'Brilliant news' as Chippy's Cotswold Birth Centre reopens



New housing shock



January saw a surprise proposal for 90 new homes on part of a possible new Chippy site not in our Local Plan. The landowner Rainier Developments, say there could be 400–500 homes in total

2023/4 Council tax rises



Chipping Norton Town Council are not increasing their share of our Council Taxes this year but already hard-pressed householders will have to find another £100 for 2023/4 from April because of rises by the larger

County, District and Police authorities. That's if final budget proposals are agreed in February. It's a lot from your pocket, but a rise of 4.8% is less than inflation!

The County Council, limited to a 5% increase by the Chancellor, is our main spender and is severely stretched with big demands in social care, child services and education. West Oxfordshire, providing refuse collection, planning, tourism and other services, also has big cost pressures. Thames Valley Police say they need the money to preserve local resourcing. Chipping Norton Town Council at their December full Town Council meeting, agreed to make no increase per household – after a 5% rise last year. Mayor Sandra Coleman told the News that committees had in-depth and careful discussions adding, 'All councillors are very aware of the cost-of-living pressures faced by residents, and as the Council's finances are in a healthy position, we were very pleased to agree a budget that meets the needs of the Town without increasing the portion of residents' Council Tax paid to the Town Council'. The Town Council are, however now making significant transfers from reserves for major expenditure.

Town Meeting & Elections

Chipping Norton's Annual Town Meeting is set for **Monday 6 March**, 7pm in the Town Hall. It's open to all town citizens, organised by the Town Council (who present their annual report and take questions), and is an opportunity to discuss town issues. Second, **Thursday 4 May** will see local elections, with all 16 Chipping Norton Town Council seats contested for a four-year term. Would you like to stand and help the Town? Find out more by asking current councillors and see www.chippingnorton-tc.gov.uk. One WODC district seat for Chippy will also be up for election. Current incumbent Mike Cahill hopes to stand again.

NB Don't forget that for these elections, you must have an **acceptable photo ID** with you to vote in person. If you don't have one (eg Passport, Driving Licence etc), you can apply for a free ID by filling in a form from WODC or online via gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate

Town Council invests in the future

Chipping Norton Town Council is a 'third tier' parish council with few statutory duties, but as a Town, rather than a small village, it looks after important community assets such as Greystones sports grounds, the Town Hall,

Pool Meadow, Recreation Grounds and the Cemetery. Partly because of this, it has one of the highest Council Tax rates out of 81 parish and towns in West Oxfordshire. The Town Council's 2023/4 ongoing spending budget of around £440,000 will be covered by £345,000 of Council Tax, income from Town Hall lettings and elsewhere, and a small transfer from General Reserves.

In fact, around £650,000 sits in Reserves – much of it accumulated deliberately over more than 10 years, by previous Councillors raising the Council Tax, to meet future

extraordinary needs, notably Town Hall repairs. The current Town Council, in place since 2019, has also underspent annual budgets, partly because of Covid and delays to

projects. The Town Council, has, however, now formally earmarked around £350,000 from Reserves for additional spending, beyond the normal budget, starting this year. This includes £250,000 for Town Hall upgrade and maintenance, £60,000 for recreation ground upgrades (notably at Cotswold Crescent), and £25,000 towards a major Pool

Meadow restoration project (which should also receive large external grants). Investment in Chippy's street scene continues and, with a new Events Officer, the Council wants to increase community use of the Town Hall and to engage more with the Town.

Mud & fun at Gt Brook Run

To work off some of those Christmas calories, 27 December saw over a hundred hardy souls join in the annual now traditional -Great Brook Run, a charity fun hosted by the Tite Inn in Chadlington. Runners of all ages, some in very silly fancy splashed dress, though mud and more mud over the first half of the race, then ran upstream the brook along negotiating weeds,

brambles, stiles and a very low tunnel before ploughing up the hill to the Tite to collect (muddy, wet and shivering) their heard-earned medal. Every year, hundreds of pounds are raised for Charity. Well done the runners, the Tite, and all the organisers.

But sewage stops Xmas swims

Chadlington's Great Brook Runners might have been deterred by news that local traditional Christmas swims were cancelled after more raw sewage was discharged by Thames Water into the Thames and rivers near Chippy. Five discharges into the Windrush in Witney, and a storm overflow in Church Harborough, saw Oxford's festive swim cancelled. There was a discharge for over five hours on 4 January into Chippy's Blue Brook. On 7 January there was discharge into Chadlington Stream, Littlestock Brook, Milton-under-Wychwood, and Bledington Brook. This evidence is public, thanks to Thames Water's New Year gift of an interactive, realtime map showing local raw sewage discharge. See www.thameswater.co.uk/edm-map. Their spokesperson said, 'Putting untreated sewage into rivers is unacceptable, but after heavy rain it's sometimes necessary and permitted. This prevents flooding homes, gardens, streets. We are currently increasing sewage treatment capacity at a number of our sewage works.' Local campaign group, Windrush Against Sewage Pollution (WASP), say regulation is weak, plants operate illegally, and 30 tonnes of sewage wastewater per day are added with every 100 new houses built. They want a 'Grampian condition' applied by our planning authorities saying any approved new development (eg at East Chippy) cannot start until local sewage capacity is upgraded.

Theatre's Christmas meals

After offering a range of support to local families during 2022, Chipping Norton Theatre distributed food and home supply packs over the festive season to families with children eligible for free school meals. This was helped considerably by a donation of almost 1300 meals provided free by the Aldi supermarket in the Town. John Richardson, Aldi's regional manager, explained, 'We know a lot of families will be

struggling this winter and that is why we are making this additional donation to help the local community this December'. With demand for support increasing this year, The Theatre's Clare O'Hara said the donations made all the difference and they were very grateful for the support so that they, as a charity, could do more to help.

Re-fresh for Leisure Centre

Chippy's Leisure Centre manager, Lewis Brain, was delighted to tell the News that, in partnership with WODC, work has finally begun on repairing the (leaking!) roof and ceiling. Gym dry-changing rooms are also being updated and brand new poolside showers have been installed.

