WODC's Local Plan crisis could mean 100s more Chippy homes & 'piecemeal development failing our community'

Is Chipping Norton is heading for a free for all for house developers – on 'unallocated' sites around the edge of town. The problem: West Oxfordshire District Council's housing plans seem in disarray, there's not enough housing coming forward, and those plans for 1000+ East Chipping Norton homes are stalled. In July, WODC found themselves having to approve 90 homes past Chippy Cricket Club, now there's a new Gleeson Land proposal for 100 homes on farmland off Burford Road. Your views are wanted!! A two page feature inside (p16–17) shows how we could see 800 homes on unplanned land.

Police, crime and neighbourhood safety

Police Town Hall Open Day - 4 Nov

Thames Valley Police are holding a public open day in Chipping Norton in the Town Hall on 4 November from I Iam–3pm. You can talk to Chippy's Neighbourhood Police team directly and PCSO Darryn Moulding says 'the event is solely for the public. Please come along and speak to our partner agencies which also will be there representing the many crime

prevention services available.' Several organisations will be represented such as fire services, Trading Standards, and help for Domestic Abuse. It's a good opportunity to discuss Chippy's local policing, access services (get your bike marked!) and see behind the scenes for what it takes to police one of the biggest non-metropolitan policing areas in the country. Dealing with the rise in rural crime



Recent local headlines around Chipping Norton highlight high-value organised rural thefts of equipment and materials from vans, sheds and outbuildings. Countryside offences also include hare coursing, deer hunting, badger baiting and animal

thefts. PCSO Darryn Moulding told the News that in the last two years, Thames Valley Police have put more focus on the sometimes hard-to-reach rural communities. A new dedicated Rural Task Force, set up across the region, is now getting great results in protection, prevention and conviction. Regular daily and nightly deterrent operations have increased surveillance – and social media is helping. Darryn said they get WhatsApp intelligence, hold events and try to work jointly with estate owners, farmers, gamekeepers and others.

Fighting shoplifting 'epidemic' in Chippy

Following Covid and with current cost of living issues, shoplifting which has doubled in six years nationally is up 25% in the last year. Dame Sharon White at John Lewis called it an epidemic, and small shops (through the Federation of Independent Retailers) say they are getting little support from police – with culprits ranging from 'shoppers with prams, pensioners, children and teenagers to organised gangs'. Chipping Norton has been getting its fair share but traders and councillors are fighting back. Town Councillors Mike Cahill and Sharon Wheaton have, for months, been working on the ground with Chippy's town traders. They told the News, 'We set up a WhatsApp group so that retailers could share information about observed shoplifters – this is working extremely well.' Many shops have put in more security.

But police follow up isn't always great, with many other calls on their time. Mike says the British Retail Consortium reported around 8 million thefts last year – but police recorded only around 1 in 20 as crimes. When Chippy traders met, their first reaction was 'there's no point in reporting – police don't do anything'. Sometimes thefts under £200 aren't

investigated at all and while local police 'acknowledge' a crime reported – Mike says that often no crime number is issued. Nationally, the big retailers are now helping fund police operations but our small retailers simply aren't in that game – although there is a campaign to get the Government to provide £1500 grants to small shops for security. Home Office minister Chris Phelps has said 'police will always investigate where this is evidence to follow up'.

Mike, Sharon and the Chippy group met the Police back in June, agreeing that a police contact would be added to the WhatsApp information – but Mike says that still hasn't happened! But intelligence about actual and potential thieves is actively being shared amongst traders. The Coop shared their 'alerts', Sainsbury's have personal staff cameras. The group are recording events and police responses. They



'wholeheartedly' support more CCTV in the town centre, strategically placed. They want shoppers to tell staff about suspicious behaviour – and stop Chippy being a 'go-to' place for outside gangs.



Chippy's crime statistics

Chipping Norton (which covers neighbouring villages) is considered a low crime area. In the 12 months to end of July 2023 there were 1144 incidents officially recorded as crimes – as follows:

As noted earlier, the retailers say actual shoplifting is massively under recorded as 'official' crimes. Police resources are stretched – with many reports that many low-level common crimes are not followed up. But police say they are now following up all home burglaries, and Home Secretary Suella Braverman says it is 'unacceptable' not to act on all crimes which have helpful leads or evidence gathered. Please report any

Bankless & nearly cashless!

and residents needing cash in Chipping Norton. As of mid-September, the damaged ATM cash machine at Sainsbury's (that 'smash and grab'!) was still out of action with no publicised date for replacement. The only other ATM (outside the Co-op travel shop on Topside), has also had some on-off recently. moments One visitor recently tried to pay by card at a Town Hall sale event, but the WiFi wasn't working - they then failed to get any cash out of the nearby

Times are tough for visitors

ATM! Cash is available at the Post Office counter during opening hours if you are a patient queuer. It's also the only place in town where cash can be paid in – but if you have hundreds of pounds in coins it does take time. The News Team now takes the bulk of its cash collections to a bank branch in Banbury with a 'counting' hopper machine – avoiding the task of accurately filling up little plastic bags. Oh, for one of those in Chippy!

Meanwhile, the Barclays 'talk to an adviser' sessions (which started in July in the Town Hall four days a week, following the branch's closure) are proving popular, but causing some problems. Too many 'drop in' customers (many from our surrounding villages) are having to be looked after while waiting at the Town Hall. The Town Council is to talk to Barclays about this. Perhaps, in the light of all this there is still a chance of a permanent 'collaborative' banking hub - with dedicated space for I-I sessions with the major banks, and better, higher volume cash deposit solutions. This is something that the Government has been promoting for rural 'no bank' towns, but rollout has been frustratingly slow. The Link organisation has responsibility for reviewing and recommending these hubs. The hub in Brixham, run by the Post Office, is pictured, and a new one in Buckingham's market town is to be permanently based in their old Lloyds branch building (the last bank to close there). Any chance of this in Chipping Norton? And, maybe, one to lobby our MP about.

Bannor Electrical bows out

David and Wendy Gordon have decided the time is right to retire and finally wind down Bannor Electrical Services fully. The team left the shop off West Street some time ago but had continued to sell supplies directly and do contract work. But now, Wendy has told the News, 'David has had a couple of minor health scares and we wish to concentrate on our family and on his love of classic cars. We would like to thank all of the customers who have dealt with us over the past 47 years and we would also like to thank all the staff who have worked for us, past and present.' The three electricians currently working there, Justin, Stephen, and Chris, will be moving on. Wendy said, 'Chris is going to try retirement and Stephen is going on to another job. Justin is starting a business with his daughter – watch out for "Dad and Daughter" on social media'.

