's Working Group will summarise all this and send it to both main landowner OCC and planning authority WODC to inform Masterplan preparation and negotiations with developers. Mayor Sandra Coleman told the News, 'We were delighted with the number of people engaging with us and by their interest in East Chipping Norton development.' Residents, including many new to the Town, don't know all the details and want to find out what such a big growth means for Chippy. NB – Archaeology delay! – Meanwhile, work by OCC on the East Chippy 'Masterplan' is on hold as archaeological survey work is done. In June Town Councillors heard from Cllr David Heyes that there were 'significant Roman remains over quite a wide area'. For six weeks Wessex Archaeology has been exploring trenches near Glyme Lane, and the new Chipping

Norton Archaeological Research Group had a scan survey done on the School playing fields. See their report on page 26. Results are awaited.

Will WODC& OCC listen?

The May local elections saw the long-running Conservative Cabinet at WODC replaced by a new 'Alliance' of Lib Dems, Labour and Greens. New Lib Dem leader Andy Graham says his priorities include tackling climate emergency, improving health and wellbeing, improving local democracy, tackling inequality and creating the right new Local Plan. The new WODC Cabinet includes Chipping Norton's Labour member, Geoff Saul and his important new portfolio includes Housing, homelessness and affordable homes, sheltered housing, crime, neighbourhood policing and scrutiny of the Police and Crime Commissioner.

A first test about Chippy issues saw two key other Cabinet Members (Dan Levy for Finance and Carl Rylett for Planning) join Cllr Saul in our Town Hall on 13 June to discuss East Chipping Norton issues with the Town Council's Working Group. WODC has powers as a planning authority to influence the nature of the East Chippy development – and will be asked to 'adopt' any Masterplan put up by majority landowner, Oxfordshire County Council and developers such as Cala Homes. They also have a big say in how, and how much, funds are provided for important infrastructure such as HGVs relief, Town centre traffic measures. car parking, leisure and sporting facilities, and more.

Many questions were raised in this meeting. Our Town Council have had major concerns that Oxfordshire County Council are simply looking at maximising money made on selling their land - when their wider remit is to ensure that Chippy's growth is sustainable and meets the vision the new County Cabinet has across many issues - environment, affordable housing, biodiversity, health, pedestrian and cycling friendliness, zero carbon, transport and roads, and more. Cllrs Levy and Saul are both also County Councillors, and got a clear message they need to get OCC's own Cabinet to take a more strategic view on the East Chippy project. OCC themselves could be investing more in the Town's future. The Working Group also want WODC, as planning authority, to update fully a priority 'infrastructure' list for Chippy - and revisit the level of charges that could and should be levied on developers to pay for it. Any Masterplan should not be rushed until this is done. Next steps are awaited on East Chippy - and the Town waits to see how OCC and WODC demonstrate what a 'Fair Deal' from them means for our community.

Work delayed at The Branch



The Team at Chipping Norton's St Mary's Church is delaying the start of the main building work for The Branch community hub (the old NatWest Bank building in Market Place). Emma Kennedy told the News, 'we have had to push back the start to accommodate some changes we are making to the plans. We have now delayed the start to later in September so that it will not interfere with the Chippy Fair. If you have any questions or concerns then please email build@thebranchtrust.org.

When work starts in earnest, the contractors will need to use the front entrance of the building for all access (there is no rear site entrance). Plans agreed with Oxfordshire Highways include an outdoor 'compound' in front, extending into the Market square — which is causing some concern among the Wednesday Market traders affected. One of them contacted the News saying they are worried about finding an alternative pitch site — and how it will affect trading. The News contacted our West Oxfordshire District Councillors Mike Cahill and Geoff Saul about this (WODC are responsible for the Market) and they have alerted the responsible Cabinet member and officers to look at the matter.

