# **Annual Meeting calls for action**

Everyone likes coming to Chipping Norton – a wonderful Cotswold Town – but how can we make our Market Town better? WODC asked us what we thought. Now was our chance in a busy 6 March Town Hall Meeting.

The biggest cry – by a long way – was a heartfelt 'Keep Chippy Beautiful' with a litany of issues about litter, overflowing bins, dog poo, unkempt, overgrown pavements, and more. A close second were continuing safety issues of obstructed pavements, shortage of parking, busy crossings, dangerous walks into town and more.

A posse of Town Councillors took the brunt of the cries, but County and District – who provide most services – would have had an earful if they'd been on the speakers' table to respond. It sounds like it needs some community action – and there's a big local election coming up on 4 May. Full report on page 2.

# **Chipping Norton Annual Meeting**

Around 60 expectant town citizens, including many new ones, were in the Town Hall on 6 March for the Annual Town Meeting to discuss Town issues. Here are some highlights.

Town Council report - Town Mayor Cllr Sandra Coleman, as chair, mentioned the successful Charity Ball, Town Jubilee Festival and Christmas in Chippy events – and looked forward to Coronation celebrations. She noted the Town's respectful marking of the Queen's death and accession of King Charles, the Chippy Larder's work and wide cost-of-living support. As Community Committee Chair, she reported successful Sport Awards, the Town's new flagpole, and Town Hall, Pool Meadow,

Cemetery and Recreation improvements. The Council's staffing, communications and processes had been improved. Committee chairs Cllr Ruth Fisher (Finance) explained the Council's grip on resources, and Cllr Mark Walker (Strategic Planning and Traffic) focused on work on the LCWIP (Local Cycling Walking Infrastructure Plan), uncertainties over East Chippy's development, and continuing HGV/Air pollution work.

County, District and Police updates -After last year's major discussions on traffic Litter! WODC's Executive Member Cllr and safety, County Council Cabinet Member Duncan Enright was on the pickers' and sacks to clear up our town agenda to update us and answer questions. As a WODC Executive Member, he had also

asked for our ideas to improve Chippy as a Market Town. But he wasn't there - Chippy's County Councillor Geoff Saul read a short statement from Cllr Enright, saying that OCC's long term freight strategy study (the HGV issues) was continuing, and repeated the idea of a Market Town study. There were no other presentations from our County or District Councillors, and Police Inspector Chris Ball did not formally present but later said Chippy was a 'low crime' area with police 'responding as resources allowed'.

Questions from the audience - The Mayor chaired a discussion hour with comments from the public. Chippy remains a much-liked place to live but Rubbish and Town Appearance (17 contributions) were the overwhelming 'winners' in Q&A including: overflowing bins and flytipping behind Market Row; rampant dog poo with too few (and overflowing) bins; litter breeding litter; overgrown and leafridden footpaths; and graffiti (with no publishment or penalty). Second up was Traffic, Transport and Safety (11 mentions) with action needed on: parking on pavements (horror stories of disabled pedestrians dodging HGVs down by New St playground); unsafe narrow pavements and

junctions; poor town centre parking provision ('how on earth can I walk up and down half a mile with heavy shopping!'); more shuttle buses; and more chaos coming with new housing. On Paramedic and first responder availability (3 mentions), no one was there from the NHS who could answer.

Missing issues? - Perhaps the discussion was shaped by who turned up! There were no comments about: youth interests; cost of living and energy crisis; major social care health and homelessness and housing waiting lists and lack of affordability; town centre investment and local skilled jobs; more visitor facilities; nor 'hidden'

unreported crime (reported crimes over the last 12 months in Chippy's area: 455 violence and domestic abuse; 126 shoplifting, theft and burglary; 198 anti-social and public order).

Action and response – At this meeting the seven Town Councillors (out of 15) who attended, steadfastly did their best to address issues - and one positive suggestion was for collective town action on a campaign to 'Keep Chippy Beautiful' (See Mayor's letter page 34). But Town Councillors will need to keep the pressure up on our larger more accountable authorities (County and West Oxfordshire District) to improve the lot of our Market Town. They were notable by their near-silence here.

Public are welcome at Chipping Norton Town Council Full and Committee meetings. A new Council is elected on 4 May, and starts a new civic year. Main meetings are on a two-

# Surveys reveal Roman town

Were the Romans in Chippy? It seems they were and big time, according to two recent professional archaeology reports. Combined, the surveys suggest a small town approaching the size of 20 sports pitches! One report was commissioned by local interest group, Chipping Norton Archaeological Research Group (CHARG), who reported the findings to the Town Council's Build Chippy Better group in February. Another, by Wessex Archaeology, commissioned by Cala Homes, has recently been made publicly available by OCC on their Heritage Environment Record. CHARG told the News that their magnetometry survey of fields east of Chippy (not on planned development land) showed footings of at least 20 stone-built Roman structures and boundaries, including possible temples and bath houses, and a Roman cemetery. The morphology suggests a planned layout and, with high status finds nearby, indicates a degree of wealth or status. Earlier ring ditches also suggest a small Iron Age or earlier prehistoric settlement. The CHARG and Wessex reports together indicate a domestic Romano-British nucleated settlement, extending to 16-20 hectares with evidence of continuous occupation from CIst\_C4th AD.



#### What kind of Roman Town?

An artist's impression of a planned Roman town at the site discovered at Caister in Norfolk (Venta Icenorum) – of similar scale (roughly 400x400 metres) to that possibly in Chipping Norton. Archaeologically invaluable as one of only three remaining buried sites in Britain (the other two are Silchester and Wroxeter) that were never built on by successive settlements. Did Chippy look similar?