Chippy's 'best' GCSE results

After some great A level results, Chipping Norton School was able to report that their 2023 GCSE and BTEC results were the best in the School's history. 86% of students secured five GCSEs or more including both Maths and English. Average grades continued to rise for a fifth consecutive year, with close to one third of all results being grades 7 to 9. The average grade was one whole grade higher than it had been in 2018 – in a year when grades have not been inflated, as they were during COVID. But Headteacher Barry Doherty was particularly eager to point out the 'progress' statistics. Overall CNS students secured grades more than two-thirds higher than those in similar schools with similar students. He said also that the progress rate for the School's disadvantaged students has never been higher and now means they progress in line

with all students nationally – and secure over two-thirds of a grade higher in every exam than all disadvantaged students in similar schools across the country. After a historical 'gender gap', boys had improved performance for the last four years – and boys and girls were performing much more equally. Mr Doherty congratulated students, staff, parents and carers and now welcomed many students back to the School's outstanding Sixth Form wishing them every success.

The Branch is on track

Chipping Norton Town Council was given a positive update at their September meeting about the progress on the project to convert the old NatWest building into The Branch community hub. Emma Kennedy and Phil Sharman were very positive about about meeting the targets on both budget and timescale and the Town Council were delighted with the news. Emma Kennedy told the News that building work was now nearly three-quarters complete and October would see the various structural changes to the building completed, including new openings formed between the old parts of the building and the new Community Hall at the rear. The roofing works and the building 'envelope' will also be completed, making the building weatherproof - a huge relief given the very variable weather of late! Fit out of the building has now started, with interior partition walling and 'first fix' of the mechanical, electrical, and plumbing services happening this month. This all means that the site is a hive of activity, with multiple 'trades' working in all parts of the building and across all four floors, giving the site manager plenty to occupy him!

Emma added, 'We are still on time for our early February finish, and again apologies for the inconvenience caused. We were pleased to have worked with the Mop Fair to get as many rides as possible into the reduced space – and please be assured the Booster will be back next year!'

Climate action: MP challenged

Are we and the Government doing enough towards Net Zero to combat climate change? Campaigners say no – but to inform the debate, on 21 September local environment group Witney Eco Forum hosted an open evening at Witney's parish church. Local MP Robert Courts, the main panel guest, had said beforehand he would discuss the opportunities and implications from the recent Net Zero Review published by former Energy Minister Chris Skidmore on the UK's progress towards achieving net zero carbon emissions by 2050. A wide range of issues were raised, but Mr Courts was mainly faced with defending PM Rishi Sunak's controversial 'weakening' of climate actions pledges the day before this meeting – including delays on banning new oil boilers and new petrol or diesel

vehicles. He was also challenged on his personal objection to the major Botley West Solar Farm and his Government's policy of allowing local communities to veto on-shore windpower. The two other panellists, BBC Environment reporter Roger Harrabin and Bishop of Oxford Dr Steven Croft (on the House of Lords Select Committee for Environment and Climate Change), both raised their concerns that the Government's latest moves were blatant 'politicising', would lose consensus in the country about urgency for action, and damage the UK's International reputation.

Mr Courts pushed back on the challenges, insisting that the 2050 Net Zero target remained - it was all about changing the 'how' and practicality. He said he was eager to hear about how all this affected the Witney and West Oxfordshire constituency. But the applause in the room was mainly for the two other panellests. The large audience included members of a local climate action group called 'Robert Courts Watch', set up over a year ago by local people in Witney. That group had contacted the News saying they have been 'seeking to hold MP Robert Courts to account on the climate change issue', holding public vigils at his offices, and say the Westminster Government should be doing things more ... and much faster. They point to Parliament's own Climate Change Committee saying in August current government efforts to scale up climate action were 'worryingly slow'. Based on this evening's event – the item is clearly on Mr Court's agenda!

Behold The Black Horse!

After major refurbishment and a few delays over summer, Salford's historic pub – only a short walk over the fields from Chipping Norton – has reopened with its old name, The Black Horse, proudly back. The pub site was taken over a few months ago by Lionhearth Group, who currently run The Chequers in Churchill and The Swan in Ascott-



under-Wychwood. Manager Alex Daly and his team held an informal opening on 20 September and they hope to continue a village inn tradition as well as welcoming visitors from far and wide. Alex said 'our rustic country pub which has a combination of traditional charm and contemporary design flair will be offering pub classics together with professional, attentive service in one of the most beautiful villages in the Cotswolds. Gather your friends, family and four-legged friends and book with us soon to be the first to experience the allnew, best country pub in the Cotswolds. We look forward to welcoming you'.

Planning for town skatepark



reported As last month – a longawaited 'park for wheeled sports' could soon be coming to Chipping Norton. Finding a location has long been a stumbling block, but the last Town Council meeting heard that a positive meeting between Councillors and

the Field Reeves (Trustees of the Regulated Pastures) had discussed using space at the New Street Recreation Area. All this was after a Council survey three years ago had reported strong demand, and a delegation of young people from Chipping Norton School had presented their ideas to Councillors in May.

Clearly, fundraising will be needed – from both the public and grant-giving bodies – but the next main stage of work is to form a more organised local user group and to tap into the wider community to decide exactly what kind of skatepark will be best. This was discussed at September's Town Council Community Committee. Some questions to be addressed include: what size of skatepark is needed for the demand; what mix of wheeled sports should be catered for (such as boards, scooters, skates and BMX bikes); what kind of design (for example a 'street plaza' as used in the Olympics, a traditional park with a variety of jumps or ramps, or a 'flow park' with interlinked sections). Views on all of this can then go into 'design principles' for a tendering exercise. The next step is for the Town Council to contact potential users and form a user group. Anyone interested in being part of this user group should contact the Council via Townclerk@chippingnorton-tc.gov.uk. Once a costed proposal and evidence of support have been completed, funding can then be applied for.

Hear Radio Chipping Norton!

Many News readers may not remember or even know that we once had a 'Radio Chipping Norton'. Well, now you can find out all about it. In the late '70s, the BBC was keen to involve local communities and set up two local programmes, one from Thame and one from Chipping Norton. These involved, to start with, half an hour, inserted into a Sunday morning programme on Radio Oxford on a monthly basis. Over time, it changed to 10 minutes and other formats.



At the start in Chipping Norton, the late John Gripper, already involved as a local vet, encouraged several local people to join in. The team were John Gripper (pictured left on a Carnival float), Robert Evans, Martin Hannant, Jeremy and Marge Rowe,

Richard and Peta Simmons, and Graham Rousell. Later, Bob and Barbara Stevens, and Pete Webb, joined too.

When the programmes ended, Peta and Richard Simmons kept all the original tapes and eventually gave them to the Museum. They have recently gone through the exercise of transferring these from open reel tape to both a memory stick and the Museum's computer. There's now a full index of title, interviewer, and interviewee and this is also available. Should you wish to listen to any of the short pieces, please ask at the Museum. Peta told the News that the subjects covered ranged from the supermarket trolley dash to plans to close the Hospital. Some are serious, some light hearted. They include: Blue Boar cellars, Hospital proposed closure, historic medical instruments (Bruce Parker), home grown tobacco (Leonard Miles), glue sniffing, pigeons on the Town Hall, Peter Watson Middle East (Manufacturer of amazing sanitaryware), and the Happy Eater elephant. If you're interested in Chippy during the late 70s and early 80s, do go along and have a look at the diverse subjects covered and have a listen. Thanks to Peta for the update.

Chipping Norton – on the move!