Chippy's birth unit back open



at the re-opened birth centre

Chipping Cotswold Birth Centre. our much-valued midwifeled maternity unit. reopened for local births on 9 January - after 17 months of closure due to staffing difficulties. particularly at the main units in Oxford and Banbury. Chippy's midwives had found themselves reassigned to Oxford's JR Hospital to there. Oxford Baby Lily was born on 17 January University Hospitals NHS Trust, who run all the

units, were criticised by the Care Quality Commission - with safety and staffing an issue. Catherine Greenwood, the Trust's Clinical Director for Maternity, acknowledged the long closure and apologised to families impacted. Chipping Norton has been favoured by many local families as a quiet, safe, and friendly place to for low-risk births.

The Centre was soon back in action! Pictured above are baby Lily born on 17 January, with happy parents Beatriz Morgado Malcolm and her partner, Tom. The reaction to the reopening has been very positive, with pregnant mothers (past, present and future!) all saying they welcome the popular Chippy unit being fully back in action. Local MP Robert Courts told the News he welcomed the reopening as 'fantastic news, giving greater and more local choices' for parents. He hopes to come and visit soon. Maternity staffing remains a local and national issue - and that there will no doubt be future challenges.

All change for our MPs

In case you missed it, for the next UK General Election, Chipping Norton will probably be electing a Banbury MP, not one for Witney. The wider area's increased housing, (particularly in nearby Bicester), justifies creating a new Bicester and Woodstock seat which will 'steal' voters from both current Banbury and Witney seats - which then have to make up their numbers. So Chipping Norton and Charlbury 'move' to Banbury, and Witney 'acquires' villages towards Oxford. All this is after the UK Boundary Commission review, with changes planned to happen by 2024. Current MPs have to decide which new seat to fight. Banbury's incumbent, Conservative Victoria Prentis, says she will stay based in Banbury. Witney's MP, Conservative Robert Courts, according to his office, stays to defend the 'new' Witney seat, even though his home (near Woodstock) now comes under Bicester.

Based on the 2019 voting pattern, both current Tory MPs are predicted to hold their 'reorganised' seats, but, based on current opinion polls, pollsters Electoralcalculus suggest Labour would have a 10% lead in Banbury and a 4% lead in Witney. Lib Dems would also probably fight Witney confidently. Labour and Lib Dem parties will no doubt be announcing their candidates soon. Meanwhile in Witney, a local campaign group, 'RobertCourtWatch.com' took to the

streets at Christmas - pressing our MP to do more on climate change. They are publicising his speeches and voting record on key environmental issues. Mr Courts was quoted saying, I am proud of the actions taken by the Government to tackle climate change.'

So we now need one extra local MP, in what has been safe Tory territory. Could this entice some still-ambitious current Conservative MPs, for example with marginal London seats at risk in the next election, to call into the pubs of Burford, Charlbury or Woodstock (to be based in the three different constituencies!) to drum up some support?

90 new homes – not in Plan!

At least 90 new Chippy homes could be coming, on land beyond the Cricket Club, which is not in the much-discussed East Chippy/Tank Farm site, nor in our Local Plan - and gives our Town and West Oxfordshire District Councils some interesting questions. The land, between Banbury and London Road, was bought by Henley-in-Arden development company Rainier who plan to submit a planning application for outline consent for up to 90 homes immediately to the east of the cricket pitch, as a first phase of a much larger aspiration, which their website says could be 400-500 new homes. They are meeting the Town Council and Cricket Club - and ran an online consultation for the public from 10-25 January. Chippy News and the Town Council posted this online, but no doubt many people missed it! Rainier say their plans provide 40% affordable homes and additional open space, but early public responses raise concerns about inadequate, already struggling, infrastructure such as sewers, Health Centre, and town car parking.

With this site not in the current Local Plan, Rainier are likely to be doing this now because East Chippy's development has stalled, for a variety of reasons, including recent archaeological interest. This leaves WODC unable to prove it has sufficient development land coming forward to meet housing targets. So, the planning process requires other sites to be considered. Regrettably, this is likely to be on a piecemeal basis, making the provision of infrastructure such as new primary school, health, sports, traffic relief, and town parking much harder to secure. £2 fares for local bus rides

Stagecoach have volunteered to take part in a Deptment for Transport scheme running until the end of March limiting single bus fares (including child and student tickets) to a maximum of $\pounds 2$. This should help people to leave the car at home at this time of high petrol and diesel prices and restore bus usage post-pandemic. The scheme applies to the S3/NS3

to Oxford, 488/489 to Banbury and 50 to Stratford. It does not apply to the X9 to Charlbury and Witney as Pulhams have decided to only apply the scheme to their route 51 between Stratford and Moreton.

Top dogs at Henry Cornish

Before Christmas, Chippy's Henry Cornish Care Centre hosted its first dog show fundraiser! The Centre, managed by

Organiser Tina Brain, the Care Centre's Activities Coordinator, said, 'Well done to all our winners and runners-up. Thanks to everyone who helped organise and came - we can't wait until next year's show'!

Hailey Ave affordable homes

Twelve new affordable homes are to be built in Chipping Norton on Hailey Avenue by Cottsway Housing Association, if the planning application is approved. The proposal is to demolish 20 existing substandard flats in the interlinked Bliss, Brassey, and Wilkins Houses, replacing them with four Ibedroomed flats, four 2-bedroomed flats, two 2-bedroomed houses and two 3-bedroomed houses. These would be affordable or social rented homes allocated according to local need from WODC's Housing Need Register. Having written to 85 local residents last June about this, Cottsway received responses supporting the site redevelopment and the higher energy standard proposed. But it also heard concerns from neighbours about lack of information about levels and about being overlooked from the flats. One neighbour told the News, 'These plans don't take into account that Chipping Norton is on a hill and our homes are lower, so with such an imposing new building, so much nearer than the existing buildings and with so many new windows looking directly over us, it will be like living in a goldfish bowl! We explained all of this to Cottsway back in June, but they've not listened and have gone ahead for planning permission anyway'. The Town Council raised no objection but asked if flats could be

built to higher energy conservation standards and for more clarity about the affordability/social rented status. The planning application will be determined by WODC.