Historic England (HE) are assessing whether the findings are of national significance, whether worthy of scheduling as an ancient monument and if this is the best means of protection. They then make a recommendation to the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport, where the Secretary of State makes the final decision. Asked by the News, HE would only say, 'We can confirm that Historic England is assessing the site for designation as a scheduled monument.' WODC were due to meet HE in late March to understand more fully the potential planning implications of the surveys. But OCC's Lead Archaeologist, Richard Oram, told the News, 'The remains of the Roman nucleated settlement are certainly of high significance and the professional opinion is that they are of national importance and of demonstrably equivalent significance to a scheduled monument.' But for the moment, everyone, is waiting for HE's verdict!

# A tree for our late Queen

of the Queen's Green Canopy launched for the 2022 Platinum Jubilee. The date fell in the same week as Commonwealth Day, appropriate given Her late Majesty's years of service as Head of the Commonwealth. The Mayor particularly thanked Charlie Withers who had contributed tree compost made from the flowers laid in town to mark the Queen's passing.

# **Cemetery artificial flowers**

Chipping Norton Town Council's current regulations do not allow artificial wreaths and flowers to be placed on graves or memorials – and the Council has recently had this queried by concerned members of the public. In March, the Community Committee agreed to adjust the rules to say: 'Please try to avoid the use of plastic in wreaths and flowers as this will help the environment. If you do lay artificial wreaths or plastic and silk flowers, please take them home to recycle where possible'. They also added they 'reserve the right to remove worn, damaged or faded plastic wreaths, silk flowers and any other inappropriate ornaments from graves and to dispose of

# A new Town Hall piano

After a proposal from the Chipping Norton Choral Society, the Town Council agreed to a trial rental in the Town Hall of a high quality upright acoustic piano. The Society use the larger hall for their regular meetings rehearsals, and Chair Eric Clubley with Conductor Ben Goodall made the case to the Council's Community Committee the piano accompany the choir and be for wider community use. So the Council, after

hearing a BBC Radio 5 item on recycled pianos, contacted Glasgow Piano City, whose Director helped them get the best match for both choir and the Hall's acoustics. Tania Kirby, the Council's Events and Facilities Officer, said they were delighted to provide the instrument, which can be enjoyed by other groups and organisations using the Hall. Ben Goodall said they were very grateful to the Council. The piano can be moved around the Hall, is kept under lock and key, and can be booked for use via the Council's offices in the Guildhall.

Meanwhile, don't forget anyone can have a play, free, on the piano in Withers Court arcade opposite the Town Hall steps, also installed by the Town Council.

# **Diddly Squat Planning Appeal**

Diddly Squat's planning saga, social media abuse, even death threats to Councillors and local objectors, led to high security at the two-day Planning Appeal against WODC's refusal of permission for a car park and enforcement against an unauthorised restaurant. But all went smoothly at WODC's offices on 14–15 March. Two WODC Officers, their Barrister, a local resident and his Barrister sat with a Planning Inspector and the five-strong Diddly Squat team: a KC, a 'planning bod' and two 'landscape bods' (Jeremy Clarkson's terms), plus land agent (Cheerful) Charlie Ireland, with only 30 or so (well behaved) local residents and reporters in attendance. There was not a red corduroy in sight, nor Jeremy Clarkson, nor, with all recording banned this time, Amazon TV.

Discussion included whether some non-food products were 'souvenirs', constituting a change of use; whether the venture had become a leisure use and even the planning consequences of using the lavatory! Paying £20 for a potato entitling you to a free Diddly Squat T-shirt was also mentioned. Local citizens made impassioned pleas in support and opposition. Suppliers and staff said the venture supported local farmers and Jeremy Clarkson was an inspiration. Another local feared it had become a tourist destination attracting celebrity-chasing coach tours. WODC said people don't drive three hours just to buy a turnip! Diddly Squat's KC stated it was not the role of the planning system to stifle

success. After site visits, the Inspector will consider the planning merits of the case and report in due course. He can dismiss or uphold the Appeal or find a compromise. In January OCC approved 'No Waiting' restrictions on the A361 and Chippy to Chad road. In February, Diddly Squat submitted an application for a temporary 70-space car park next to the Farm Shop. A potential compromise? The Inspector has never watched *Clarkson's Farm* and doesn't intend to. Will this help or hinder his deliberations?

# A uniform approach!

The BBC and national press had a bit of a field day in February after Bloxham's comprehensive Warriner School found themselves in hot water about a school uniform change. Some pupils joined in a mass protest, and police were apparently called, after a plan for changing the uniform next September was announced in a letter to parents - the main issue was that girls would have to wear trousers, not skirts. It seems the School had in fact made this move after 'a lot' of female students were rolling their skirts up to an 'inappropriate length' and 'sending the wrong social message'. The main problem was apparently a lack of sufficient early consultation with students and parents before announcing the plan. The Headteacher has apologised and is to do a proper consultation. The story provoked many tabloid anecdotes from around the country about a range of sometimes draconian methods of policing the length of girls' skirts and other detailed uniform rules.

Chipping Norton School is not involved in any of this furore. The School has revised its school uniform policy over time at the last change bringing in smart black and gold tartan patterned 2 box pleat or kilt-style skirts. No rolling up is allowed - and skirts can be no more than 10cm above the knee. All students also have the option of wearing trousers. One Chippy News team member recalls moving here from London many years back with two daughters who were delighted with the trouser option as it was so cold and windy in our 'two coat town' on the top of a hill. Uniforms are a traditional feature in nine out of ten UK schools. Chipping Norton School's website emphasises that their purposes are first to enable children meet their academic potential AND develop as happy, confident and hopeful about their future, whatever their personal circumstances. They stress that 'wearing a smart school uniform which fosters a sense of pride and belonging, is essential to fulfilling both purposes as an expression that everyone belongs'.

#### **Coronation celebrations**

Chipping Norton folk are looking forward to celebrating the coronation of King Charles III. A reminder that the actual Coronation ceremony is on Saturday 6 May at Westminster Abbey. In Chippy the British Legion will to mark the event at 10am at the flagpole along West Street.