What's happening to our Town Centre properties? Plans for the HSBC building seem to be stalled and there's a possible new developer (at last??) for the old Hospital site. Here's an update.

HSBC hotel – don't bank on it!

Six years after closure, plans for the fine **HSBC** building in

Market Place seem uncertain. An earlier plan for a Phone Coop HQ was replaced by a successful 2020 planning application by new owner SETHA for a 31-bedroomed boutique hotel. But SETHA Chipping Norton went into liquidation in June with Receiver, SFP Restructuring, appointed. An auction plan was withdrawn,



with the Receiver apparently hopeful of a financial solution. More detail is awaited. The hotel planning permission runs out in November, unless quickly renewed!



Of our other abandoned banks, **NatWest** is being successfully converted to The Branch hub but **Barclays'** and **TSB**'s ground floor High Street premises remain vacant

- for rental at £36,900 and £27,000 pa respectively. Letting agents 'arc' told The

News they were trying to secure a new tenant so Barclays could surrender their lease – they are still paying building rent despite running a banking 'client consultation' service in the Town Hall. Tayler and Fletcher are handling the former TSB premises where, despite

extensive ground floor accommodation, one-metre thick concrete security walls make any conversion of this Grade II listed building challenging.

Old Hospital plans revived

Chippy's former **War Memorial Hospital** on Over Norton Road still lies derelict. But, after more than 10 years and little progress by small developer St Charles Homes, it seems longawaited action might be on the way. A possible new owner is linked to major UK property developer Salboy – based in the North West and, apparently, with a £1 billion property development pipeline. In July, the company secured a positive assurance from WODC that site work 'had started', meaning that planning permission for 14 dwellings (including using the old existing building) was still valid. A company spokesperson thought the intention was to build out that agreed scheme. With Salboy's main track record focused on city and high-rise projects, their interest in this complex rural site is interesting. But we'll have to wait until the deal is done to know more.

Meanwhile the nearby former **Police Station** is being carefully transformed into new homes. Estate agents Mark David have sale details. One other interesting long-empty

property that end of town is the old **BT Telephone Exchange** in Over Norton Road. Could that produce another interesting project?

Market moves in Town Centre

At 17-18 High Street, **Boots** have a lease until July 2025 at \pounds 80,000 rental pa. The whole site, which includes two flats above and a long burgage plot behind, was sold prior

to auction last December. The burgage plot was sold on to Wychwood Homes, whose new planning application for 6 houses

awaits determination (see article p9).The Boots building is for sale again! Other commercial premises to let include the 1315 sq ft empty **22 High Street**, (vacated a year back by the Newsagents), at £25,000 pa.The recently closed **Mighty Pie**, a 250 sq ft shop with large



commercial kitchen behind, is for let at £14,400 pa. The former Wild Thyme restaurant premises at 10 New Street reopens shortly as a new branch for solicitors Lee Chadwick. Meanwhile, the former Johnson Gaunt solicitors' office at 2 New Street remains available. Rogér's deli and fish shop and two longlease flats are unaffected by the freehold of 22 New Street being offered for £200,000. The former Vets (recently Co-op Funeral Care) building in Albion St (with its own car park!) is still for sale for £450,000. Even the Town Council has first floor Guildhall office space to let – 646 sq ft at £7,752 pa. Now there's a prestigious business address!

All change along West St

At 11 West Street, the building that housed West St Newsagents, with 426 sq ft retail area and a further three floors, with asking price of £350,000, is under offer. Further along, 13 West Street, the neo-Georgian Old Post Office, now occupied by The Vintage Car Club, was recently snapped up by a Chippy resident who intends to convert the whole building, subject to planning permission, into flats for let. The tiny old K&M Fishing Tackle shop at 23 West St is being restored as a private house.

This seems a lot of commercial space vacant. Is there a problem? Local agents Tayler and Fletcher describe Chipping Norton as 'picturesque, vibrant, highly sought after, with an impressive array of shops, exceptional services, an affluent demographic, rich architecture and lively community'. It is a haven for foodies, they say! They seem unconcerned, saying the market is stable and as positive as they have known for 15 years, Rents were not dropping. Let's hope they'll be able to attract some interesting new businesses to contribute to the vitality of our town centre.



Bus stop upgrade – finally!



As regular Chipping Norton bus user Rita Heritage says on her placard (see photo) 'at last after 4 years of wind and rain', the Walterbush Road bus stop has been given improvements weather-worn to shelter passengers from the elements. Rita has been campaigning for several years to have the sides of the bus shelter replaced and a bench installed. She is pleased the changes have at last been made - all in time for her 90th birthday in October. Just shows: age is no barrier to successful а campaign.

Everyone, including local residents and our Town Councillors who agreed the changes, will also be hoping the bus shelter does not suffer the abuse and misuse that caused problems and nuisance in the past.

Plans for Chippy's Christmas

Yes – it's nearly here again! No soon is summer over than we're planning Christmas. Elsewhere in the News are items on the Methodist Church's Christmas Tree Festival and the Shoebox Appeal, and don't forget to book the very Latino *Cinderella* panto at the Theatre. There's no major 'Christmas in Chippy' market this year (hopefully back next year) but there's now going to be what is hoped to be a regular annual 'Christmas Lights Switch On' event and evening on Thursday 23 November in the Town Centre to start the Christmas festivities period. Highlights provisionally planned at the Town Hall are:

- Christmas carols, singalong, and entertainment from 6pm
- Lights switch-on by the Mayor and two Chippy residents!
- Children's Lantern Parade (lantern-making 3 November)
- Mulled wine and mince pies
- Space for stallholders (4-8pm).

As with last year, lights will be displayed on the Town Hall, on the main trees in the Market Square, and on the little trees (this year using recycled plastic) on as many shop-front brackets as possible! 
Perilous car trips to Oxford!

Way forward at The Beeches!

After a request from residents af The Beeches caravan site in Chipping Norton, and a concerted effort by District Councillor Rizvana Poole and others, a new footpath is to be constructed to help residents get safely to both the bus stops and the main footpath on the A361 to walk to Chipping Norton. Construction of the footpath is now officially scheduled to commence on 23 October and is expected to be completed within five weeks of that date. Rizvana explained that the absence of a footpath has posed significant challenges for residents, particularly those with mobility limitations and the young children of the community. She was particularly pleased with all the collaborative efforts to make it happen – with the path acting as a symbol of inclusiveness, breaking down barriers, and a shared commitment to the welfare of everyone in the neighbourhood. The project had involved discussions with the different local authorities and meticulous planning. Rizvana praised the grassroots efforts and advocacy involved and also thanked County Councillor Liz Leffman for her support with the campaign.