Progress at Police Station

Many readers will be pleased to see work now well in progress at the former Chipping Norton Police Station – transforming it, as per planning permission, into three houses and four flats, and adding one further house. Developer Mark Edwards of Nimbus Property Developments Ltd bought the building, vacated by Thames Valley Police, in 2019. Building work started last autumn and the properties should be available for sale shortly through Chippy estate agents Mark David. The *Chippy News* team were offered a sneak peek of the work, still very much in progress, and were able to appreciate



the attention to detail in the renovation. The existing structure is being stripped back and restored and quirky details that reveal the building's heritage, such as the cells and historic locks, retained and re-used. Historic England declined to add the building to its Statutory List of Buildings of Architectural or Historic Interest because better examples of similar buildings by the same architect were already listed, including in Witney. Nevertheless, the developer is treating the building as if it were statutorily protected and has even moved to live in Chippy so he can keep a close eye on the works! Help in cost of living crisis

Times are tough and getting tougher. So, what support is available to people like us? Chippy District Councillor Mike Cahill says, 'Our main problems are to do with food and energy - for heating, cooking, washing ourselves and clothes. This is where Councils and Voluntary Organisations come in - when they work together things happen: our Town Council supports the work of Chippy Larder, which has run three sessions where organisations like Citizens Advice, Cottsway Housing, Age UK, and others have come together to be available to residents needing help. The next session is on Thursday 2 February in the Warm Space provided by Chippy Library, from 10am to 12.30pm. All welcome! Go to westoxon.gov.uk/costoflivingsupport to find out what support your District Council is providing to individuals and community groups. For example, £40,000 is available to support local food networks and £50,000 for groups running schemes tackling isolation, health, and wellbeing'. Diddly Squat – planning appeal

In the continuing saga of Diddly Squat Farm Shop, planning appeals by the owner are set for an informal hearing on 14 March. The appeals are firstly against WODC's refusal of



permission for a car park extension at the Farm Shop, and secondly against an Enforcement Notice requiring any restaurant use to cease. National media widely reported in January that Jeremy Clarkson had given up his intention to run a restaurant. He was quoted saying, 'I have been thwarted by the Enforcement Notice', giving the impression he had caved in to WODC's action. However, that is not the full story. His actual Personal Statement (part of the normal process), written to the Planning Inspector hearing his Appeal, was, 'I no longer wish to open a restaurant ... but we still have nine cows, and a growing passel of pigs. It's my hope we can sell the meat from these, cooked in the mobile food van at the back of the shop. We do not wish to expand the on-site businesses any further. We are perfectly happy with what we have. A little shop, and the lambing barn ... for lambing in the spring and

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for people to sit in the summer while they have food and a glass of our own beer from the mobile van'. So, he still wants to serve food and drink at the shop for customers to consume in the adjacent lambing shed. He just no longer wants to run the more recent venture — a separate restaurant, in the middle of a field, accessed only by tractor.

So, Mr Clarkson's Appeal against WODC's Enforcement Notice is still going ahead. As is his Appeal against refusal of permission for an enlarged car park. The Farm Shop was closed after Christmas until 10 February. The new season of Clarkson's Farm airs on Amazon Prime on, guess when, 10 February! The News asked Mr Clarkson's PA for comment, which is awaited. He has chosen, perhaps uncharacteristically, a non-confrontational process known as an Informal Hearing - which normally takes the form of a quiet conversation, a form of mediation between Appellant and Local Planning Authority, sitting in a room with a Planning Inspector. Normally, no other people are involved - no objectors, no supporters, no neighbours, no press, certainly no film crew. But followers of this saga will recall the crowds and media, including Amazon TV, that flocked to WODC's Council Chamber to witness the determination of the Diddly Squat planning applications. A WODC spokesperson told the News they are discussing potential venues with the Planning Inspectorate, where security can be controlled, and expect to announce the venue by the end of January. It is unlikely to be quiet affair. You can follow the appeal via https://acp.planninginspectorate.gov.uk/ by searching under appeal reference APP/D3125/W/22/3308506.

The MP, with the Penhurst team, ran activities to demonstrate how dementia can affect everyday activities and is looking forward to similar events in 2023. Chippy woman saved by King

A new book reveals the story of a young 18th century Chipping Norton wife sentenced to death but reprieved by the King! The book – The Butcher, The Tailor, The Picture-Frame Maker ... Stories of Middle Way – tells of people linked with author Gareth Winrow's home road in Summertown, Oxford. Previously a professor of international relations, Gareth now researches family, social, and local history.

In the book, Gareth tells the story of Elizabeth Wisdome (née Buswell) born 1725 into a well-todo, God-fearing family who lived in Chipping Norton. It seems her family had some claim on land in Summertown. had married Thomas Rose Wisdome, a grocer from Chipping Norton; he was wellknown in the Town and his mother was a Norgrove, another

famous Chippy family who owned the Town's two largest tanyards. But in 1749, newly-wed Elizabeth was convicted for jealously murdering her housemaid Grace Hall, by poisoning a pudding! Her case attracted national publicity. Sentenced to death, Elizabeth had received the last rites, but was saved in the nick of time by the intervention of King George II. Lady Susan Keck, daughter of the Duke of Hamilton, was convinced Elizabeth was innocent and contacted the Countess of Yarmouth, the King's mistress — pictured above. She apparently persuaded the King to pardon Elizabeth, who survived many years, had several children and remarried a Mr Slatter (another well-known local name!) after Thomas died. Author Gareth contacted the News after finding very few references to all this in our Town histories. The book is out on 28 February, £8.99 from Amazon or The Book Guild.

New plan for Mill House Hotel

The Daylesford Estate is having a second attempt to bring the Mill House Hotel, Kingham, vacant since December 2017,

back to life. Three years ago, the planning application for a 33bedroom hotel was withdrawn just as it was about to be refused. A new application, with a totally revamped design, shows the former mid-C18th grain mill being restored and extended to create a restaurant, ale house, reception, bakehouse, and demonstration barn. 38 bedrooms will be arranged in semi-detached thatched cottages fronting Station Road, inspired by estate cottages around the country. The mill leat and public right of way will be retained and improved, and grounds landscaped to include cottage gardens producing food and fruit for the restaurant and Farm Shop. An electric shuttle bus will ferry visitors between station, hotel, village, and Daylesford Organics, and supplies will be shuttled from Farm Shop to Hotel by buggy. Architect Ben Pentreath, who counts the King and Duchess of Cambridge as clients, held a consultation with local residents last September, reporting positive feedback. There seems less public protest than with the earlier application. The Parish Council is in support. If approved, this would bring Daylesford's investment in the local hospitality industry to four establishments: Daylesford Organic Farm Shop and Bamford Wellness Spa, The Wild Rabbit, The Fox at Oddington, and now the Mill House Hotel - plus numerous cottages to let around Kingham.