Sunday 7 May is the day earmarked for local events – so why not plan your own street party and put up some flags! Neighbours and communities are encouraged to organise their own 'Coronation Big Lunch' to share food and fun. The Town Council is planning a 'picnic in the Park' with games and entertainment at the New Street Recreation Ground. Bring your own picnic and a blanket. Details nearer the time. The Sunday evening also has the Windsor Castle Celebration Concert to watch!

# Those Royal Connections



No doubt, with the Coronation coming up, towns across the country will scratching heads to remember all their connections. roval Chipping Norton can point to recent visits: amongst others they'll include Queen Elizabeth II in 1959 at the Town Hall, her

father George VI inspecting a military parade in the Market Square during WWII (when Tommy Aldridge's dog famously joined in), and more recently the then Prince Charles pictured being welcomed by Mayor Gina Burrows when attending a St Mary's Church concert back in 2005.

Not to be outdone, Woodstock is on the map, with Blenheim Palace showing a *Royal Connections Crowns and Coronets* exhibition until 30 July. 'Behind the scenes' stories span 300 years of the Marlborough's relationship with the Royal Family. There are previously unseen artefacts, crowns, coronets, robes and photo albums – among them their personal effects from royal weddings, coronations, and holidays. The exhibition features an ornate crown worn by Queen Anne, which has undergone conservation, on public display for the first time.

# **New High Street Cinema**

The new boutique Living Room Cinema being built in Chipping Norton's High Street (the old Harpers building) now has a Facebook page saying 'opening summer' rather than 'spring' as previously publicised. The Cinema is looking for corporate members and is one of the ChipLitFest

sponsors, but as at mid-March sign-ups for general membership had not yet started. Watch their Facebook page.

# Neither up nor down

Visitors and shoppers at the Midcounties Coop supermarket in Chipping Norton can't have failed to notice the out-of-order escalators, which have now been dormant for close to a month. The alternative is a steep hill outside or a busy lift. One resident told the News about tripping and injuring themselves while



braving the 32 stationary steep stairs of the escalator – so the need for restoration has, well, escalated. At the time of writing, the *Chippy News* was awaiting an update from the Co-op press team. Regular customers have seen many short stoppages for repairs over the years. However, given the length of time the escalators have now been out of action, it might be time for a major replacement.

# Council's postal strike letter

Should Parish Councils send 'political' letters? As reported in December's Chippy News, back at their 7 November Community Committee meeting, Town Councillors, according to the meeting minutes, expressed their 'support for the postal workers strike'. The four Councillors present then approved a proposal from Cllr Steve Akers to write to the Royal Mail Chief Executive, urging the Royal Mail to 'reach a negotiated settlement' with the Communication Workers Union, rather than 'impose changes detrimental to the public and Royal Mail workers'. Subsequently, at February's full Town Council meeting, town resident Alan White addressed Councillors about this. In the draft minutes of that latest meeting Mr White was reported as being 'concerned that the Council did not have the remit' to send such a letter. However, the Town Clerk said that constitutionally the Council, elected to represent the Town's citizens, were able to do this - and, before writing the letter, they had checked with the Oxfordshire Association of Local Councils, who confirmed that no conflict arose from doing this. Mr White was not happy with this - but Councillors assured him that a proper debate and vote had taken place. They thanked him for his views. Mr White, however, has subsequently written to the Town Clerk saying he remains unhappy with the accuracy and completeness of the minuted report of his question and the subsequent discussion. # New cycle repair stands

As part of their campaign to encourage more cycling, Chipping Norton Town Council agreed in February to install two new cycle repair stands and pumps – one outside the Town Hall and one at Chipping Norton Leisure Centre. The Turvec Public Bike Repair Stand and Pumps, in green with custom branding, will be funded with £4000 from the Council's earmarked reserves.

# Sewage - rivers still polluted

Windrush Against Sewage Pollution (WASP) continue campaigning on the state of our rivers, to make them safe people and for wildlife. On Saturday II March a group walked along the Windrush about the decline of our rivers. The river

Windrush used to be a community asset, somewhere people could play, paddle and swim. It is becoming increasingly hostile. WASP's Ashley Smith said, 'In common with the whole country, our rivers are being used as toilets by a water industry struggling under the impact of self-inflicted underinvestment. Once clear and vibrant waters are now sad grey shadows of their former selves and the baseline for 'normal" is being progressively lowered while the Environment Agency stands on the sidelines mainly blocking the view of the pitch'. WASP and campaigners say the Government is reluctant to impose necessary fines, Environment Agency funding has been cut, with too much reliance on industry 'self-monitoring', large water company dividends are being paid out instead of funding more investment, and OFWAT (the regulator) fails to hold companies properly to account.

The BBC documentary 'Our Troubled Rivers', presented by Paul Whitehouse of 'Gone Fishing' fame, is worth a catchup view! WASP helped to connect with campaigners across the country. Prof Peter Hammond and Ashley Smith spent a day with Paul Whitehouse, explaining their data analysis and their views on wider ills of failed privatisation. Some WASP underwater and surface video was 'hard to swallow'! Ashley said 'There are good people working in the water industry and regulators but, despite their efforts, those organisations, alongside our own Government, have formed a toxic cabal which has tried to legitimise pollution for profit. This is being disrupted by campaigners revealing the inconvenient truth'.

# MP's response on sewage



On our area's sewage issues, local MP Robert Courts has been explaining his own involvement in efforts to reduce the sewage pollution problem. In a Chippy News article last month we reported that he had 'tirelessly campaigned' on the issues, including writing letters asking for urgent

action to the Thames Water CEO who had then told him that work to upgrade Witney's treatment plant by 50% was now starting - and that more investment at the Chipping Norton works was coming, but with no dates or specific plans. Mr Courts has now sent the Chippy News a long response to that article. He says he is a 'passionate conservationist' and repeated his response reported by the News last month. He has written again to Thames Water about Chippy and 'shares local frustrations that a more detailed plan and timetable for

these works to take place in areas such as Chipping Norton has not yet been made public by Thames Water, whose responsibility it is to do this.'