£5m gold toilet breakthrough

Not really a Chippy story, but readers may recall how a solid gold toilet - an 'installation' Italian bv artist Maurizio Cattelan. worth $\pounds 5m - was$ ripped out and stolen from an exhibition at Blenheim Palace in Woodstock nearby back in September 2019. The 18-carat




specimen totally disappeared; police arrested seven suspects, some local, at the time but no-one was charged. However, Thames Valley Police now seem to think they have 'something to go on' and have just filed a full dossier with the Crown Prosecution Service who will determine if charges can be brought. The stolen toilet (pictured – called 'America') was previously displayed at the Guggenheim Museum in New York and could be used as a functioning toilet. In 2016, 100,000 people queued to use it; a three-minute time limit had to be imposed to limit waiting times. At Blenheim, it had also been plumbed in – with the thieves leaving behind only the flushing mechanism and loo roll.

Meanwhile, the toilets inside Chipping Norton Town Hall have had a makeover as part of the refurbishments at the Town Hall. No gold-plating was involved. The WODCmaintained public loos adjacent to the Town Hall are also currently in working order after repairs earlier this year, and the public loos in the New Street car park are also available. Fingers crossed we will continue to have all of these for our convenience.

Six homes behind Boots

Behind Boots shop in Chipping Norton's High Street lies one of the few remaining medieval 'burgage plots' stretching up to Albion Street. Property developer Wychwood Homes had previously submitted a planning application for seven new homes on the long plot. However, in response to advice from



experts and comments by local Councillors, in September Town Councillors considered a revised proposal reducing the number of homes from seven to six and using more traditional design and building materials. At the Town Council meeting Cllr Jo Graves said 'I think it's great' but Cllr Athos Ritsperis challenged the developer to provide more low

carbon technologies, saying 'We simply cannot go on building how we have for the last 100 years'. The planning application will be determined by WODC.

Top awards for Chippy engineers

Chipping Norton-based Civil and Structural Engineers SOLID – whose head office is located off Albion Street – are celebrating after scooping multiple architectural awards recently. These include the Civic Trust Awards, AJ Small Project Awards, RIBA National Awards, and RIBA South Awards, with

possibly more to come! The company SOLID Structures and Infrastructure, founded by Sean Daly, began life as a small practice located within the iconic Hook Norton Brewery building. They've grown with multiple branches including their purpose-built head office studio in Chipping Norton next door to the Co-op, designed by Oxfordshire based architects William Green Architects.

One of their smaller projects, Black Barn Studios in Hook Norton, collected the Architect's Journal Small Project Awards first ever 'Sustainability Award'. Designed by Oxfordshire Architects Charlie Luxton Design and housing their offices, the development used a repurposed steelframed barn and sustainable materials. The team's project work for Oxford University's St Hilda's College, marking its 125th anniversary, is for a new public entrance sequence of



spaces embodying the college's identity and values, designed by Architect Gort Scott. It won a Civic Trust Award and a South RIBA Regional Award in May. SOLID worked as Stone Façade Specialists on the Radley College Chapel extension, designed by architects Purcell. That project picked up a Regional Award, Regional Conservation Award and RIBA South Building of the Year Award – then went on to win a RIBA National Award. All three designs are unique with the ambitious developments raising complex challenges and the SOLID team were thrilled their hard work had paid off.

Efforts to refurbish Chipping Norton Town Hall and encourage much more community and commercial use seem to be paying off – and Councillors want to step up marketing and promotion efforts.



There is now regular use by community groups such as the Community Church, Choral Society, Amnesty, u3a, and The Theatre's dance, singing and Youth Theatre sections. There are also regular banking advice slots, piano lessons, and an increasing number of commercial hire events and private parties using the upper and lower halls. Events Officer Tania Kirby updated Councillors at their September meeting about future possible events:

- Saturday Club DJ Nights on the last Saturday each month (next date 28 October) with tickets for £5 sold online through The Theatre. From 9pm to midnight. Bar (card only). DJ local legend Jason plays club classics across dance genres from House Music to Drum n Bass that'll have you rocking the dance floor – so get your whistles ready – grab your old skool raving friends, and come along to the Town Hall for a sweaty, bouncy evening of dance delight (organised by the Town Council).

- **'Open the Blue Doors'** drop-in sessions on Tuesdays for young people in term time. All this needs volunteers, potential sponsorship and some organisation!
- A Latin Dance Ball run in the Town Hall jointly with The Theatre, linked with the Latin theme of this year's panto, Cinderella. There's a pencilled date of 2 December but details need to be finalised.
- The Snow Queen a puppet workshop for families, premiered by Theatrix, planned for 25 November.
- Thames Valley Police Open Event on 4 November for details see feature, page 2.
- **Jobs Fair** date to be finalised with local businesses, other employers and advisers on hand to help with jobs, skills and training opportunities.

Councillors agree that a 'step up' in marketing the Town Hall is needed, aimed at getting more commercial and private hires – with advertising and promotion of the space and services offered, including support for event hirers. There could also be more efforts to use the bar as a profit-maker. The other news is that the Town Council is now increasingly working in partnership with Chipping Norton Theatre as the ticket seller

for many events. The Theatre's website will show many events – but also see the Town Council's Town Hall webpage and their social media for the latest.

Museum Finds Day



Legion salutes the RAF flag

On Monday 21 August members of Chipping Norton Royal British Legion and the RAF Air Training Cadets attended the



raising of the RAF Ensign by the Town Council at the Millennium Garden flagpole. On this date each year the air crash that took place over Chipping Norton on 21 August 1942 is commemorated. In wartime blackout with no radar, an Airspeed Oxford Mark II trainer from Little Rissington collided with a Vickers Wellington Mark IC Bomber (probably painted black on its underside to avoid detection) from Harwell. Tragically, all the crew were killed, with the Wellington crashing into what is now Heather Cottage down Church Street. Miraculously there were no civilian casualties. Last year, in 2022 – the 80th anniversary – the Royal British Legion were joined at the site by family members of pilots lan Henderson and Stanley Downs.

In a sad reminder of flying dangers, News readers will probably also have heard locally of the crash in August near Enstone of a replica Spitfire, a modern version of the famous World War II fighter plane. Tragically, the pilot, 68-year-old

He was a member of The Spitfire Club at Enstone Airfield. Tributes to Mr Bailey described him as a great friend, pilot and family man – who was pursuing his passion. The cause of the crash is being investigated.

Plans to save Old Bakehouse

As reported in July, The Old Bakehouse supported living home in Chadlington, owned by the Abbeyfield Society, was under threat of closure. In late May, staff and residents were informed of this possibility and interested parties were given a 45-day consultation period. Since then, relatives of the residents, with help from the necessary professional bodies and influential individuals, have worked tirelessly to engage positively with the Abbeyfield Society to potentially save the place from closure, take ownership of the building, and eventually run the place independently.



To this end, a charitable association was registered, called 'The friends of The Old Bakehouse' with a bank account to be opened. The charity hopes to raise a 'fighting fund' of up to £5,000 to support administration costs, which are mounting. The long-term goal of the Trustees is to form a Charitable Incorporated Organisation, facilitate buying the building and employ a management team and staff to run day-to-day operations. To this end, an Acquisition and Operational Plan is being prepared to determine the total funding needed in the future.