Enstone car museum plan

Following local public exhibitions (see December's News), a detailed planning application was submitted to West Oxfordshire District Council for a major classic car museum and holiday home complex at Enstone Airfield aiming to bring visitors and significant economic benefits to the area. This is the brainchild of American millionaire and classic car enthusiast, Peter Mullin. Outline planning permission was granted in 2020 for a development, but a new application was needed because of changes to the plan, including adding more temporary exhibition space, increasing the holiday home numbers, but reducing the overall development area. Pre-application discussions and local exhibitions heard concerns raised again about traffic generation and questions on how the local community will benefit. WODC Councillors are to consider the application after another formal consultation.

Gypsy site Appeal Hearing

A planning Appeal against the refusal of permission for a caravan site to house a Gypsy or Traveller extended family off the Over Norton Road will be heard at an Informal Hearing in West Oxfordshire District Council Chamber, Wood Green, Witney at 10am on 7 February. WODC say they are sending letters to interested parties who have previously commented on the application.

Boost for The Branch hub

Building work started in earnest just before Christmas at the old NatWest Bank building in Chipping Norton's Market Square. This is for a new community hub to be run by The Branch charity, set up by supporters at St Mary's Church. With space for community use, The Branch will include helping

people access skill and courses. The charity has been busy fundraising for the project, and received a boost in December when West Oxfordshire District Council approved a £50,000 grant particularly to help with a community hall. This is from WODC's Community Facilities Grant Scheme - which has provided nearly £500,000 recently to local community groups. On a visit to Chippy, Cllr Joy Altman, WODC's Cabinet member for stronger healthy communities, was pictured outside the building with The Branch's Emma Kennedy. The project builders, Savvy, are now fully engaged on site - one of their first tasks was to remove a massive bank safe from the basement. The builders' compound to receive and store materials, surrounded by hoardings, has to be at the front as there is no rear access. Emma told the News that graphic designs for the hoarding are underway, to include update information panels and the story of The Branch. Contractors are trying to minimise disruption for others, using the New Street car park, not the Market Place, for their vehicles.

Town traffic & safety update

Updates at Chippy Town Council's January Traffic Advisory Committee include:

Albion Street crossing – a draft design from Oxfordshire County Council for the London Road junction, to improve pedestrian safety, was recommended for approval. OCC will need to do a detailed design with construction possible during the next financial year. OCC are also meant to be looking at New Street crossings and junction improvements, but no news yet!

County Transport priorities – Next year's OCC's transport budget will prioritise walking, cycling, and public transport. The current parking and bus fare deal at the Park & Rides will extend into the new year. Seedcorn funding will help develop a freight strategy, key for the 'A44 corridor' study to impact HGVs through Chippy.

Town cycling, walking and public transport – The Town's cycling group already has a map of potential out of town cycle paths. They've also contributed to an OCC study into a strategic logistics hub with routes to Charlbury and Hanborough. The Committee stressed the importance of walking, cycling, and public transport routes in and from our new housing developments – from The Pillars (already built)

and potential new housing sites such as the Rainier site beyond the Cricket Club.

Speeding and safety – Measures to reduce Churchill Road speeding, and clearance of leaves from key footpaths, will be looked at urgently. The light-controlled crossing from The Pillars across Banbury Road is still not switched on, and OCC officers will chase developers. With snow still likely, the Committee was reminded that salt bins are regularly checked – and additional bins have been provided at the Health Centre.

Hooky's shire horse celebrated

Hook Norton Brewery have just launched a special brew which they've named Command & Conquer to celebrate their late muchloved Shire Horse, Commander.

Memories, School pupils 70 years back were still instructed



in the industrial specialities of the country's locations: Northampton shoes; Lancashire cotton; Birmingham, workshop of the world; and Burton-on-Trent, the beer town. Sadly, those vast Burton breweries have diminished, along with the magnificent Shire Horses employed in distributing the product and manipulating trucks in the railway sidings and over the innumerable (and frustrating!) level crossings. Happily though, the association of Shire Horses with traditional brewing has continued elsewhere. The Hook Norton Brewery Shire Horse trio are regularly seen making deliveries around the Town as full members of the brewery workforce - they also enjoy a bottle of the stuff! His passion for the Shire also has Brewery Managing Director, James Clarke, as a trustee for the Shire Horse Society. Throughout summer, horses and horsebox tour the country visiting local and national shows for demonstrations and competitions.



The new specialedition premium ale. Command & Conquer, brewed with the help of Head Coachman Nick Carter and Groom Alyster. Nick called it, 'a fitting tribute to a noble horse and friend. He was a loyal colleague of the brewery for

the last four years of his life, a steady hand with a larger-thanlife character'. The beer is available in the brewery shop, online at www.hooky.co.uk and at selected Hook Norton pubs.A donation from sales goes to The War Horse Memorial, which honours the service of animals in war and supports animals in need. As an aside, in 1930, 66-year-old champion walker George Cummings walked from London to Burton-

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on-Trent consuming only beer, at the rate of 100 miles to the gallon. To compare this with Commander's consumption, do bear in mind that George was not pulling a loaded dray.

Old Post Office for sale

One of Chipping Norton's most prominent buildings, the former Post Office along West Street at Burford Road, is up

for sale. The Vintage Sports-Car Club has occupied the basement and ground floor since buying the property in 1998. Tania Brown, Club Secretary, told the News, 'The Old Post Office (fondly called TOPO) has served our needs well for 25

years, but The Board took the decision that the Club needed to consider a more suitable home, to act as a destination for our members. The Old Post Office has limited parking and is not a true clubhouse or venue for Club activities in the way many members would like'. There's no decision yet on any new home.

Opened in 1931 by Mayor G H Hannis, the neo-Georgian-style stone building cost £7,000 and received much acclaim in local press. Described as 'of admirable design, probably one of the most up to date [Post Offices] in the country', stores and an engineering workshop were in its basement, staff accommodation on the first floor and woodpanelled Public Office, Sorting Office and Telephone Exchange on the ground floor. It even boasted an all-night telephone, accessible from outside! The technology may have changed, but the building has stood the test of time and, almost a century later, is still a good-looking solid property, listed as a

building of Local Interest by WODC. Fischer German, estate agents, told the News that open days in January had attracted a lot of interest. They were now only accepting unconditional offers over £650,000 (ie not subject to planning permission). They suggested new owners would convert the entire building to residential, with the property expected to change hands soon.

