Remembrance in colour, Lord Cameron of Chipping Norton is back, Ambitious Pool Meadow Plan, Skatepark Ideas Wanted, No Action on Town Parking

After another successful Poppy Appeal run by their volunteers, Chipping Norton's British Legion Branch led the outdoor service, under clear skies on Saturday II November at the War Memorial, to mark the 1918 Armistice with the two-minute silence. Wreaths were laid by local organisations. On Sunday, I2 November, the Parade marched from a somewhat damp Market Square to St Mary's Church for the Remembrance Service — with the bells rung at St Mary's Church (see article below). The Royal British Legion then led the Parade to the Town Hall for the salute and a reception with wonderful food prepared by our Ukranian guests.

Legion Branch Chair Steve Kingsford thanked everyone for their support and he also made special mention of the Remembrance display at the Town Phone Box – taken over by children from the Town Nursery with help from Banana Moon Nursery, CN Pre-school and Jane Phil Potter Childminding. Steve stressed how much the Legion valued talking to young people and had recently visited both Cubs and Scouts to explain the importance of Remembrance.





Ringing for Remembrance

On Remembrance Sunday, Chippy's St Mary's church bells rang out to honour those who have died or suffered in wartime. However, if you listened carefully before the service, you would have realised the sound was sadder than usual. Bells at this time are rung half-muffled – that is, a muffle is placed over half the bell clapper so every other note sounds like a sad echo. There have of course been times when Chippy bells could not ring for Remembrance. Bells were silenced nationally in 1940 in readiness to sound the alarm for a German invasion. This ban was lifted in 1943 after public pressure, debates in Parliament and Churchill's direct intervention. Many ringers were away at war but local schoolchildren and students took up the challenge and Jean Datson of Spelsbury later founded a national association of the '43ers' who had learnt to ring at that time. Bells were of course rung enthusiastically on VE day.



Covid also halted ringing locally and nationally. It is taking determined but kindly efforts by Chippy's Tower Captain Chris Harris, District Ringing Master David Salter and local ringers (pictured) to move Chippy's team back towards full strength. Bells have had a long association with Remembrance but also with celebrating peace. Recently, in 2018, they were rung for peace around the world, a hundred years after the Armistice. Shepherd and farm worker Mont Abbott recalled in the book *Lifting the Latch* that

many Enstone ringers were still away at war for the 1918 Armistice and the parson had to ring three bells including one with his foot. Despite this (or perhaps because of it) Mont said, 'you never heard such a pandemonium'. The ringing in Enstone was called off and the team walked to Chippy but could find no beer in any of the 29 pubs — so had to walk home again singing.

In memory of Torben Erik George Sorensen MC




Chipping Norton resident Maggie Sorensen recently lost her son Torben. His funeral — with full military honours — took place on I November. Thanks to Maggie for including this for our Remembrance tribute.

At Torben's funeral, his coffin was carried into the church by

six soldiers who had served with him, accompanied by 'He ain't heavy, he's my brother'. The Princess of Wales's Royal Regimental flag, his cap and full service medals including the Military Cross, lay on top of the coffin. Lieutenant General Doug Chalmers CB, DSO, OBE addressed the 400+ strong congregation. He said he had the honour of serving with Torben in Afghanistan. He finished his eulogy with 'Torben never knew how good he was'. In a military career of 22 years, Torben served in Afghanistan and also Northern Ireland, Iraq and the Balkan conflict. He retired in December 2018. Reflecting his exemplary military career, The Last Post followed by two minutes silence and Reveille closed the service. Maggie described her son as 'an extremely loving son, father and brother. Torben's proudest achievement was that he never lost a man who had served alongside him'.

with him for 10 years. He gets no break, but does always have a cup of tea on hand. The flowers and plants come from the Netherlands by lorry three times a week and, since Brexit, undergo lengthy checks at customs. Asked for his reflections on Chipping Norton, Steve said that the people are lovely. Indeed, he has nothing bad to say about the Town except for the weather (it's probably colder than Thame where he also has a market stall). However, he estimates that he has missed setting up the stall because of bad weather less than five times over the years. Steve told the News Team that since he started in the business, there are many more types of flowers available. He particularly likes daffodils but is fond of all plants and always tries to give customers as much individual advice as possible. He comes from Middlesex and market stalls have run in the family for generations. There are plans for his sonin-law Will to take over the Chippy stall to continue the tradition. Steve, 60 this year, hopes to get up later on market days, have more days than just Sunday off and more holidays

He had said he was 'retiring from mainstream politics'

when he suddenly resigned

It's 'back to the future' as a newly ennobled David Cameron, our MP for 15 years and former Prime Minister, has returned to politics as life peer Lord Cameron of Chipping Norton to serve as Foreign Secretary in a reshuffled Conservative Government. He had said he was 'retiring from mainstream politics' when he suddenly resigned

from Parliament in September 2016 after losing to Brexiteers in the Referendum, which he had confidently called as leader of the 'Remain' Campaign. Since then, he has kept his family home in Dean, where his much-photographed shepherd's hut provided a refuge for writing his memoirs. He has also travelled the world on private advisory work and, amongst other appointments, is president of Alzheimer's Research UK.