'Bingate' - next episode

Chipping Norton's saga of disappearing waste bins runs on. Residents' complaints continue about the 'reorganising and replacement' of the Town's waste bins a few months back by West Oxfordshire District Council. Individual dog waste bins and some main waste bins disappeared - 'replaced' by fewer 'joint' bins, in a move, many suspected, to save WODC money. The main complaint, however, was lack of any pre-discussion with either Town Council or residents who had better 'on the ground' knowledge of the best locations. Chipping Norton Town Council ('it was not them guv') has been logging issues to pass on to WODC, including pleas for re-instating bins where use is high. Latest letters to Town Councillors included concerns about London Road, Wards Road, Over Norton Road, Evans Way and Cornish Road. New Street Recreation Ground also lost bins - and the Town Council, who run it, has already got WODC to plan some re-instatement. WODC apparently told Mayor Sandra Coleman that they will look at more reinstatement but 'only when they have finished updating bins across the whole District'. Mayor Coleman is also concerned that the Town Council (not WODC!) may have to pay for both adding back lost ones and emptying them. Another WODC money-saving ploy? More to go on this one!

A happy Clarkson occasion

Love - and confetti - are in the air as the wedding season is fully under way in Chippy and the Cotswolds. In May, Chipping Norton's St Mary's Church, its porch garlanded with roses, saw the wedding of Emily Clarkson, daughter of local farmer and TV celebrity Jeremy, to publicist fiancé Alex Andrew. Emily, who is a regular podcast host, shared pictures of them at the church on her Instagram account. Friends and designer-clad guests then attended the reception which was held privately nearby. Mr Clarkson was reported as saying he had 'never been happier'. For those interested there are many unusual venues locally for weddings - Chippy Theatre is now a wedding venue - and for those for a taste of outdoors the Cotswold Field of Dreams is in nearby rolling hills, Heythrop Park has reopened with its decadent stately home feel, Merriscourt and Cornwell Manor do well, and Cotswolds Hotel and Spa at our local golf club is very popular with some great photo settings.

Luke pictured with young helpers finishing his latest Chippy mural we stroll around town and find it! Luke was back for a fleeting visit after mural painting in Amsterdam and a whistlestop trip painting at Donnington Park. His parents still live in town and,



when stuck here back in the first Lockdown, Luke did some wonderful contributions including empty Beales shop windows and the murals outside the Library. With the Ukraine conflict in mind, he designed the new mural to paint over (with permission!) a graffitied wall owned by Cottsway. He told the News he was out walking, spotted the wall covered in tags and thought it the perfect canvas for a Mural to 'give this wall some much-needed love' - adding a colourful message of support that 'Love Wins'. Luke added, 'The inspiration is taken from a similar mural I painted in Budapest six years ago for a Street Art Festival. I had help from my cousin's child Eve, visiting from Australia, and my nephew Burl to help fill the yellow and blue sections making this a real team effort!' Parking fees creep nearer!

Town centre full of summer visitors? Town expanding? Main car parks full? Market Square parking overflowing and queuing? Nowhere for town residents to park? Sounds familiar? Well, nearby Woodstock, steeped in the same

problems, is set to introduce pay and display parking in the town centre's marketplace and streets. Three-hour charging bays will have the first hour free, other bays will allow an ultra-short 30 minutes. There could also be permit schemes for residents and possibly, hotel guests. The whole thing has been divisive in the Town. The scheme has been agreed by Oxfordshire County

Council's Cabinet (OCC are now in charge of street parking and yellow lines). Local Woodstock County Councillor, Lib Dem Andy Graham, had previously referred to parking chaos caused by lack of enforcement. A 'town poll' of local voters had seen 90% object to charging, but only 16% voted. The official County Council 'consultation' was more nuanced, asking for comments from different stakeholders (businesses

and those dealing with visitors). County Councillor Graham was quoted as calling OCC's process 'second to none'.

Perversely, the off-street longer-term car park in Woodstock will remain free, for the moment, as it is still run by West Oxfordshire District Council, who have for years held out against any charging. All this could be interesting for

Chipping Norton. OCC are taking over our street parking here — including the main market squares. What might they do here? Meanwhile WODC still run our two, currently free, long-term car parks. In the past, WODC's Cabinet has strongly resisted any parking charges. However, WODC is now run by the new Lib Dem/Labour/Green Alliance, similar to that now at the County Council. Woodstock's Andy Graham (District

as well as County Councillor) is WODC's new Leader.