Mr Courts adds that the Government is consulting on mandatory sustainable drainage systems (SUDS), and pointed to improvements in water quality and reduced discharges which he expects from the 2021 Environment Act and other measures. He claims monitoring has increased from 5% to 90% since 2016 and points to record fines for polluters and a comprehensive 'Storm Overflows Reduction Plan' which sets new targets to deliver the necessary infrastructure. But he cautions that we cannot transform the system 'overnight' with 'lofty ambitions' and 'blanket bans on sewage discharges' and that 'long, technical practical work' is needed to deliver shared ambitions. He refers to opposition parties 'making wildly inaccurate claims', and urges readers to visit his website www.robertcourts.co.uk/rivers to see what's actually happening.

### £2 bus fares to continue

News readers should note that you can still travel to Oxford, Banbury or Stratford for a maximum fare of £2. The Department for Transport has extended the £2 single bus fare scheme until the end of June. Stagecoach continues to support the scheme, as do Oxford Bus Company and Thames Travel on their routes in and around Oxford. Locally to Chippy, it helps on the S3 to Oxford, 488/489 to Banbury, 50 to Stratford and S7 from Woodstock to Oxford Parkway, Summertown and Witney. S3 and S7 bus users returning from Oxford now need to note that they all start at the Rail Station and go on to Magdalen Street and no longer call into

Gloucester Green bus station. They stop nearby in George Street outside the Old Fire Station.

# A skate park ... and more!

Town Councillors were delighted when a large group of Year 8 students from Chippy School, came with some parents to March's Community Committee meeting. Three of the boys presented confidently the economic and social case for a long-wanted skateboard park in Chippy – then answered Councillors' questions with facts and arguments. Councillors agreeing to help them with a petition and a solid business and funding case, whilst asking for more in the lineup! Coincidentally, Councillors

had also had a letter (see Schools p29) from another Year 8 tutor group about the Skateboard case, but which covered more on ideas for Chippy, including better local buses, town litter, safer cycling and walking routes, cheaper cinema screenings, and societies for young people. Councillors were impressed and will follow up by talking to a wider student group at the School. They are also to revisit the skateboard idea - having parked it three years ago when a survey by the Council found over 300 local young people overwhelmingly in favour of the same idea. The problem then, and now, is less about funding and support, but more about finding a suitable site. Students had suggested the empty space at New Street recreation ground, but, in discussion with Councillors, they were also interested in Greystones. Councillors - from both Town and District – will be on their mettle to try and find a site solution before raising expectations again.

# A tree to remember Rachel

Chipping Norton Town Council has agreed to fund and plant a cherry blossom tree in memory of former serving Deputy Mayor Cllr Rachel Foakes, who tragically passed away last autumn. At her family's request, the tree will be placed in the wildflower section of the Worcester Road Cemetery – where Rachel used to take regular walks with her dog.

# Progress at Pool Meadow

The project work has been progressing to restore the biodiversity and improve access to Pool Meadow and the stream below New Street Recreation Ground. The whole project was to cost around £100,000, funded by grants and a £25,000 contribution from Chipping Norton Town Council, who own, and are responsible for, the Meadow. The work so far has included clearing around the pool and the path along the back. The major next stage will see work on the paths and returning the pool to a proper wetland by providing a water inlet from the stream. In February, the Council agreed a further £2500 for project consultants Beaumont Rivers to do a more detailed topographical survey to provide accurate data. Cross

sections and volume calculations at 1:200 scale are needed for engineers and an ecologist to finalise the restoration work which is expected to be completed by the autumn.

# From Chippy to China!

Their Professor of Fine Art came to visit Judith in Chippy on a British Council exchange and got very interested in Judith's work. Judith has some in her garden and she has produced images to be shown both at FarmED and in China. She's using KMS Litho from Hook Norton (who also print the *Chipping Norton News!*) to produce exceptionally high quality large Giclée prints especially for the

# **Students explore The Branch**

Those following the project for The Branch, a new community hub at Chippy's old NatWest Bank building, will see that



building site hoardings are now telling something of the story of The Branch. Please do take a look! Emma Kennedy from St Mary's told the News, 'This month we are excited to launch a project that we are working on with Top School where 10 students, who have expressed an interest working in the construction industry, will start monthly visits to follow the development of The Branch. They will meet and hear from everyone, from the bricklayer and architect to structural engineer and decorators, learning about all that is involved in delivering a project such as this. We hope that it will open eyes to some of the employment opportunities that are out there, as well as allowing them to be part of the transformation of this building at the heart of our community'. It may not look as if much is happening from the front, but demolition work at the back of the building is now complete, enabling groundworks in the basement and garden area to move on apace.

# Mill House Hotel plan approved

Kingham's Mill House Hotel looks set for a new life. In March. WODC's Uplands Planning Committee gave the go-ahead for the Daylesford Estate to redevelop the site to provide a 38bedroom hotel with ancillary facilities including restaurant, alehouse, reception/bakehouse and demonstration barn. The proposals include landscaping and reinstatement of the former mill leat. Guest accommodation includes nine thatched 'cottages' along Station Road - where there is already permission for five new homes. The former mill building will be returned to its original linear form and renovated. A more ambitious plan three years ago did not meet with approval, as WODC said it amounted to Major Development in the AONB. The new development is smaller, with less floorspace than the original hotel, and planners say it is now of an appropriate scale. On sustainable transport, a Travel Plan Co-ordinator will oversee provision of electric bikes and a pre-bookable free electric mini shuttle bus between Kingham station, hotel, The Wild Rabbit and Daylesford Farm Shop for guests, staff and locals.