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

A new book, the Unremaining Glory: Roy Worvill — Chipping Norton Astronomer, tells the story of this interesting local man through his childhood memoirs from 1920s Chipping Norton. They evoke a vivid picture of life in the Town at that time. They are enhanced by contemporary images from Chipping Norton Museum's vast Picture Collection, taken by Frank Packer. Roy's son,

Kevin, has written an introduction with some biographical information about his father and his lifelong passion for astronomy. Roy was born in 1914, taught at local secondary schools and



wrote many guides for amateur astronomers and lectured widely. He wrote *The Sky at Night* column for the *Oxford Mail* for 20 years (1957–77), and became well known with his *Look Aloft* night-sky features for the *Eagle* comic, and a whole Ladybird series on astronomy and space in the 1960s and 70s. In 2019, Virgin Galactic's test pilot took a copy of Roy's Ladybird book, *Exploring Space*, with him because it had inspired him to become an astronaut. Fatal accidents inquests

A formal Inquest was held before Christmas concerning the fatal accident, early in 2022, on the A44 at the top of New Street in Chipping Norton, which resulted in the death of a pedestrian, Derek Thornton. It heard that the driver of the vehicle involved had just waved another pedestrian across the road, but didn't see Mr Thornton, who, he later believed, had stepped into his blind spot. Another driver desperately tried to warn the truck, by sounding their horn, but the truck driver wasn't sure what was wrong, thinking his truck was possibly obstructing the other driver. The truck driver involved passed all the usual drug, alcohol, and eyesight tests, and the truck was relatively new (2016). The Inquest recorded a conclusion of a road traffic collision-related death. No criminal charges are being brought against the truck driver, who was in tears as he spoke at the inquest.

More recently, Dylan Moyce, another Chipping Norton resident, died in an accident on the A44 at Cross Hands (near the Greedy Goose). The circumstances are unclear. What is

known is that Mr Moyce was driving a silver Audi TT which came off the road around 7.50am on Sunday 20 November. He died of severe head trauma and the Inquest will be held on 5 April. Police have appealed for witnesses, particularly from motorists with dash-cams who might have been passing shortly before the crash, or who saw the crash itself.



Major local solar farm plan

With climate change and energy prices on our minds, a planning application for a very local (1000 large hectare) solar farm, called Botley West, has headlines. According to the developers **Photovolt** Development Partners (PVDP), the 840MW of new green energy could power 330,000 Oxfordshire homes. However, campaign group CPRE has raised concern over lack of information. They say it will significantly impact Tackley, Wootton, Glympton,

Woodstock, Long Han-borough, Church Hanborough, Rousham, Eynsham, and Cassington in West Oxfordshire, just by the sheer scale of the development, approximately 2600 football pitches in size. The cumulative impact could reduce agricultural land and 'industrialise' the rural area. Chipping Norton MP Robert Courts has questioned the scale of the proposal – starting his own survey of local residents' views so he can 'reflect the strength of local feeling'.

The Botley West proposal is considered a Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP). It bypasses the usual planning process run by District Councils. Instead, a six-stage process must follow. The first phase consultation was from 3 November to 22 December when developers provided the initial proposal, but without full details. All the feedback is now being considered by the project team to help shape detailed proposals. Are we still a Market Town?

Time for a market debate? – Not long ago, Chippy had three thriving markets, but it seems, no longer. The weekly Saturday Lower Town Hall Country Market (originally started by the WI) stopped and the monthly privately run Farmers Market was down to one stall in December. The main weekly Wednesday Market on the lower marketplace, organised and run by West Oxfordshire District Council, was down to half a dozen stalls. It recently had space for 16 pitches, and there was a time when traders had to join a waiting list. What's happening and can anything be done?



Chipping Norton's market heritage – for over 800 years the Town has been a natural hub for trading, with markets evolving through the medieval wool boom and beyond. WODC describe Chippy and Witney as 'Charter Markets' but there is in fact no record of any Charter specifically given for a weekly market here. The Town was given a springboard by Lord of the Manor William Fitzalan who was granted a Charter by King John in 1204 for an annual 'Fair' lasting four days - basically a holiday where much trading did in fact go on. Fitzalan laid out the marketplace and invested much in the Town. Previously called just 'Norton', an added prefix (originally meaning 'good bargain') became 'Chepyngnorton' and Fitzalan started 'extracting tolls' from traders. King John got his share. The weekly markets evolved. Much later in 1606/7 King James granted Chippy's 'Town Charter' - as a Borough to run its own affairs. In time it took over running the weekly market. However, the 1974 local government changes saw the 'Borough' disbanded - and affairs, including the Wednesday Market and its income, passed to the new West Oxfordshire District Council.



Recent challenges and uncertainty – The Wednesday Market has had tough times – a review by WODC in 2019 took stock, noting reduced nearby footfall (particularly with the closure of HSBC and NatWest) and out-of-town developments such as Aldi and the M&S retail park – with shops like Mountain Warehouse and Pets Corner competing with traditional market stalls. WODC also cite untidiness and the sloping site which hamper any development. WODC's report looked at

options such as finding a private operator but nothing was done – it was still (to quote) 'a useful source of revenue for the Council'. Covid then hit, and now there is a 12 month period with disruption from the hoardings outside the old bank redevelopment, cutting the market in two. Traders also complain about parked cars left there – with no WODC traffic wardens early on a Wednesday morning to police it.

What do stallholders think? — A quick survey of stallholders last month saw mixed views. Nigel Price (household goods and basic clothing) — pictured — and the card stall holder both hung up their Chipping Norton hats on 21 December. Mick (Isla Bakery) said Chippy had his lowest footfall — and he takes



more unsold goods home. Mike (woven baskets) has more of a 'things come, things go' attitude. Trading for many years, he loves doing it (he is worth a chat!). Mark (green groceries) says change is inevitable, but is optimistic that the market will continue. Costs are another challenge — traders work markets far apart, including in Bedfordshire and Buckinghamshire. Fuel prices take their toll. For some, Chipping Norton is the most expensive, and for several, the least rewarding.



Great value, great bargains – In the end, survival (or not) will depend on us, the punters. Mark's fruit and veg stall has excellent quality produce, unusual items, and seemingly long-lasting veggies. Similarly Ali's nuts, olive and Middle Eastern delicacies stand has the best hummus for miles around. Steve, the flower man, has a wide choice of cut flowers and cheap plants, John and Martin's fish van has a wide range of fresh fish, and Mick has an agreement with Nash's bakery on Topside to slice his loaves for free. You can buy outdoor wear on the clothes stall, and beautiful woven baskets from Mike. Many items are as cheap, cheaper, or better quality than you can find in large stores.