WODC will have to look at all this. Their last parking strategy for Chipping Norton, saying we needed 70 more spaces, was in 2016 and is way out of date. There's been little action nor money offered since. Demand has increased but habits may change for transport in and out of our town. Extra in-town car park space, perhaps park and rides at the edge of

WORTH THE RISK

On HGVs – Cllr Enright has now clearly stated that he is committed to a plan to take HGVs off the whole 'A44 corridor' (ie through all towns such as Woodstock, Chippy and Moreton). This idea was, in fact, accepted by OCC years back after passionate campaigning by a local A44A action

group – but was then 'shelved'. The plan could work but needs much collaboration and national agreement. Meanwhile, the Rollright Stones route is being branded as 'just too difficult'. Progress is awaited but don't hold your breath.

Road safety measures could now gain momentum. Chipping Norton Town Council are behind the OCC's new priorities for safer towns – much more friendly for pedestrians, cyclists and even motorists. Live discussions (including visits from County engineers) are looking at: changes both at the top of and further down New Street, pavements in Horsefair, a safer crossing at Albion Street/London Road, safer walking routes and more.

Making Chippy a 20mph town — In June, Town Councillors agreed to join a new OCC scheme which could extend our limited 20mph zone (funded by the Town Council over three years back). The zone could expand beyond schools along Churchill Road, London Road, and Burford Road — something parents support. But extra speed reduction measures, such as gating or bumps, might be needed on the main roads. OCC say the Town Council needs to conduct a residents' survey on the '20mph town' idea. It's also unclear what exactly OCC would fund.

Enforcing speed limits – Police provide little resource for enforcing town speed limits. New Town Councillor, Steve Akers, has already initiated a campaign to report to OCC all damaged or worn out 30mph and 40mph speed limit signs, other warning signs, and bollards – and action has started.

Equally important, Community Speedwatch groups need organising. A New Street group started theirs three years back – and have a portable 'SID' (speed device) which records vehicle registrations and flashes speeds. But it needs an updated system to connect this to police data and driver warnings. Volunteers rather than money is the key. Residents in Churchill Road, Over Norton Road and others could be interested – and Cllr Akers is keen to pursue this.

County Council 'keen to help' – The funding of town safety measures is an issue. A recent OCC announcement talked of £10.4 million for 'active

travel improvements' countywide. OCC and WODC's Cllr Enright spoke of 'exciting opportunities in our beloved city and market towns'. The statement included '£2m to improve Witney High Street'. The News asked Cllr Enright about money for Chipping Norton, and he said the Town Council would need to put schemes forward for future funding tranches. Chippy Town Councillor, Mark Walker is championing many of these proposals and welcomed the recent focus of the new County Council leadership, saying they were keen to help resolve the traffic issues that have made Chipping Norton dangerous, especially for pedestrians. He looked forward to working together to make Chippy a 'much more walking-friendly town'.

town, and charging and permit regimes may all have to be considered – alongside any new street-parking policies by the County Council.

Bus shelter update ...

As reported last month, four large round empty wooden 'planters' were erected alongside the replacement bus stop along Walterbush Road. At their Strategic Planning Committee meeting in June, Town Councillors didn't seem to know why they were there but need to do something because locals are filling them with rubbish (unhealthy and inflammable!). After discussion, the short-term action is to fill them with earth and perhaps some succulent sedum — to avoid the need for frequent watering. Meanwhile, Councillors will see if the bus shelter can have an 'end' added to provide more shelter from wind and rain.

Plan for Manor House Gallery

The unusual little building, formerly the Manor House Gallery, on West Street by Burford Road roundabout could be growing in size, if objections can be overcome to a latest

planning application. The building was constructed in 1983 by the then owner of the Manor House who ran it as an art gallery for many years. Current owner, Anthony Hill, uses it for storage of quirky items, only occasionally opening it up for sales. He now proposes to raise the roof and construct two flats above. His architect, Chippy resident Alex Corfield, says, Being the original designer, I am aware the shop is of limited scale and a missed visual design opportunity, bearing in mind its location.' Anthony Hill has already constructed four new homes in the former garden of the Manor House, all accessed via a long winding drive past the Gallery. These neighbours have objected, saying that any residents' cars for the proposed flats would obstruct access to their four homes beyond. They claim the plans are inaccurate, giving the impression there is more space than actually exists. They fear that emergency services, particularly fire engines, could not access these four homes. One says, 'The owner has made no attempt to talk with residents' and 'This proposal seems to bear little relation to the reality of the access issues,' and asks for a planners' site visit so they can explain their concerns. At their June meeting, Chipping Norton Town Councillors logged a strong objection, based on planning grounds of design not appropriate in the curtilage of a listed building (one councilllor called it 'a monstrosity') and on access issues for residents and neighbours. The matter will be determined by WODC's Uplands Planning Committee.