Kingham Parish Council supported the application, with the proviso, also mentioned by OCC and Windrush Against Sewage Pollution, that sufficient capacity at Bledington Sewage Treatment Works was proven. Councillors agreed that, subject to drainage and transport conditions being satisfactorily addressed, the application be approved. A quick tally now suggests around 277 visitor bed-spaces locally under the Daylesford label. If the current planning application to refurbish The Quiet Woman, just outside Chippy, is also approved, the number of Daylesford brand hostelries in the area increases to seven, including recent purchases The Bell, Charlbury, and The Mayflower, Astall, not forgetting Lady Bamford's new Club and Wellness Spa, based at Daylesford Farm, where guests can join yoga, pilates and meditation classes, try sound healing and gong therapy, or relax in the steam room, crystal sauna and wellness pool. For a price!


# **Oxfordshire's Nature Survey**

Despite a cold, snowy snap in March, the days are becoming longer, and Spring is coming! Most Chipping Norton residents will have received a survey by the Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire Wildlife Trust, BBOWT, who point out that, alarmingly, the UK is one of the most nature-depleted countries in the world, and we must make sure we do not lose more space for nature. BBOWT have a vision and want your help and views, firstly to complete the survey and secondly to join BBOWT. Do you want more wildlife features such as more street trees, wildflower margins or wildlife corridors along the roadside verges, swift boxes or hedgehog highways? BBOWT want your ideas.

Also to bird lovers – a reminder that Bird Nesting Season runs from March to August, although blackbirds may have already produced their first brood. Birds may be nesting in your trees, shrubs, ivy, hedges, nest boxes or under the eaves. Nests are often well hidden, and you may not know they are there. Don't cut back hedges or other vegetation at this time of year. Also be careful using the strimmer as hedgehogs make their appearance and shelter in leaf litter or undergrowth. # 2023/4 Town Council grants

Chipping Norton Town Council award around £30,000 annually to local not-for-profit organisations. Their revised policy now says applications for these 'Community Grants' will be limited to £2000 for projects, activities or running costs but you must demonstrate 'improved physical, mental, emotional health, and environmental or economic outcomes'. and direct positive impact for Chipping Norton residents. You must have a bank account and constitution. From now on, there will be two annual chances to apply - at least 14 days before either the 17 July 2023 or 5 February 2024 Council meetings. # **Build Chippy Better meeting**

The Town Council's 'Build Chippy Better' working group has resumed meeting to pursue issues linked with the major housing growth of the Town at East Chipping Norton and elsewhere. At their latest meeting, chaired by Mayor Sandra Coleman on 27 February, the Group received a brief update from CHARG (the Chipping Norton Archaeology Research Group) about what they say are significant findings of Roman remains on sites to the east of town. Last year, the whole issue of archaeology caused a halt on any further planning at East Chippy – and it remains unclear what impact this has on new housing plans. The meeting also discussed implications for West Oxfordshire's '5-year land supply' requirements laid down, but recently amended, by the Government. It was hoped to have detailed meetings with WODC about this issue as soon as possible. This is particularly important in view of the pending planning application by Rainier for land at the top of Banbury Road, adjacent to the Cricket Club. Discussion of a possible Community Land Trust for Chippy, about which the Town Council has commissioned a short study (see article in box below), was held over until the next BCB meeting on 27 March.

# **Community Trust for Chippy?**

Chipping Norton Town Councillors have for some months been looking at the idea of a Community Land or Development Trust – which can act as a 'long-term steward'

owning land, housing, buildings or other assets that meet important needs of the community. These are non-profit, community-based organisations. A key principle is that 0 x f o r d s h i r e such land or buildings cannot be sold

off for private or individual gain. With new growth coming in Chippy, examples of using a Trust could include:

- being given land (perhaps in a large new development) that could be leased for self-build, affordable housing, or a shared community facility
- using \$106 developer contribution funding to provide affordable housing
- using an endowment from developers to own and manage green or recreational spaces instead of

contracting to a private company

taking over existing community gardens, playgrounds, or similar assets.



These Trusts can have various legal forms but charitable status can help. for example, in seeking grants. It is important to note that they would be neither owned nor controlled by the Town Council.

Town Councillors suggest this might benefit the community and at February's full meeting they agreed around £3000 for Community First Oxfordshire (CFO) to carry out a short project 'Stewardship - Exploring The Options' to look at ideas, benefits and next steps. CFO is a community development charity going back 100 years, providing support for local communities on these and related issues. The Chippy News will feature more detail as this work, including engaging the community, goes forward.

# **ChippyThrough Time**

The Victoria County History (VCH) team are giving an illustrated talk in Chipping Norton Town Hall on 17 April at 7pm about their research into Chipping Norton and the local area's history – see details below.

VCH is a national local-history research and publication project aiming to build on work already done and provide a solid foundation for others to build on. The project was first dreamed up in 1899 and was dedicated to Queen Victoria – but in fact it covers much more than Victorian history. In Oxfordshire a small team of four is working to complete coverage of the historic (pre-1974) county, hopefully by the end of the decade! 20 out of 23 planned volumes have been published and the next is focused on Chipping Norton itself and on half a dozen surrounding places: Over Norton, Hook Norton, Great and Little Rollright, Salford, and Swerford with Showell. The book itself will be published late in 2024.

The VCH team tries to work with others and share information. Chipping Norton has proved an exceptionally rich seam, with its invaluable Chipping Norton Museum collections, its wealth of existing publications on all sorts of topics, and new discoveries amassed through the recent very intensive investigation of the Town's older buildings, many of which have now been tree-ring dated for the first time. There's plenty to share – but in an hour's talk only the surface can be scratched. The team looks forward to meeting everyone – to give a brief overview of findings, and to share and swap information in the Q & A session.