The News was told that in about 1980, Tom Pitt, a local farmer, gifted The Old Bakehouse to the village with the express purpose of providing supported living for the elderly (who have family living locally) who need some assistance whilst retaining their independence. He was a committed Rotarian and the Rotary Club members supported him to realise his ambition. The Trustees have yet to establish the wording of the Deed of Covenant drawn up by Tom Pitt. It would be helpful to them to hear from anyone who remembers Tom, or his wife Mary, or who had any connections with members of the Rotary Club who might have been involved in the setting up of the Old Bakehouse as a residential establishment. 

Let's Talk about Gambling!



Citizens Advice West Oxfordshire contacted the News with some warnings about the increase in gambling problems and how to get help. They say gambling has become normalised. Almost half our adult population gambles, whether that's buying a lottery ticket, playing bingo, or placing a sports

bet. Advances in mobile technology now allow people to gamble at anytime, anywhere, and on anything. Sports like football are saturated by gambling sponsorship and we see advertising on TV and across social media. What is gambling? - you're gambling if you take a risk of losing money, or belongings, based on chance. Lots of gambling seems very normal and is easy to access. What are some of the problems it can cause? People who come to us for support with gambling may need help with other problems. Often they don't realise that gambling might be the cause for: debts, housing problems, mental health, employment or education problems, family or relationship issues. A gambling problem can mean there isn't enough money to pay for rent, bills and food. It can mean running up credit card bills and other debts. It can mean relationships breaking down, job losses and homelessness.

These problems don't just affect the person who is gambling. They can affect their family, friends and people they work with. Whether you need support with your own gambling, or you want to help someone else, the Citizens Advice services are here for you – including if you've been affected by someone else's gambling. You can find out about gambling harm at the GambleAware or Citizens Advice websites – and what do if you or others you know have a problem. Be prepared for the winter

Are you ready for winter? Checking electrical appliances to make sure they are working efficiently helps save money and keeps you safe. It's good to go around your house and make sure that all escape routes are unblocked. Having a smoke detector on each floor is a wise move and preplan your exit in case of emergency. Only a few places are available for free electric blanket testing, which will take place on 5 October at Wood Green, Witney. If you are worried about your blanket, don't delay, get it checked. The electric blanket tests are normally very popular, with places limited. To book call 01865 895999 or email duty.officer@oxfordshire.gov.uk. Testing electric blankets has taken place in Oxfordshire for over 20 years. The failure rate is still around 30 per cent, emphasising why it is so important to get electric blankets checked regularly. If you didn't manage to get a slot this time, do a visual check to see if there are any frayed wires or lumps in the wiring, as this could be faulty and best not to use. If you have an elderly friend or relative remind them to check their appliances. It is better to be safe than sorry.

WODC's Local Plan in turmoil?

Chippy's growth plan in disarray

If you thought our County and District Councils (OCC and WODC) had a plan for Chipping Norton's growth to benefit the community, think again! For over 5 years we've been

What's happened to East Chippy plan?

That 1200 home East Chippy plan was key. Our then Town Council, acknowledging that Chippy did need more housing (particularly affordable), reluctantly agreed to the scale of the

waiting for the strategic' development allocated in WODC's 2031 Local Plan (adopted in 2018) to actually be built.WODC (as planning authority) and OCC (as strategic authority and major landowner at Chippy's Tank Farm) had eventually agreed that 1200 new homes should be built at East Chipping Norton with a Masterplan to be drawn up. This Strategic Development Area would be big enough to fund much needed town infrastructure including a new school and an HGV Relief Road.

After 5 years, less than 200 homes have been built (Bloor Homes at The Pillars

and McCarthy Stone at Watson Place) out of that 1200 East Chippy Plan. The story makes grim reading - see next article. Even worse, slow progress on other sites across the District, means WODC has insufficient 'housing land supply' to meet their targets, so planning rules have allowed something of a free-for-all. LOTS of homes could be built, not where intended, but instead on piecemeal sites on the edge of town without sustainable infrastructure. This happened at Bellway's Cotswold Gate at Evans Way which was completed finally in 2019. And now developers Rainier, Gleeson, and Blue Cedar have stepped in with new proposals. Over 300 homes have already been approved outside the local plan (Bellway and Rainier) and, with Gleeson popping up and Rainier' additional land waiting in the wings, there is potential for 500 more homes, plus 1000+ at East Chippy also still in the Plan! See main map and details on opposite page.



plan after OCC and WODC said it would be 'sustainable', being big enough to help fund the infrastructure the Town needed, including a Relief Road, new school, sports pitches, extra health facilities and more. But in five years, not even a Masterplan has been agreed. Landowners OCC and Cala guibbled, WODC was stopped by a legal challenge from publishing planning guidance for the then, very late, site, archaeology, suspected years ago, was found. Such a strategic development needs co-operation between landowners, the


planning authority and the local community. Chippy's Town Council has been frustrated. The main landowner at East Chippy is our own County Council, who should surely be working in the best interests of the people who elected them. Why has OCC not been more proactive in bringing forward proposals on its own land, most of which is not constrained by archaeology? Why, indeed, has WODC not been banging landowners' heads together to work in a pragmatic way to make land available? The News asked our WODC and OCC Councillor Geoff Saul if he could explain. He replied, 'The County Council are keen to make progress and have discussed this possibility with WODC Officers. However, some care is needed because the Local Plan refers to comprehensive development led by an agreed Masterplan, so we need to identify the most appropriate way forward for East Chippy as a whole'.

Your ideas for WODC's new Local Plan

Can you help WODC? With all this turmoil, and an aging 2018 Local Plan, West Oxfordshire District Council's

recently elected Lib Dem/Labour/Green alliance has started work on a new Local Plan to cover the period to 2041.WODC is asking us how planning should respond to climate change, with a focus on transport, housing, industry and energy.They are keen to know where we think future growth should be across the District. Currently, the

strategy is growth in the three main towns (Witney, Carterton and Chipping Norton), plus additional growth in rural service centres, limited growth in villages, and restricted growth in smaller settlements. Chippy's 'piecemeal' housing chaos

More homes – but no sustainable plan?

It seems WODC's ageing Local Plan, adopted after a long



ing Local Plan, adopted after a long delay way back in 2018, is not delivering sufficient (or affordable) homes across the District. Failure to deliver 1000 new homes at East Chippy Strategic Development Area is one such example. As a result, developers have been targeting, in a piecemeal way, greenfield land not allocated in the Local Plan. The result: haphazard housing that risks making Chippy's growth unsustainable, with no Masterplan to ensure funding of

vital town infrastructure – including public transport and greener, safer access to work, shops and education.

Examples below demonstrate how unallocated greenfield land could potentially see 800 new homes in addition to the 1000+ already allocated at East Chippy. Chipping Norton Mayor Sandra Coleman hit the mail on the head, telling the News 'It's not enough to build just homes in isolation. Our growing town needs homes in the right place, together with schools, health care, sports pitches, upgraded transport, town centre parking and many other facilities. Piecemeal development like this fails our community. We all need to get this right.'

Bellway's Cotswold Gate estate

Ten years ago, 228 homes were given planning permission at Evans Way off Burford Road before the much-delayed 2018 WODC Local Plan had replaced the previous Plan. Although 90 of the homes were affordable, and S106 developer contributions paid for a play area and improvements to sports facilities, there was little help with town centre congestion, schools, or healthcare.