Time for some action? – Traders say that, in spite of taking income and expensive rents, WODC have made little effort to promote or invest in Chippy's Wednesday Market – particularly since Covid and with the current disruptions. WODC are currently trumpeting a move to become more flexible on pavement trading by shops, but what could be done with this market, such as using other streets, investing in attractive stalls and attracting more local suppliers? There has been little sign of marketing, public investment or proactive management. The success of this year's Christmas in Chippy outdoor market showed how both suppliers and punters want to trade in Chippy. Perhaps more could be done?

Michael Fletcher 1944-2022

Chipping Norton's Michael Fletcher, former Personnel Manager of Parker Knoll, distinguished Town Clerk, and valued member of our Methodist Church died just before Christmas, aged 78.



Life and career in Chippy – Michael was born at the War Memorial Hospital in 1944, attended school in Church Street and the Grammar School, and started work in the Borough Council offices at the Guildhall in 1961 gaining further qualifications at Banbury and Oxford FE colleges. In 1971, he began a 25-year career at Parker Knoll's furniture factory as Cost Office Manager, later becoming Personnel Manager. He formed friendships, and his accumulated local knowledge made him an ideal candidate for the role of Town Clerk for the Town Council – starting in 1997, retiring in 2004 but returning in 2006 to help for 10 years as Deputy Clerk. Michael took on many voluntary roles in Chipping Norton, with the Hospital League of Friends, the Volunteer Fire Brigade Trust and Chipping Norton School Governors. He was also a member of the Bliss Probus Group.

A tribute for Town service - Former Mayor, long-serving

Town Councillor and Chair of the Hospital League of Friends, Jo Graves, said: 'I was very privileged as a "novice" councillor to have the wise counsel guidance Michael Fletcher as Town Clerk. A true gentleman in every sense, he encapsulated fully the seven principles of Public life namely: Selflessness, Integrity, Objectivity, Openness, Honesty Accountability respectful style as the Officer of the Town

Council reassured me during my terms of office as Chairman of the Town Council and Town Mayor. He was the fount of all knowledge in dealing with protocol and always available to give advice and guidance — always ready to listen. As a longstanding fellow Committee member of the League of Friends, his knowledge as a son of Chipping Norton would come into play as the League navigated all the changes to Primary Healthcare over the decades. Michael will be missed and I shall remember him with affection and respect'.

Friendship, worship and music - Michael met Freda when he worked at the Guildhall in the 1960s and they were married at Chipping Norton Methodist Church in 1969. It was through Freda that Michael became involved with the Methodist Church, initially through the Young People's Group. They both became valued members of the congregation and Michael took on many roles, including leading services. Later he became the Church pianist and then organist, playing every Sunday, and for weddings and funerals. Michael had a natural musical ability that was evident when he played, and he could both read music and play by ear. In 1980, Michael took part in Songs of Praise which was broadcast from Chipping Norton: he talked about his role at Parker Knoll, the certainty of numbers, and his faith. In 2009, Michael and Freda celebrated their 50th Wedding Anniversary.

Michael's Methodist community - Former Mayor, Methodist Senior Steward and longstanding friend, Martin Hannant, said: 'Michael has been a part of Chipping Norton Methodist Church as long as anyone can remember. So many different roles, so many different hats, so many years that it is difficult to remember all. He has been a vital and consistent cog in the running of our Church for over 50 years. His faith shone through his eyes and was carried through by his heart. There is a Michael-shaped hole in the heart of our Church. That hole will surely and slowly over time be filled but his mark will always be left on the Church. Nobody can ever forget Michael, his great faith, his sense of humour, his love and his smile. We are so blessed to have had him as part of our lives and as part of our church. It is a great tribute to Michael and Freda that our Church is still flourishing when so many are having to close. God bless you, Michael'.

Kindness and warmth remembered — Michael always took an interest in people and met them with a smile and warm greeting. It was through his friends in the Walking Group that Michael would make his second national television appearance, in a brief cameo on Clarkson's Farm (Series I, Episode 5)! He would always find time to chat and would offer to help people when he could. Michael lived his whole life in Chipping Norton and although he enjoyed visiting other places, Chipping Norton was definitely his home. He was a familiar face in the Town and he will be missed not only by his family, but by many more. He is survived by his wife Freda, three children and six grandchildren.

Michael was diagnosed with cancer in September 2021 and died on 17 December 2022. His memorial service on 16 January saw a full and overflowing Methodist Church, followed by a reception in the Town Hall for representatives of the Town, family and friends to celebrate his friendship and service.

Robin Howard - 1928-2023

The News Team was sad to hear, just before going to press, of the death of Chipping Norton resident Robert Weston (Robin) Howard, at the age of 94½. Robin had a long and distinguished career serving the Church, and was featured with a profile in the Chipping Norton News some years ago. It is hoped to publish a full tribute in a future issue. Our thoughts are with all his friends and family.

Rachel Foakes 1969-2022



The Mayor and Chipping Norton's community shared a deep sadness at the news of the sudden death in November, aged 53, of Rachel Foakes. She was a valued Town Councillor and Deputy Mayor, as well as an inspirational, caring, practical, much-loved daughter, mother, wife, neighbour, advocate, writer

and friend to very many. Rachel, husband Andrew and their family moved to Chipping Norton in 2016 (something Rachel 'just made happen') partly to be with a caring community and schools that could do the best for her children – Grace, Frank and Anna, who suffered from debilitating epilepsy. Rachel had a busy professional, home and lately community life, but also fought passionately for the best for her family and others, particularly those needing similar special help.

After early life near Watford, Rachel studied modern history in Oxford, living life to the full and making many lifelong friends. From her childhood, writing was a passion. She edited Cherwell, the University newspaper, and took up writing professionally, under her name Rachel Bladon, becoming a prolific and talented writer of educational books, including most recently working as Series Editor for OUP's successful Oxford Bookworms series. One legacy is hundreds of books and thousands of new enthusiastic readers. A varied career also saw her working in publishing in Hong Kong for three years where her husband Andrew was teaching in an international school. She loved living in Hong Kong and had many friends from her time and travels there. Tributes from her many friends called her kind, caring, deeply committed, taking on all (sometimes too many) challenges and 'just getting on with it'. She knew for herself what was right - and believed in making the most of life. She made friends wherever she went. In Chippy, when Covid hit, she started a 'help your neighbour' scheme in The Leys (a road she loved to call home) with a friend, volunteered as a vaccinator - and latterly has been teaching English to local Ukrainian families.