Chippy riders go national

Two local riders have qualified for the National Riding for the Disabled competition after a very successful regional event at West Wiltshire Equestrian Centre. Town Benches - update

will return to the town centre from the workshop shortly. Further benches around town are in need of some tender loving care, and the Town Council will be looking at further work. Please tell the Town Clerk about any you feel need attention (see letters). Meanwhile, at their June Strategic Planning Committee meeting, Councillors noted that at the Millennium Garden along West Street, a second conventional bench will be added, donated by the Freemasons in memory of those lost through Covid. In addition, to accommodate families and groups wanting to stop for a chat, a new crescent-shaped bench will be commissioned for the garden as well. The design for this is being finalised.

Town Council's tree survey

Chipping Norton Town Council is responsible for a variety of trees on their land around town including: Pool Meadow, Worcester Road cemetery, St Mary's Churchyard, Greystones, Millennium Garden and Cornish Road play area (NB – the land and trees at New Street recreation ground are the responsibility of the Field Reeves, those on public roads that of the County Council). This is mainly all about public health and safety – with issues such as dangerous trees or branches, but a survey would help assess condition of the trees and action needed. In May, Councillors on the Community Committee approved a budget of £650 for the survey work. At the same Committee, Mayor Sandra Coleman reported that a working group for preserving and improving Pool Meadow was now in action with an excellent group of volunteers, many with expert knowledge. Progress is awaited.



Help Chippy School projects

An exciting new kitchen garden project at Chipping Norton School has taken shape helped by some terrific local financial support and guidance. Local charity, Thrive, has teamed up with local businesses, Ross and Ross Events, The Chipping Norton Garden Company, and Wyatts Garden Centre. The garden, in the centre of the school site, is undergoing development led by Ali du Crôs, Head of Dance and Drama. Fruit, vegetables and wildlife garden plants have been planted



for the growing season and students will be able to enjoy the space and taste its produce as part of their school day. A gardening club is also in the pipeline. There are several exciting potential projects at the School including expansion of outdoor spaces and upgrading of the IT network which would hugely benefit from support from our community, including local businesses. 
In other moves to improve Town Council engagement with the community, Chippy residents will shortly be able to

sign up for a regular emailed newsletter with the Council's latest news. Deputy Mayor Cllr Rachel Foakes is taking a lead on this, along with a plan to hold informal open sessions with residents on some Saturdays. Watch out on the Town Council website for details.

More land for Chippy housing!

Planning certainly means planning ahead! There's still no agreement on the Masterplan for 1000+ homes at East Chipping Norton, which is in WODC's existing Local Plan (2011–2031). But meanwhile, both developers and local authorities are looking further ahead. First, County and District Councils are working with other strategic bodies on Oxfordshire Plan 2050, a 'Spacial Strategy' with a broad-brush approach to distribution of growth, including housing, across the County. This was intended to be adopted in 2023 – but progress has slowed. Second, WODC is starting work on its next detailed Local Plan updated to guide District development up to 2040.



All this means developers are looking at new Chippy land that could be allocated for housing. A new site, 55 acres of greenfield land beyond the Cricket Club between **Banbury**

and London Roads (marked on the map), is already being promoted for development by Rainier Developments, based in Henley-in-Arden. Rainier are pushing this in both the Oxfordshire Plan 2050 and West Oxfordshire's next Local Plan. They emphasise the land is 'adjacent to East Chipping Norton Strategic Development Area' already allocated for 1200 houses, school, shopping facilities, and 'an eastern link road connecting Banbury Road with London Road [sic]'. They suggest it could become 'further phases' of the East Chippy development with possibly another 400–500 new homes. Rainier say they will 'engage with WODC' on how this might help WODC meet its long-term housing needs. Whether these green fields are indeed built upon in the future depends upon which overall strategy for Oxfordshire is agreed and how WODC interprets that locally.