Rainier beyond the Cricket Club

As we reported recently, land investor (not house-builder) Rainier's арplication for about a hundred homes off the Banbury Road, up beyond the Cricket Club and outside the East Chippy SDA was permitted.




Despite the Town Council's concern about a lack of Masterplan, access and public transport, WODC felt they must approve this proposal due to their lack of housing land supply.

The developer will make financial contributions, but the site will be entirely residential with no land allocated for sports or other infrastructure. Residents will also most likely have to drive to reach the town centre. Rainier are also sitting on more land between Banbury Road and London Road which, they say, has capacity for a further 400+ homes in the future.

Gleeson off Burford Road

It doesn't stop there! Last month saw a consultation (preceding, they say, a planning application) for 100 new homes by developers Gleeson Land. The site, off Burford Road next to the Rugby Club, is outside the Local Plan. Gleeson are offering up to 40 affordable homes plus some open space and a play area, but



no other facilities. More of the same, it seems. Like Rainier, Gleeson hope to capitalise on WODC's lack of housing land. WODC's Executive Housing member, Chippy Cllr Geoff Saul, told the News WODC would publish new 'housing land supply' statistics shortly. He said the new Local Plan to 2041, just starting, would 'reset' things and reduce speculative inappropriate development. But it could be years before a new Local Plan is adopted - so that 'stable door' may be very late shutting! Gleeson presented to Chipping Norton Town Council in September, with over 20 residents attending, Mayor Sandra Coleman wants to explore how proposals could help upgrade nearby Greystones leisure facilities. Many other issues were raised including archaeology, River Glyme contamination, sewage capacity, need for more sports pitches, impact on health and school facilities, weak commitment to eco-homes and, unsurprisingly, questions about town centre traffic, and why no allowance for the Link Road. Developments off Churchill Road

Land at Westfield Farm, off Churchill Road, is also a hot topic. It has been targeted for development before. Nearly 10 years ago, WODC won a battle at Appeal to refuse 60 homes on an 'unallocated' site here. But recently, an Inspector allowed a a farm building to become a holiday home and now there's a new application by Blue Cedar Homes to build five 'over 55s' bungalows close to Tilsley Road and Lords Piece Road. There's been a barrage of objections, including from the Town Council citing: harm to the AONB, the Conservation Area, the setting of Bliss Mill, ecology, road safety, drainage and privacy. And why more homes for over 55s? Pre-application advice from WODC said they were 'unable to provide support for the scheme', but, like the other proposals, the developer is citing WODC's lack of housing land supply. Might WODC now have to approve this one, and, as one local objector fears, give Blue Cedar 'a handy precedent to build more'? WODC's Uplands Planning Committee will face another difficult decision.



Chippy's help for rescue cats



Have you found an abandoned cat in Chipping Norton or could you provide a caring home? After a West Oxfordshire-based cat's charity closed, Sunshine Cat Rescue was set up and has been caring for local cats for 11 years. Chippy resident and Trustee Sharon Carbonero said, 'The Charity relies entirely on donations, legacies, grants and

fundraising events to help us look after the cats and kittens that come into our care. Landlords do not always allow pets into rented accommodation; families may break up or go abroad or suffer bereavement; sadly, animals are just abandoned and left to die. Life-saving action for spaniel Archie

A team at Chipping Norton Veterinary Hospital were praised by Chippy resident Laetisia Carter, after her 15-month-old cocker spaniel Archie was stricken after ingesting into his lungs four arrowhead grass seed stems - an example of this if



pictured left Archie almost died after his lungs collapsed. Vet Peter Kettlewell said Archie came in with a fever – but X-Ray and CT scans revealed pneumothorax and pyothorax (air and pus in the chest). Two hours of surgery followed. This

treatment doesn't come cheap. It was

reported that two of the vets used their

£1000 allocation from the IVC Evidensia Care Fund to help fund the surgery. The dog's owner, reaching their insurance limit, footed the rest of the bill. Laetisia posted 'a massive thank you' to Chippy Vets and their 'talented, kind, compassionate team'.

Badger culling in Oxfordshire

The controversial Government policy to cull badgers to combat Bovine TB has hit the headlines again – and nearby parts of Oxfordshire are involved. Direct culling started 10 years ago – and the



Oxfordshire Badger Group - pictured at a recent protest - say 60% of the County (west of a line between Banbury and Thame) could see 5000 badgers culled in the six weeks from I September. Berks, Buck and Oxon Wildlife Trust (BBOWT) are also objecting. Both organisations say evidence that culling shoots are effective is flawed, preferring Bovine vaccination and other policies. The Government had signalled a halt to culling after current licences expire in 2025, but DEFRA secretary Thérèse Coffey now says badgers will continue to be trapped and shot 'for as long as we need', adding, 'there hadn't been (enough) progress' on other solutions such as vaccination. Many farmers support the culling programme but Oxfordshire campaign groups fear 'badger extinction'.

Your hedgehog-friendly garden



Can you help our hedgehogs? These much-loved creatures, with a gentle unobtrusive presence, cute faces, and great garden bugmanagement services, have been our friends for half a million years. But numbers

have declined over 30+ years, down by 30-75% nationally, with, surprisingly rural areas like Chippy affected more, according to a 2022 report by The British Hedgehog Preservation Society (BHPS) and People's Trust for Endangered Species. Reasons are complex, largely interlinked with other environmental losses, and caused mainly by human activity. These include fewer hedgerows, more arable crop farming (with fewer places for them to live, breed and hibernate safely), decline in bug numbers (hedgehogs eat a varied diet of invertebrates: worms, beetles, slugs, caterpillars, earwigs, and millipedes), pollution from pesticides including crop spraying, weedkillers and slug pellets, and of course, road casualties. To help hedgehogs survive and thrive, make them welcome in your garden. But how? To help with everything from access to feeding and nesting - try the fun quiz from the Hedgehog Highways website you the answers will tell more! See www.hedgehogstreet.org/garden-challenge/

Your experience of Vets?

In September, the Government's Competition and Markets Authority launched a review of the vet industry saying that vets' costs were rising faster than other goods and services. They want to hear pet owners' experiences. See CMA via www.gov.uk. During Lockdown and over the last four years, pet ownership has increased substantially - and this has created a boom in the demand for vets. Brexit also hit vet numbers as some vets had to leave the UK. In addition, the proportion of independent vet practices dropped from 89% in 2013 to only 45% by 2021. Locally, the previously independent Chipping Norton Vets partnership was bought by the IVC Evidensia Group, the largest European vet company with over 1500 clinics and hospitals. It's owned by EQT Private Equity, with consumer giant Nestlé, with its global Purina PetCare business, one of the 'substantial' investors. Our other local vets, the Hook Norton Veterinary Group, with branches in Hooky, Charlbury, Deddington and Moreton is a member of XLVets, an international group of over 100 independent practices that share knowledge and skills.