# New theme park for Chippy


The News has learnt that a major new theme park is being planned just outside Chipping Norton, by a brand-new company Chippy Go Wild. This follows a February report in the Oxford Times that French theme park company Puy du Fou



were looking for a 300–400 acre site within 40 miles of Oxford for their first UK park. Founded in 1977, that company's flagship park in the Vendée, is the fourth largest in France, welcoming over two million visitors this year. Overseas expansion already includes Spain and the USA. Their parks specialize in spectacular displays with historical themes.

But it's not in fact that French company which is coming here. It's a totally new Chippy Go Wild Community Interest Company registered by two entrepreneurial 25-year-old ex-

Chippy School students. Joseph King, one of the ambitious pair, gave the News a sneak preview some of the likely main attractions in the new park, to be built 200 acres of nearby flat land such as a local disused wartime airfield. Top trumps looks like being a 30-metre high space age helterskelter, called 'Bliss



Hell' in the style of Anish Kapoor's astonishing Olympic Park Orbit slide, but wrapped around a replica of our famous Mill chimney (see pictures). Older readers may recall Kapoor's

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shimmering steel globe on show at the Rollright Stones 20 years ago. Then, for those seeking more of the authentic Chippy experience, Joseph's partner, Arthur Fischel, described another plan to create a mock-up of Repton's magnificent Town Hall. Inside, in a theatre set, designed as a homely Cotswold cottage, visitors can join a live 'Chippy country kitchen supper'. There they can mingle with the famous local characters who will be there, not as waxworks, but as 'digital avatars' similar to those seen in ABBA's recent show. You can chat to and maybe ask difficult questions of personalities such as ex-Prime Ministers, retired rock stars, former Mayors, and even William Bliss himself. And perfect for the kids is a



'Formula Fun' racetrack where budding petrol-heads can race Lamborghini versus John Deere miniature tractors.

Planning permission for Chippy Go Wild has yet to be applied for, but the progress made by Enstone's Mullin Automotive Museum has encouraged our two young

entrepreneurs. Local town reaction so far has been muted, but watch out for a grand crowdfunding event for the venture planned in Chipping Norton on I April. Joe King and Artie Fischel will be there eagerly cheering us all along.

Chipping Norton Town Council has been approached by Blue Cedar Homes, who hope to build homes on land at West End Farm, west of Churchill Road - a site not currently allocated in WODC's Local Plan. A decade ago, Sharba Homes were refused permission to develop a larger area, and their appeal was robustly dismissed, because of harm to the setting of Grade II\* listed Bliss Mill, conservation area and AONB. Blue Cedar say, 'Our plans are for around six new homes, covering a small part of the site originally planned by Sharba Homes, with the remainder of the site remaining in agricultural use. Landscaping features introduced by the landowner since the original Sharba Homes plans will help to mitigate any impact on the setting of Bliss Tweed Mill'. Members of the Town Council met Blue Cedar and said they were unhappy at building beyond the boundary of the Town and in the AONB. Mayor Sandra Coleman added, 'We were also concerned that this development again provides for the over 55s when we

know younger people are in greater need of housing and that housing for older people will put more pressure on our already over stretched Health Centre.'

February's meeting of the Town Council's Build Chippy Better group resolved to question WODC's Cabinet on their recently adopted Playing Pitches Strategy and Action Plan. Last month, a *Chippy News* article covered the WODC report's findings — which highlighted pitch capacity issues for different sports. WODC's earlier 2013 Open Space Study had in fact also highlighted an under-provision of 5.55 hectares in the

Town. Yet this new 'Strategy and Action Plan' provided no mechanism for additional sports pitches to be secured. Town Councillors consider that, once the proposed East Chipping Norton development is factored in, 8.5 hectares of new sports pitches would be required. Mayor Sandra Coleman said, 'We simply cannot understand how the conclusions of this new report are so wildly different to their earlier study. We would be interested to know how the report was researched as even committee members from clubs mentioned in the report don't appear to have been consulted, and there is certainly no reference to the complete lack of public pitches. At the very least they need to explain their calculations. We ask that the provision for Chipping Norton be reconsidered.'



# **Hooky Shire Horses on show**

A busy month again for Hook Norton Brewery's Horse ambassadors saw, on 4 March, Shires Brigadier and Lady Grey with Head Coachman **Nicholas** Carter welcomed by Newark's Mayor on Market Day. They promoting

the Shire Horse Society National Show the following weekend. One of the oldest horse shows and the largest gathering of shire horses in the world, it's a chance to promote the Shire breed which has played such a key role in the UK's history but is still on the 'at risk' register. In the ring the horses are shown in hand, ridden and in harness. Although not really riding hacks, they are ideal as Household Cavalry drum horses. Of course, a certain stature is desirable in the rider; this writer's 4-year-old self perched splay-legged atop 18-hand Gypsy ambling home from work, felt like a king but had the authority of a feather.

Brigadier won everyone's hearts at Newark last year in a similar 'meet and greet'. His companion this year, Lady Grey, is a recent addition to the Brewery stables. Greys are the rarest of Shires – she is one of only about 200 breeding mares worldwide. Last month the team gained a fourth member, four-year-old Balmoral, renamed in tribute to Her Majesty the Queen. Nicholas Carter says, 'We've been waiting a long time to find another horse suitable to join our first-class team and we're thrilled to finally find one. Balmoral's temperament and character are exactly what we're looking for and we hope to have a long successful career with him here at the Brewery'. It all keeps alive the tradition of the working horse – and promotes this 'at risk' breed.