Plan for major Town Hall work

Last year Chipping Norton Town Council reviewed results of a 'quinquennial' (every five years) survey on the Town Hall, which set out extensive work needed on the listed building. This included major roof work, structural repairs and safety and compliance improvements. The projects could include £250–£350,000 of work. Given the nature and cost of this, the Council's Community Committee in May agreed to engage a professional agent (property consultants Alder King) to project manage, write tender specifications, and manage contractors. They will charge 12% of the project cost, and Councillors agreed to pay £3,150 initially for a 'measured'

survey' to document details of the Town Hall's design and layout for contractors to be able to use — apparently one does not exist. A sub-group of Councillors was nominated to liaise with the agents on all the work. The Community Committee also agreed an updated set of Town Hall regulations, rates for hiring, and new booking form, which will be available on the website and from the Town Clerk.

Locals shine at Chelsea Show

Globally renowned Whichford Pottery added to their many accolades by helping scoop a gold medal at this year's Royal

Horticultural Society's Chelsea Flower Show. The Whichford team was commissioned by Chris Beardshaw, a garden designer and plantsman, to design and make two handmade bespoke urns for his Royal National Lifeboat Institution garden. The 1.9m high urns combined traditional and contemporary designs incorporating not only the Georgian origins but the future of the RNLI. The decorative motif, repeated three times around each urn, was based on a native UK sea holly. The stem of the sea holly has been stylised to adopt the form of the hull of an RNLI Severn Class lifeboat. After Chelsea, the urns will be based at the RNLI College and Training Centre in Poole. Jim Keeling, Master Craftsman and Co-Founder at the family-run pottery, praised the entire

Update on town Youth work



Back in October 2021, Chipping Norton Town Council – with a County Council grant of over £25,000 – signed up Carterton-based youth organisation Got2B, to provide some youth services in Chippy. The Council's first priority was for some 'detached' youth work – ie working with young

people out round town, perhaps with project activity. The work would start by assessment of needs and risks with local police and Councillors. A progress report this May, to the Town Council's Community Committee, said all this had been difficult; police had apparently not responded, and weather was bad for detached work. So after receiving initial funding in January, Got2B decided to launch a weekly 'in town' after school youth club in the Methodist Church.

A delayed mid-March launch saw the first six sessions with very low attendance, but the Got2B team later, on 17

May, ventured out to Cotswold Crescent after school to connect with up to 20 young people. More such work is likely, although for 'detached work,' involving more local meetings with stakeholders and other organisations, the Got2B staff have to come from Carterton and they said more visit time might need more funding. More outreach work and a further progress report to the Town Council Community were planned for June. Councillors are also looking at other activities and facilities for young people alongside successful ones already in place, such as the Remix youth club run at Glyme Hall by St Mary's Church, and outreach work by Chipping Norton Theatre (see page 2).

New equine therapy centre



Could you help provide a location near Chipping Norton for a new equine-based therapy centre? There are an estimated 12,000 learning disabled adults and children in Oxfordshire. Only a few are supported publicly. In 2020 there were also 1000s of GP patients diagnosed with depression. A local team called The Cotswold Project — a not-for-profit enterprise — is looking to rent 10

to 50 acres for the centre to serve our community, particularly learning disabled and those suffering from depression and anxiety. Unlike most other horse therapy centres, where no riding is involved, there will be a full range of equine activities including riding and horse driving. The team want to keep their horses, their equine co-workers, in a more natural and enriched environment than many horses have, where they are stabled and turned out to grass individually. Rented or leased land and barn accommodation is needed plus office space on a site ideally within 10 miles of Chipping Norton. The team would also like to hear from any potential users such as charities, schools, local councils, etc., as well as potential suppliers for items such as hay and straw. Making Chippy pesticide-free

In May, Chipping Norton Town Council's Community Committee approved a new Three-Year Strategy towards making Chippy a 'Pesticide-Free' Town. A resident's letter last year, about use of Glysophate as a chemical weedkiller on the Recreation Ground, was one trigger to take a careful look at the issues. Deputy Mayor Rachel



Foakes told the News



that the two main concerns with such pesticides were loss of biodiversity (making ecosystems more vulnerable to pollution and climate change), and potential health problems with contact. Several European countries are introducing bans – but currently the UK's Health and Safety Executive says that chemicals such as Glysophate (pictured) remain effective and safe if used properly. Agricultural and domestic garden use remain quite popular – with supplies readily sold at local garden centres and hardware stores.