September saw another successful Apple Day at the Community Orchard – home to a whole range of summer fruits. And we've added some ideas on what to do with fruits – foraged from Chippy's

At work were Phil the Bodger and Jim with his walking sticks. Delicious juice, cakes, puddings, bread, cheese and other delights were available. As ever, children were invited to hang cider-soaked toast on the trees. Bells, whistles and voices duly drove out evil spirits and Morris Men led Wassailing songs and, of course, danced! Kids and adults dressed up.Well done to all the volunteers and thanks to our orchard neighbours for their support and tolerance. Let's feast on foraged fruits!

A mix of warm and wet Chippy summer weather has produced an abundance of hedgerow fruit and nuts. With container to hand whilst out and about, we've been picking blackberries, elderberries, sloes, rose hips, crab apples and hazelnuts - including from our own gardens. Brambles are a nuisance but they produce some luscious fruit when left until early autumn. To make use of these foraged fruits, jams, jellies and syrup can easily be made and stored for several months. Nuts can be left to dry off and stored in jars too. Here are a couple of ideas.

Rosehip syrup

Use the large type from the wild hedgerow rose. About 500 grams with 350 grams of sugar and 700 mils of water needed. Chop or process the clean fruit and place in a saucepan with the water, simmering for about 15 minutes. Strain through muslin or a sieve until the juice runs clear. Add the sugar, bring to the boil for 3-4 minutes, skimming off the scum. Pour into sterilised bottles and label.

Should last about four months and will be delicious over porridge, pancakes, yoghurt or ice cream.

Elderberry Jam

Requires 500 grams of berries, washed and cleared of stalk and leaves, plus 400 grams of sugar and a tablespoon of lemon juice. Put the berries in a large heavy pan and crush with a potato masher until juices run. Add the sugar and lemon juice, and simmer until sugar has dissolved. Bring to the boil and cook for about 15 minutes, scooping off any scum. Test by dropping a dollop on to a cold plate and if

a wrinkle forms, the jam is ready. Cool slightly before pouring into sterilised jars. Label and keep in the fridge one opened.



Ready for the Great British Chill?

With energy costs, climate change, and a cold winter beckoning - how can we keep our homes warm and our energy costs and usage low? The News Team's Linda Aspey gives some pointers but tell us your experience!

First some low-cost quick wins



- Turn off the lights when not in use (yes, it's a nightmare to get the kids to remember!)
- Reduce your thermostat by I degree. This can reduce annual heating bills by 10%
- Fit temporary draught excluders like foam strips or plastic sheeting to doors and window frames
- Clear out your gutters to reduce risk of water leaking in and causing damp
- Insulate your hot water cylinder with a jacket
- Hang long, heavy curtains inside external doors (ours were charity shop finds).



Get your home insulated

'Eco Plus', a new government energy efficiency scheme, now rebranded as the 'Great British Insulation Scheme' (who said climate activism never works?!) will, subject to eligibility, partor fully-fund retrofitted loft and cavity wall insulation. Uninsulated roofs and walls can lose 20-35% of heat, so insulation reduces energy bills and greenhouse gas emissions significantly. Contact your energy supplier, or visit www.westoxon.gov.uk/environment/climate-action/energyefficiency-advice-and-grants/. If you're a tenant in social or private rental housing, your landlord must, by law, ensure your home has an EPC (Energy Performance Certificate) of at least E (A being best, G worst). But as they don't benefit from lower energy bills, there's little incentive for them to do more. However, if you're eligible for a grant, you could ask if they'll pay the balance - EPC standards could get tougher in future.

Help with Energy Bills

The 2022 'Energy Price Cap' scheme capped the unit price on electricity, gas and standing citizens charges and gave one-off householder fuel advice grants (£150 to c£400). October 2023 sees a small Price Cap fall and a small rise in standing charges, reducing a typical annual bill from



£2,074 to £1,923 (in 2021 it was £1,138); prepaid meters and

Here are two personal Chippy experiences

Having recently installed 15 solar panels (6.5kw output), Chippy resident Paul Davison says, 'Three things I recommend before buying solar. First, get three quotes - for roughly the same array of solar panels, our three quotes varied by almost 40%. Second, make sure the people you work with are both EPVS and NAPIT accredited - this demonstrates they're a competent installer. Finally, bear in mind that for maximum benefit you have to change the way you use electricity. On the upside we've had several days this summer exporting more

direct debit payers save a little more. Struggling with bills? Try your energy supplier first – they can be surprisingly helpful, or contact Citizens Advice. Many Chipping Norton residents live in fuel poverty and Christians Against Poverty, in partnership with St Mary's Church, is offering free advice - call 0800 328 006 or visit chippingnorton.occ.org.uk/cap - plus look out for updates on advisory services from The Branch.

Renewable Energy

For homeowners, renewable energy devices are gaining in efficiency and getting cheaper by the year. Until 2027 projects involving energy saving materials (ESMs) are exempt from VAT, and some mortgage lenders offer loans for renewable energy installations.

Solar panels can save the average family c£1,200 a year and

cost c£5,000 for a 4kW system, and you can sell excess energy back to the grid. When there's less sun, a battery of 4kW provides sufficient electricity for a few hours, useful too if there's a mains grid power cut.

Heat pumps can be highly efficient, using up to 70% less energy than gas boilers - great for the environment. They don't automatically save on energy bills as it depends on what's being replaced and how, and on variable energy market prices. For a typical 3 bedroom home, a 10kW air source heat pump (ASHP) costs £8,000 to £14,000, a ground source one c£24,000 (GSHP) – find local installers via renewableenergyhub.co.uk/search-installers. The government's Boiler Upgrade Scheme (BUS) provides £5,000-£6000 for heat pumps and biomass boilers, subject to criteria. Visit gov.uk/apply-boiler-upgrade-scheme/what-youcan-get or ask your energy supplier.

electricity than we've used - actually receiving money from the power company is a great feeling!'

News Team member Linda Aspey had an air source heat pump and solar panels installed four years ago when she moved into her then dilapidated home. She says, 'I spent a lot up front as the current grant system wasn't in place - instead I get a small quarterly 'incentive' payment. But I don't regret it for a second. It's efficient and comfortable to have my heat pump on a low constant setting in winter, and it's a lot quieter than I thought it would be. And I love that in summer I earn money from my solar panels!'

Tamara Malcolm 1937-2023

Passionate, inspirational and formidable 'Grand Dame' of The Theatre Chipping Norton

On 7 September, family and friends met in Stroud for the funeral and celebration of the life of Tamara Malcolm who died in August aged 86. In Chipping Norton, many recalled Tamara and her astonishing contribution, as co-founder and Director of the Theatre, to creative art, to the community and to the lives of many people she worked with and inspired.

A fierce independent spirit – Tamara was born in Swiss Cottage, London, in 1937. Aged 19 she graduated from the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art. Her early career, initially under her maiden name Tamara Fuerst, was as an actor working in regional repertory theatre, film and TV, highlighted by a long stint with the Royal Shakespeare Company, including in Peter Brook's *Marat/Sade*. Tamara's early acting career and life experience such as living in Africa allowed her to meet and work with a diverse set of people from different social and national backgrounds. Partly from this, she developed a life-long passion for social justice and inclusion and she would positively bring these values to her work and life later in Chipping Norton.