# No 'cramming' at Bell Lane

A bit of 'town cramming' has been avoided in Bell Lane off Chipping Norton's West Street. Developer Amanda Bond Design had applied for planning permission to build two semidetached homes on rear garden land where planning permission had been won at appeal for one home in 2019. The new proposal was larger, taller and significantly closer to neighbouring Bell Lane properties. The Town Council and more than a dozen neighbours objected on grounds including loss of daylight, loss of privacy, access difficulties, surface water run-off damaging nearby properties, highway safety, and emergency vehicle access and pedestrian safety issues on Bell Lane. Eventually WODC asked the developer to submit a daylight study, using architects' software that plots the shadow cast by a building throughout the year. This revealed that concerns were justified - the overshadowing of a neighbouring home would be severe. WODC refused permission, citing '... detrimental impacts upon the living conditions of 2 Bell Yard through loss of light and overbearing impacts, and adverse impacts upon the amenity of Nos 58, 60 and 60A West Street by way of overlooking'. The developer can appeal the refusal.

# Joining the Chippy Parkrun

Would you like encouragement to keep fit with a gentle jog or run? You could try joining the Saturday morning Chippy Parkrun – or even start from scratch with the Couch to 5K plan. Find out more here.

Every Saturday at 9am Chipping Norton Parkrunners assemble at Chipping Norton School on Burford Road to walk, jog or run 5km (or perhaps to volunteer or spectate.) This free, fun and friendly event is of an international movement to improve physical and mental health in a very enjoyable way. Chipping Norton Health Centre is a 'Parkrun practice', where Dr

Wendy Hall (aka Wendy Carter), a well-loved partner at the Practice, is a very keen participant – both running and acting as a volunteer (see the photo opposite of Wendy completing her hundredth run!). She says, 'I don't need to tell my fellow Parkrunners how amazing Parkrun is, but I regularly introduce it into consultations with my patients and I am always pleased to see the Chipping Norton population taking part. I would much rather prescribe a walk, run or jog to a patient than a tablet. Parkrun improves the physical and mental health of me and my patients which, along with other lifestyle changes, should reduce the need for lifelong medication to control such conditions as Type 2 diabetes and high blood pressure. It can help to reduce social isolation and Chippy Parkrun is welcoming and friendly'.

The Parkrun course at Chippy School starts behind Glyme Hall, and involves two circuits of the school playing fields, a short section of Glyme Lane and also a figure of eight course in the William Fowler Memorial Wood (hopefully not threatened by a possible

new link road!). Unfortunately, dogs can't take part, but children in strollers can and there are encouraging volunteers along the course. Participants can record their time as long as they have registered once via the Parkrun website and

brought their barcode along. There is, however, no time limit and walkers are welcome. On average' more than 100 people a week take part in Chippy but there are also more than a thousand weekly events all over the country, which means you can also take part when you are on holiday or try

different courses locally. As Wendy says, 'there probably aren't many Parkruns that don't have a healthcare professional taking part'. There are over 1100 different UK locations for Parkrun on Saturdays – there are others nearby in Witney, Moreton and Banbury.

Wendy Hall herself started running by undertaking 'Couch to 5k'—a free NHS podcast app which has also managed to get several of the *Chippy News* Team jogging much further than they believed possible (see below). Parkrun is itself celebrating the NHS with an event on 8 July. Wendy says, 'I will never be one of the speedy ones...



but I don't care. I am there ... loving it'. See Parkrun.org.uk.

#### A Parkrun first timer's view

One newly-converted News Team member reports: Despite being in my latish sixties I thought I should test my legs at the Chippy Parkrun. On a freezing cold morning I joined others at the first timers' briefing before assembling at the start with a hundred and seven other enthusiasts who were variously stretching, chatting and even (a couple) dressed as pirates. I walked most of the three mile course but was still not quite at the back and had lots of friendly encouragement from the noble volunteers along the way. I even managed a slight jog towards the finish line and the very friendly applause made me feel (almost) like a marathon winner. My result - I was 100th (second in my age group there might have been only two of us) – a position I was very satisfied with but perhaps if I try a bit harder next time ..... Overall it was a great experience -I felt totally supported and very welcomed - what a brilliant initiative. Do give it a try.

# Starting with Couch to 5K



Taking up running can seem like a scary prospect, especially if you feel out of shape or unfit. NHS Couch to 5K helps you work up gradually to running in around nine weeks. It's a running plan for absolute beginners, developed by a new runner, Josh Clark, who wanted to help his 50-something mum get off the couch and start running, too. The plan involves three runs a week, with a day of rest in between. Couch to 5K works because it starts with a mix of running and walking to gradually build up your fitness, and stamina. You listen as you run to a different podcast each week — originally with 'Laura' (but now you can pick a celebrity!) who guides you through the session, explaining

when you need to run and when it's time to walk. There's great music with it! In the first 4 months of Lockdown nearly I million people downloaded it!

# An Easter Message

#### An Easter message from Andrew Biggs, Minister at Chipping Norton Methodist Church

The return of

spring flowers

confirms the

cycle of life

This time of year is one of my favourite times. I tend to be an early riser and I must confess to feeling a little excited when I pull back the curtains in the morning and daylight floods in. I see the green buds

beginning to appear on the trees, the green spikes in the ground turning into snowdrops, crocuses and daffodils. The grass begins to grow and I reluctantly head to the shed for the lawnmower! It's like creation has wakened and sprung back to life: life renewed, rediscovered, looking very much like it did this time last year but subtly That patch different. snowdrops looks just like it did last year. Or does it? The shoots

come from the same source but the green leaves and white petals are not the same ones that were there last year. The patch has developed and spread out a bit since last year too. It's the same – but different.

It's also the time when we celebrate what we have come to know as Easter. Celebrating the most important event in Christian history — the

resurrection of Jesus. In Luke's gospel we hear of the women going to the garden and finding the tomb empty! Instead, they find two men in dazzling white clothes who tell them that they are looking

in the wrong place. The women run back to the other disciples who do not believe their story. Later, a couple of the disciples, walking to a village called Emmaus, meet with a traveller on the road and they get talking all about the events of the last few days and what they might mean. It is significant that they don't recognise that it is Jesus walking with them, until later when he breaks bread with them. He is the same, but different.