The Town Council has, following their 2020 commitment to dealing with the Climate Emergency, worked with Pesticide Action Network (Pan-UK) to put together a meaningful plan to implement over three years. Other local councils are doing the same. This includes reducing and ultimately ending the use of pesticides on Council-managed land; bringing in other local stakeholders to follow suit, and finding ways to encourage residents to adopt a pesticide-free approach at home. Mayor and Committee Chair, Cllr Sandra Coleman, strongly supports the move – as 'good for the health of our children and improving biodiversity and soil quality. I look forward to seeing a greater variety of wild flowers in our open spaces, and learning to identify them!' Cllr Foakes added 'we hope to

Helping children in Zambia





Local West Oxfordshire-based charity, Cecily's Fund, was set up 25 years ago in the name of local student Cecily Eastwood who died while on her gap year helping vulnerable children in Zambia. Since 1998, the Fund has helped over 20,000 children and orphans, raising over £6 million. Cecily's Fund is now taking over a similar charity - 27-year-old Brighton-based Kaloko Trust (KTUK) - and merging their Zambian rural community project work into its own portfolio. This means more vulnerable children and their communities are supported as they face high rates of poverty, prejudice and inequality in towns and the countryside. Zambia has been devastated by HIV/AIDS with most of the population now under 25. Many children are left without parents and forced to miss school and earn money to support others. Cecily's Fund helps provide education and training to tackle the cycle of poverty. It works with local partners to fund uniforms, shoes and books, and offers life-saving health education and

emotional support to those without families. Cecily's Fund enjoys a lot of support, largely from local residents throughout West Oxfordshire – and it is because of them and the money it receives in grant funding that it can continue to support people trapped in poverty. 

An Aldestrop stroll – The delightful Cotswold village of Adlestrop achieved worldwide fame with the titular poem by Edward Thomas – based on a railway journey the poet took in June 1914 shortly before the start of WWI. A village-centre bench bears a plaque with the poem in full. A lovely walk is signposted passing the village shop (serving teas and cakes at weekends) and the glorious church dating part back to the 13th century.

A Day at the Races – Try Stratford Races on the delightful course first used in September 1755. It hosts five National Hunt (jumps) meetings during July and August and is a great venue for all – with a Family Day on Sunday 10 July with a range of different activities and child-friendly attractions. 



Choose your book for the summer


On the beach? In the garden deckchair? Evening relaxation? One book-loving Chippy News Team member has some reading suggestions.

Any relaxation is denied when she stumbles across a woman hiding in some bushes. Thea offers the stranger sanctuary. Her guest is found dead the next morning and Thea

struggles to find the killer. Digging into the deceased's background, she meets a tangled web of lies, secrets and at least three suspects! A thrilling read.

Light Perpetual – Francis Spafford Imagine a bomb falling in 1944 had not killed a group of children? 
amalgam of science and cooking endears Elizabeth to her audience as she dares them to change the status quo. A delight to discover a challenging, unconventional heroine.



The Island of Missing Trees – Elif Shafak Her latest novel almost defies description. The story weaves from Cyprus to London as we follow the forbidden love of a couple across the Muslim/Christian divide. A

scandal need to be confronted to build a future from the ruins of the past.





CHARG archaeology projects

Last month Chipping Norton Archaeological Research Group commissioned a geophysical survey of Chipping Norton School's playing fields. Thanks to the kind cooperation of the School and the generosity of local survey company, Zetica, the fields were scanned for signs of archaeological remains. The team used non-invasive techniques – ground penetrating radar (GPR) and magnetometry – to detect potential buried structures. We eagerly await Zetica's results at the end of June.

The school fields are an important part of the archaeological picture because they sit next to the East Chipping Norton Development Site, where Oxfordshire County Council and Cala Homes have conducted similar surveys. As observant walkers along Glyme Lane may have noticed, the Cala Homes survey has prompted further archaeological investigation. For six weeks a team from Wessex Archaeology dug evaluation trenches (pictured) on



site to gain insight into the scale of the Roman remains. This is an exciting development and we expect to have more information once their report is released.

We plan to hold a finds event at Chipping Norton Museum in the autumn. If you have ever picked up some old pottery sherds, coins or other historical objects and want to know more, this will be a chance to show them to an expert. The Museum would love to have a fuller record of the evidence for Roman activity in our town; perhaps you own something that will be a vital piece of the jigsaw puzzle! Details of this event will follow.