In 2021, a neighbour (and an article in the Chippy News!) gave her the idea of joining the Town Council, as she said, 'to make our beautiful town an even better place to live and work'. Mayor Sandra Coleman found her an energetic friend and ally saying 'she was a committed, kind and dedicated Council member. I loved working with Rachel because she had a real knack of identifying what needed to be done - and finding a way to facilitate change, taking others with her. She was keen on strong communication, introduced our regular Council Newsletter and set up Saturday surgeries for local residents to meet Councillors. Rachel was also helping lead on making the Town pedestrian-friendly and pesticide-free. I will always remember Rachel's smile, her ability to ask the right questions (and ensure she got an answer!), her honesty and willingness to get on with the task in hand. I was honoured to have her as my Deputy Mayor.'

Rachel loved the outdoors, was an energetic tennis player, a recent enthusiastic sailor, loved walking around town chatting, and in the countryside with beloved dog Otto. She

will be missed by so many. As her Uncle Bob, the celebrant at her funeral, said: 'Rachel did friendship beautifully — always kind, gentle and wise, offering support and advice. She was selfless, thoughtful, compassionate, warm hearted and gave so much to everyone — never complaining or putting herself first ... she was unstoppable!' In December, friends and family celebrated Rachel's life, fittingly, at Chippy's centre in the Town Hall. PUBS ON THE UP!

Hospitality has had a hard time recently – but for 2023 some pubs around Chipping Norton are making the news for good reasons. Here are some highlights.

Black Horse is back! First, there's great news that

Salford's village pub — only a two-mile scenic cross country stroll from Chipping Norton — will be reopening this year under its old local name, The Black Horse (pictured is the old sign). New boss there Alex Daly told the News he



and the team were looking forward to welcoming food and drink enthusiasts this summer for both inside and alfresco dining in the garden. Alex is part of the team at the entrepreneurial Lionhearth Group, who run the popular foodie pubs **The Chequers in Churchill** and **The Swan at Ascott-under-Wychwood**. They are also looking at other possible new sites.

Cooking the Goose Up the road from Salford, exciting plans for **The Greedy Goose**, closed since 2021, are afoot. Tom Hartley Jnr (pictured) well known as a classic



car collector but a newcomer to hospitality, bought the site as a venture back in 2021's lockdown. He now has planning permission for 10 new luxury holiday lodges in the grounds and told the News he's working on a complete redesign for the pub, with excellent site parking space.

He's been watching other local pub moves enthusiastically, says the redevelopment could be done in 12 months, and he's looking forward to trying his hand at hospitality. Tom's passion for classic cars also fits well locally with the big new Mullin automotive museum planned at Enstone.

Village ventures

Late 2022 saw changes in nearby villages. The Crown at Church Enstone is now run by food enthusiasts Matt and Katie Beamish, who also run the popular dining pubs The Kingham Plough and The Hare at Milton-



under-Wychwood. Then, what was 'the Artyard Café in Enstone has new leaseholders, Ben and Hannah Nunesvaz. The Harrow Inn (pictured) has reverted to its old name – with a makeover and complete new food offer – including using meat from Chippy butcher Trev Beadle. Not to be outdone, Chippy's even closer neighbouring village, Over Norton, is restarting its pop-up pub in the Village Hall in Choice Hill Road – aiming for the last Friday each month. It starts at 7pm – bring your own booze, nibbles and glasses!

Daylesford diners Local hospitality ventures linked with Daylesford Organics continue to flourish — with **The Wild Rabbit in Kingham** achieving a Top 50 Boutique Hotel rating judged by 100 people in the hospitality industry. Many of its food ingredients come from the Daylesford market garden. An associated company has now submitted a new



planning application to rebuild Kingham's Mill House Hotel (see page 9). The Daylesford portfolio also includes the upgraded Fox Inn at Lower Oddington (pictured), reopened in

2022, which received a pre-Christmas favourable restaurant review by critic Giles Coren in *The Times*. Forbes magazine called Daylesford's Lady Carole Bamford 'The Cotswolds Queen' and recom-



mended trying The Fox's *Punchy Fox* cocktail, made with pineapple rum, cane rum and Daylesford limoncello – as well as local gins and wines crafted at Daylesford's sister estate Château Léoube in the South of France. Watch out for other new local Bamford dining ventures near Chippy soon.

Plaudits & Awards The Fox in Lower Oddington was also one of the local village gastropubs mentioned in the The Sunday Times list of 100 Best Places to Stay in Britain for 2023. Others included The Royal Oak Ramsden, a coaching inn and public house for almost 250 years, marked up after a sympathetic facelift when it was bought by locals Notting Hill film producer Tim Bevan and artist Amy Gadney, two years ago. Sunday Times reviewers called the refurbished interiors as 'effortlessly alluring as Julia Roberts'! The 17th century George Inn at Barford St Michael, is praised for its 'fabulous' food and 'boutique' bedrooms but considered 'suspiciously cheap'! It was restored by owners wine merchant Louis Holtzhausen and his wife Laura. Finally, The Lamb Inn in Shipton-under-Wychwood was named Best Pub in the GQ Food & Drink Awards 2022, with reviewer Susan



d'Arcy praising the 'dashing respectability' of quirky photography and mounted butterflies and flying insects, but noting a 'frisson of dissolute intention' hanging over the bar in what

she calls 'a proper boozer'. Co-owners Tom Noest and Peter Creed (pictured), both Cotswolds born and bred, also operate **The Little Bell** within **Soho Farmhouse**.



A Chippy family that made their mark!

The story of Laban Betterton and George Sewell

Ex-Chippy girl Jane Leahy (née Sewell), now in her 70s living with husband Peter in Worcester, has been researching her family history for 15 years – and told the News her own history, and the story of two ancestors – one the first to be buried in the 'new' Worcester Road Cemetery, and the other, one of the last laid to rest in St Mary's Churchyard.