Building a wonderful legacy - With her then husband,

actor John Malcolm, Tamara came to Chipping Norton in 1968. A little later, in the early 70s, John first mooted the idea of a theatre having spotted the old Salvation Army Citadel in Spring Street. In 1970, Tamara, admitting she no longer got nervous waiting in the stage wings, said it was time she



stopped. Surrounded by Chippy folk and volunteers, she and John threw themselves into the building project and fundraising (everything from jumble sales, rousing the community and putting on puppet shows in the villages). The first two pantomimes (*Beauty and the Beast* 1973 and *Old King Cole* 1974) were in the Town Hall, The Theatre charity was established, and the Theatre was finally opened early in 1975 by Dr Who's Tom Baker. Formidable passion for excellence – Tamara pursued the vision of a theatre, in and with the community, with dedication, energy and humour. Her daughter Aimée recalled how she, no longer then with John, was joined by key staff (mostly women like her with young children), by lifelong theatre-world friends such as Murray Melvin, Dudley Sutton, Jeff Clarke, and by many others. Fundraising was never-ending, from 'buy a brick' to a Friends of the Theatre organisation now over 1000 members strong, and to one of the earliest successful bids to the National Lottery. But it was artistic excellence that Tamara put first, creating a national reputation for her successful pantos - she loathed 'bad theatre'. She was proud of her inhouse professional productions such as Quack Quack, Jeff Clarke's Sweet Liberty (on the French Revolution), and, with Collective Artistes, the iconic Lorca's Yerma. She was passionate about nurturing young talent and encouraged the often oversubscribed Youth Theatre. She cared about staff and her 'actors', cooking them hearty meals with great enthusiasm.

A curiosity for the world – Tamara spent 29 years as Founder/Director of the Theatre, and was awarded the MBE in 2000, presented in the Theatre by the then Lord Lieutenant. She had insisted on sharing her medal with all those who had made The Theatre possible.

She retired on her 65th birthday (VE Day!) in 2002, saying she needed to pass The Theatre on to a younger generation. She and her partner of 45 years Harold Hurrell moved to Stroud but she always kept in touch. She continued working as an artistic consultant – particularly for several years with Collective Artistes, one of the most influential black theatre ensembles. She now found time for all her passions, visiting Europe to see many of the wonderful operas and theatres – not just for the shows but also for the buildings.

Tamara, as son NOJ said at her funeral, 'lived so large'. She loved and was loved by many. In an extraordinary life, she touched so many people. She was flamboyant, laughed loud and long, loved the absurd, and retained a generosity of spirit. She will be much missed and Chipping Norton is better for her 'passing through'. Oh yes they are!



Brian Kay looks back

This much-admired conductor reflects on 21 years with The Burford Singers

I've been lucky enough to spend my entire working life pursuing my hobby – making music! I've recently written it all down – memories and anecdotes – in my autobiographical book Music, My Life (Umbria Press). A major part of that life ends in November when I hand over conductorship of The Burford Singers after 21 wonderful years. I've lived in nearby Fulbrook nearly 50 years, so you can imagine what a joy it's been to make music with friends and neighbours. Although I've conducted around the world during 60 years as a professional

musician, there's something special about sharing the platform with people I know so well – and sharing the privilege of living in this beautiful part of the world.

Most concerts take place in Burford church, occasionally further afield to spread our musical message a little wider. That includes two unforgettable performances



of Britten's *War Requiem* in the rarefied surroundings of Winchester Cathedral and Tewkesbury Abbey. But it is with our wonderfully devoted Burford audience that we particularly enjoy sharing our joy in performing. The choir has a 100 singers and although we have occasionally included music on the lighter side – an evening of Gilbert & Sullivan or a selection of 'choral lollipops' for example – we feature mainly major classical works – Handel's *Messiah* (my final concert on 26 November), Haydn's *Creation*, Mozart's *Requiem* and so on.

We've also regularly programmed works by living composers – preserving choral music for the future. This has been a fascinating and hugely enjoyable musical journey for us all. I shall miss it dreadfully, but am happy to be handing over to my successor a very fine choir of which I remain extremely proud.

Pool Meadow is a highly regarded local resource and the Green Gym team has been working hard over the summer pulling out swathes of Himalayan balsam – an invasive non-native plant which spreads quickly and can smother other vegetation. In addition. extensive scything of horsetail has aimed to discourage further growth so that

wildflowers can eventually be planted in wetter areas. The main priority has been public access, so work has also focused on keeping the footpaths clear and replenishing them with wood chippings. On other sites, members have been busy throughout August and early September. Jobs have included weeding and composting at Chipping Norton Health Centre (see photo), scything paths, sawing and stacking tree trimmings at Fitzalan Wood and clearing areas in the Millennium Wood at Kingham to allow access to blackberries and apples. A session at Hawkyard Copse prepared for a visit from NOOG – the North Oxfordshire Organic Gardeners.

At their August meeting, Chipping Norton Probus Club members welcomed Will Reid from the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, who gave a most interesting talk. Set up as a charity by Royal Charter in 1917 and funded by six member governments, The CWGC commemorates over 1.7 million men and women who died in the two World Wars. Its work covers more than 150 countries and territories and 23,000 locations, with an extensive

archive of records. Some 2,500 war cemeteries, plots and memorials for those with no known graves have been constructed. In the UK there are war graves and memorials at over 12,000 locations, from some naming tens of thousands to others in local churchyards, with perhaps only one name. Pictured here is one of the 12 listed for Chipping Norton cemetery on the CWGC website. The conservation of these sites is ongoing, being undertaken by a global team of 800 gardeners and specialist teams of stonemasons. Commission staff continue to recover remains from former battlefields and their records enable governments to identify those buried without a name. The CWGC is pledged to ensure that all those who made the ultimate sacrifice are commemorated with dignity and honour. 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

Those Quiet Woman memories

was really interested to read the recollections of The Quiet Woman and the walk from Dunthrop. (Letters September 2023)

My mother lived with her grandmother in Heythrop, after her mother died and her father.


my grandfather, was fighting with the Royal Artillery at Dunkirk and then in Burma. When my mother Sylvia married my father Frank White, they lived in one of the cottages next to the pub, and the walk between Southcombe and Heythrop was a regular event. That continued until I was born, and they moved, along with my elder brother, into Chipping Norton. While they were still at Southcombe, my brother was regularly helping Mrs Pratley to collect the hens' eggs - that is, until the day he locked her in the hen house and suggested that she could come out through the pop hole, as the hens did! Our association with Southcombe continued for many years. Bill Pearce, who had been my parents' neighbour was conductor on the regular Heythrop bus - when we still had such things and on occasion, after my younger brother was born, would see us older boys safely on and off the bus to Heythrop to see family. Dad worked for the Co-op, in the warehouse, for many years, before working as a cable jointer for BT, when the BT yard was based where Millview flats in West Street are now.

Mum worked for Pettiphers grocers in West Street until my elder brother came along.