Girls Mean Business: This year we launched a very exciting programme for Year 9s called Girls mean Business. The



project ran over four sessions alongside the timetabled active tutorial lessons. We looked at a variety of issues facing girls and women in education and in the workplace. We then ran a human library event where the girls met women from a range of careers and backgrounds. To finish off the project we went to the Oxford Playhouse to see an inspirational new musical: Fantastically Great Women Who Changed the World. It was an empowering stage show and we learned that 'history' could equally be called 'herstory' and that change happens through dreams and aspirations.

Translation Challenge 2022: Students at CNS were again invited to take part in the The Anthea Bell Prize for Young Translators. Our students completed creative translations in German and French, completing one practice task in the run up to the competition. Five winning entries were selected at each level and then submitted to the South East regional level of the competition. Whilst we didn't have any South East winners, Bethany Oliver Hall did receive a commendation for her translation of an extract from a German story, which was an amazing achievement.

Bikeability: At the end of May, fifteen Year 7 cyclists took on the challenge of completing their Bikeability course. After their bikes were checked by the fantastic coaches from The Windrush Bike Project, the students completed a series of

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tasks ranging from navigating the cones on the School netball pitch, getting in the correct start position, stopping quickly but carefully and tackling the roundabouts in Chipping Norton.

CNPS News: Last term we delivered two Able, Interested and Motivated workshops for the Chipping Norton Partnership of schools. We held a Drama workshop based on The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night Time where the children worked well together to perform a short extract of the play. St Mary's and talked about his career in farming. He was an inspirational speaker who engaged all the children with his unique


spoke fondly of his days at

Chipping Norton & District Fire Brigade Background to the charity and sports awards

The Chipping Norton Fire Brigade, initially established in 1878, attended its first fire on the 26 April that year. This was a private Fire Brigade – if the property on fire was not insured, the owner had to pay for their services. In 1911 the bill for putting out a fire in the Union Workhouse (Cotshill) was £34 3 shillings. Following the 1938 Fire Brigade Act, in 1941 the Borough Council took over the Brigade as a statutory duty to provide a fire service. The original Fire Station was in Albion Street. then in West Street (now CoCa the Furniture Shop) until the current Burford Road building opened in 1968.

In 1932, whilst still a Private Brigade, £1000 was collected by public subscription and a new Leyland Motor Engine (pictured) with a capacity of 600 gallons was bought and given to the Chipping Norton & District Fire Brigade Committee. At a special ceremony it was named King George V by Mrs. F.H. Gregory of Dunthrop. This ownership was to prove important later. When the 1938 Act of Parliament, forming the National Fire Service came into being, the Brigade's property was taken over by County and they had to buy the engine and a Humber car owned by the Committee. The monies from these sales formed the basis of the Chipping Norton & District Fire Brigade Charity and was invested by a board of trustees. Subsequently they first bought a field in the Banbury Road (now the Cricket Club) and then in 1952 bought the Tennis Courts at Foxfield (now the Lido) The income from these two pieces of land is used to help amateur sport.

Town on show - flags and benches

Whilst applauding the volunteers responsible for arranging the Festival, I do think that the Town did not honour our Queen with fitting decorations. It seems strange that an event that none of us who are alive today will ever see again was 'celebrated' by Chippy with some unspectacular bunting and NO flags at all on the Town Hall which is well equipped to handle flags/bunting etc etc even without the damaged flag pole. Very disappointing. I am very happy that none of the Royal Family came to visit our town.

I have read that the Town has employed someone to refurbish the very expensive benches bought by previous councils to commemorate various people including Mike Howes, Rob Evans and Gina Burrows. When they were purchased it was hoped that the only maintenance should be a quick wash down of the metalwork and an occasional



re-varnish of the woodwork - ie some basic maintenance in situ. Walking around the Town, it is distressing to see that the bench commemorating Gina Burrows (in New Streetpictured) is in extremis and the one opposite is very dirty. Some of the other benches (eg outside Barclays and the Town Hall) will need another coat of varnish before next winter perhaps the Town Council could ask for some volunteers to do the work ... a guick sand and a re-coat is all that is required. Finally, I sincerely hope the Town Council will at least name one bench after John Grantham or buy a new one. He deserves it.