I was born in the War Memorial Hospital in 1951, attended

New Street Infants, St Mary's Junior Girls' School in Burford Road and Chipping Norton School – then teacher training in London. I met my husband Peter (from Heythrop) at school and we later married in 1973 at Holy Trinity Church. This picture was taken by Frank Griffiths, manager of Hartwells hardware shop on High Street, our neighbour in The Leys. We moved to Redditch where I taught. I think my father and aunt (out of 11) were the last Sewells to live in Chipping Norton, but over



100 years, Sewells lived in London Road, Bolton's Yard, Spring Street, Church Lane, West End, Diston's Lane, The Leys and Dunstan Avenue. They worked in chairmaking, glovemaking, at Bliss Tweed Mill and the building trade.

Laban Betterton

One of the last graves at St Mary's Churchyard



My Great, Great Grandfather, Laban Betterton was born in 1809 in Over Norton, married Charlotte Keen in 1833 and by 1841 was recorded as living in West End, Chipping Norton. The 1871 census, records him as an agricultural worker with eight children. He was clearly not a wealthy man and at one time he was convicted of stealing turnips to feed his family. There is nothing to suggest his finances improved

over the years, so it may puzzle some that his grave is marked with a headstone (pictured above).

Laban's headstone reads: IN MEMORY OF LABAN BETTERTON WHO DIED OCTOBER 28th 1875 AGED 66 YEARS BLESSED ARE THE DEAD WHICH DIE IN THE LORD ERECTED BY HIS SISTER MARY ANN ALLEN

The Mary Allen (née Betterton) mentioned was Laban's younger sister, who married William Allen (1814–1892)

recorded in several censuses as a baker. In later life, William owned several cottages and the Newmarket Inn (then next door to the Fox Hotel). Perhaps Mary had access to funds allowing her to erect her brother's headstone. We have to thank her for that, as many graves of the labouring classes were unmarked.

George Sewell

First burial at Worcester Road

My Great, Great Uncle, George Sewell is also commemorated with the dubious honour of being first Chipping Norton citizen buried in the new Worcester Road cemetery opened Mary's because St churchyard was considered full. He was in the first family of Sewells to arrive in Norton. Chipping William, the family head was a chairmaker from



High Wycombe. Although married in Chipping Norton in 1815, he did not move to the Town with his large family until the late 1830s. The 1841 census records him as living at New Chapel and in 1851 his family home was a London Road cottage. At age 18, George was still living with the family – listed as a chair-maker. By 1861, still a chair-maker he was married to Jane Harris, living in Bolton's Yard (off Goddard's Lane) with his wife and two daughters. George's brother Arthur and his wife Elizabeth (my Great Grandparents) also lived in Bolton's Yard.

George's memorial is inscribed: 'By Public Subscription to record the first interment in this cemetery on the 17th May 1882. In Memory of George Sewell Who died 13th May 1882 Aged 50 years. Also of Jane wife of George Sewell, Who died 2nd August 1901 Aged 67 years'

I feel fortunate that in one case, someone felt strongly that a burial place should be marked with a headstone and in another the death coincided with the opening of the new cemetery. These two events helped me update my family tree with a little about the circumstances surrounding their deaths. And in their own way, both Laban and George have made their mark on the Town – albeit unknown to them!

Many people in the Town have long held the belief that Chippy Baseball Club were at one time, British Champions! Introduced by Scout leader, Fred Lewis, in 1907 to his scouts,

the game had no strict rules or full equipment until the outbreak of WWI, but from then its popularity soared in the Town and local area and the Baseball Club was formed in 1920. An independent league was established and matches between Chippy and some Oxford Colleges and London clubs became a regular occurrence. At one time the

Club fielded five teams, including what many believe to be the earliest example of a 'mixed team', which was reported in *The Daily Mirror*, so it appears that Chippy also blazed a trail for women's participation in sport at this time!

There was no National Governing Body for Baseball between 1912 and 1933 and therefore unfortunately, NO

such as *The British Newspaper Archive*, we are starting to uncover more fascinating stories from Baseball's history, so I am hoping to challenge and rewrite the record to acknowledge the "champions" in the 1920's of whom Chipping Norton are worthy members'! Nearly 100 years later, it would be great to set the record straight!

with light/sun. Much to the children's delight the tree (Tom) started to grow up out of the giant pot. The children were very excited about digging the hole and more so when Beatrice found a worm, taking it in turns with Ben to look after it when digging.

The tree is called Albert and later in the year we are hoping to enjoy harvesting the apples for snack time. The tree is planted next to our other fruit trees, so during our Forest School sessions we will be making a sign and small fence for our new orchard area. This will be an area where we can make insect houses and provide different habitats for the wildlife that visits.

Treetech gave the children a book too, The LORAX by Dr Seuss which we have really enjoyed reading. The book is about the importance of being environmentally conscious. Amnesty petition to JCB owners



Members of Amnesty Chipping Norton pictured at a recent meeting with a cardboard cut-out JCB digger homes,

Amnesty Chipping Norton, in support of Amnesty International UK-wide campaign, are calling on JCB, through its Chairman, Bamford, to ensure its equipment is not used to demolish Palestinian homes. For over 55 years, Israel has been displacing Palestinians, demolishing

their livelihoods and seizing their land for Israeli settlers. This is a breach of the Geneva Conventions, which prohibit an occupying power from transferring its own civilians into the territory it occupies. For many years, JCB's machinery has been used by the Israeli authorities to demolish Palestinian homes and construct illegal Israeli settlements on the seized Palestinian land. JCB has not taken steps within the company's means to prevent its machinery from being used for these purposes although it possesses the necessary technology to pinpoint the use of its products anywhere in the world. Identifying this involvement and the means of preventing harm is a necessary and essential aspect of the international standard of human rights due diligence. JCB's failure to conduct proper human rights due diligence on the end uses of its products represents a failure to respect human rights. This is something a company must do at all times in line with international human rights standards for business, regardless

of business opportunity or expediency. For full information, see Amnesty International's report, published in November 2021, 'JCB Off Track, evading responsibility for human rights violations committed with JCB machines in the Occupied Palestinian Territories.'


Care Unit unsung heroes

Our community asked us to support the people of Ukraine. Within days we organised a drop-off point for much needed donations of first aid, food, clothes and bedding. We coordinated with Chippy School, charities and local people, filled a 7.5 tonne lorry and set off on a 4-day journey to deliver both donations and messages of love and support to

the people of Ukraine.

Help

Stepping up to School – In the summer we turned to Chippy's young people about to embark on the step up from Primary to Secondary school. We gave each child a Secondary School Stationery Starter Set which included scientific calculator, Maths set, English and French dictionaries – ensuring everyone started Secondary school with the right tools for success!