Actually, everything is different from then on. Because of love, Jesus is alive, death is cancelled: just another point in the cycle of life. And because he did not die, Jesus is there ready to be alongside us in every experience of life, the good and the bad. We can trust him to be there for us, just as we can trust that next year the snowdrops, crocuses and daffodils will be back — the same, but different!

The biggest Farm investment yet, Fairy Dell has been created especially for Nick Laister, his family and team. He explains, 'You won't see this play area anywhere else in the world. It has been designed by CAP.Co, a leading designer of attractions and play spaces with a series of sensory features, most wheelchair accessible'. The most magical play area ever, Fairy Dell includes giant mushrooms, raised walkways and bridges, a crawl tunnel, clamber net, climbing wall and slides. Many of the sculptures are made by Andy Blake, who works in polystyrene and resin. His domain includes the way statues are sprayed to ensure they'll glow when lit up from within, and the size and shape of each element.

A spring and summer welcome Gearing up for the holidays, over Easter is a new interactive Easter display, with Mother Goose joined by some friends for an egg hunt. Join Ribberty Rabbit Crafting for Easter-themed crafts, Easter Garden Games and the Scavenger Hunt. # The Fairytale Farm story

A dream - accessible for all! - The seven Fairytale Farm zones were part of a dream over ten years ago, when Nick Laister and his wife Nicola realised that, when they travelled to

different attractions with children, there wasn't quite the right mix of activities. Daughter, Olivia, now 25, has Cerebral Palsy, leaving her wheelchair-bound. With so few accessible activities, the Laisters found themselves either waiting with Olivia at an unusable attraction, or amusing the other children while Olivia found something accessible. So back home, the Laisters decided to build their own attraction near Chipping Norton, catering for able-bodied, disabled and sensory-challenged children and their families.

**Building the vision** – Registering Fairytale Farm trademark and web domains, the plan began! They bought the farm in 2008, with shop and surrounding fields, and began to bring their

vision to life. When we started, it was about begging, stealing borrowing, Nick recalls. I also run a planning consultancy and specialise in attractions and asked contacts for anything we

might be able to use.' Many sculptures were from other attractions or sitting unused. Nick brought them to life with traditional fairytales from Snow White to Jack and the Beanstalk.

Everything at Fairytale Farm is done with accessibility in mind – for wheelchair users, those struggling to move or with special educational needs. There's sensory experiences and animal petting.

Sustaining a family legacy – After juggling planning permission, budget and building costs and deadlines, Fairytale Farm opened in June 2013, with David Cameron cutting the ribbon. With Nick's professional work competing with his Fairytale life, the whole family now help with the Farm – from Grace, 18, who works in the animal area, to Guy, who runs his own IT company as the brains behind the tech running everything from musical water fountains to the Giant's camera. 10 years on, it's about family

legacy, for the Laisters and their visitors, creating memories for whole families on a level playing field, where nobody feels left out.







As attending Grand Slam tennis tournaments is on my bucket list and as I was visiting my son in Sydney for Christmas, I thought why not combine the two?



He has continued to build strong relationships with OCC and as a result a local cycling and walking infrastructure plan (LCWIP) is being developed which will help address some of the challenges we face, making it easier to walk and cycle around town.

We have also selected a group of candidates for the Town Council election on 4 May. They are keen to continue the exceptional work done by the current councillors over the past four years. Don't forget, unless you have a postal vote, you will need to take proof of identity to the polling station on 4 May. 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#### Keeping pavements clear

At our Annual Town Meeting in March we discussed how people travel around the Town – particularly the desire to

encourage walking and cycling. I know that for some walking will never be a viable option, but we are a small town and many rely on walking to get around. The Town Council want to make sure that walking really is a viable option

and are working with Oxfordshire County Council to improve crossing places, particularly on Albion Street near the London Road, and have demonstrated to Officers where the current pavements are inadequate or need repair. However, there are two ways that all of us can make it easier for those who walk. First, ensure that vegetation growing in our gardens does not encroach on the pavement. Second, keep the pavement clear of parked vehicles.

Overgrowing gardens — The space available for road and pavement is defined by property boundaries and can't easily be increased, but it has been eaten away in many places by hedges and trees that have grown over them. This means that in places where there should be space for a parent to walk hand in hand with a child on the way to school, or for an adult on a mobility scooter, this is no longer available. Those walking on the pavement get soaked by wet vegetation, and pedestrians can be hit in the face by twigs and branches. When you tidy your garden in the spring, please consider walking along the pavement at the front to check that plants are not encroaching beyond your garden.

**Pavement parking** — Parking enforcement is now the responsibility of the County Council but the better answer is for those living and visiting here to park considerately, remembering that the pavement is designed for walking, not a space where a vehicle can pull off the road. If tradespeople or visitors to your house park on the pavement, please consider asking them to move their vehicle to a better location.

The Annual Town Meeting also discussed the problem of litter around the Town and the Town Council agreed to explore a 'Beautiful Chippy' campaign to encourage people to take pride in our town. More details to follow.

The suggestion from Dave Hughes at the Co-op that we should set up a private WhatsApp group was unanimously agreed and has been implemented. A report on the meeting was circulated by hand and people who weren't able to be there have since been joining up. This group has the potential to become the voice of the Town's businesses and the initiative has been warmly welcomed by the District's Officer for Market Towns. We were asked to explore the issue of getting CCTV in Chippy and can report that when WODC receives an outline business case for a new system, we must make our case for extension of coverage beyond Witney. The other issue adversely affecting our Town Centre is empty premises — we are working on that as well.

I have emailed the Town Clerk asking for the minutes about this discussion to be corrected since the minutes are incomplete and fail to mention my concerns fully.