In his first Prime Minister's Questions as Conservative leader of the Opposition back in 2005, the then Mr Cameron famously said of PM Tony Blair, 'he was the future once'. He now finds himself as the political face of the UK in a post-Brexit world. Lord Cameron said he was returning to public service 'out of a sense of duty'. Local reactions were fairly predictable. Chippy's Conservative MP Robert Courts said he 'brings immense experience and ability to the crucial role'. WODC's Lib Dem Leader Andy Graham (who stood against David Cameron in 2015) hoped for some 'common sense and cohesion to the divisive foreign policy of this Conservative Government', but Witney's Lib Dem candidate for MP Charlie Maynard said it was 'more firefighting from the Conservative Government'. WODC's Labour Group Leader Duncan Enright called it a 'step back into the past', with 'a man who brought over a decade of austerity and walked away from Brexit'.

Lord Cameron chose the title 'of Chipping Norton' – as long as it's not already taken, that is his choice. Of course, he hasn't actually ever lived in the Town, and the good folk of Chippy were sometimes miffed in recent years to be tarred with the 'Chipping Norton Set' brush. Based on reaction in the national press to the latest news, this notorious label is set for a lively revival!

Chippy's Christmas lights

The Town's tradition of Christmas lights – welcomed by visitors, residents and town businesses – kicked off again this year on 23 November with a big 'switch on' and sing-along. In recent years Chipping Norton Town Council has made more investment in Town Hall lights with a large Christmas tree alongside, plus attractive light displays in the permanent trees in the market square and along Middle Row. The other

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tradition of little lighted Christmas trees above all the shop fronts, installed by volunteers, went back many years, but much of the electric infrastructure had been failing, with an increasing number of gaps. Earlier this year, the Town Council

decided to upgrade it all with new 'joined up' electrics and connections for the High Street, the lower market place and Middle Row. As part of this, instead of using nearly 100 small, real trees, the Town Council decided to invest in trees made from recycled plastic. As ever, any change provokes debate see letters page. Responding to a burst of negative social media comments, about both the plastic and the appearance of the trees, Mayor Sandra Coleman explained the background and reasons. She said that they were using artificial trees due to the environmental impact of cutting down many small trees, which was greater than if the trees were allowed to grow bigger before being cut. The plastic trees and new electrics have not yet appeared down New Street, or along to West Street or Horsefair. leaving many empty brackets. The Town Council's Christmas lights budget in 2023/4 of £15,000 is proposed to increase to £19,000 for next year 2024/5.

Gleeson Housing issues

Plans for up to 104 new homes by Gleeson Land on a site east of Burford Road may be delayed. WODC has decided that any planning application (the next step) would require a full Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA). In a letter issued to the developer on 9 November, WODC say, 'the proposed development will have potential likely significant effects on the Glyme Valley Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), a statutorily designated nature conservation site and the Glyme Valley BBOWT reserve. The site also lies close to the Cotswolds National Landscape. It is therefore considered to be EIA development, requiring the submission of an Environmental Statement'. The implications of this can only be guessed at, but the detailed planning work required in an EIA could delay the submission of the intended planning application.

Gleeson Land had been hoping to capitalise on WODC's lack of five-year housing land supply to gain permission to build on land not allocated for development in the current Local Plan. But the situation has recently changed, with WODC publishing a statement calculating that they do now have enough housing land across the District, thereby reducing their requirement to approve applications on sites not in the Local Plan. This could tilt the balance back in favour of refusal of applications on land outside the Local Plan, including that east of Burford Road.

Larder's support at Christmas

Throughout the Covid disruptions and in holidays - including Christmas - the team at Chippy Larder have gone beyond their 'membership subscription' service to provide free food, supplies and toys for families who cannot easily afford them. This year, for those families, they are planning to put together 'Holiday Hampers' with an assortment of 'store cupboard staples' and essential toiletries - all designed to ensure that families have everything they need to enjoy the long Christmas break. Helping The Larder team to do this will include the Midcounties Co-op CEO and his team providing the essential food items. Local charity Thrive North Ox, as in previous Christmases, are coming forward with toiletries and household essentials. But this year there is more - with Blenheim Palace offering to join in the Christmas spirit with an extra touch of surprise for each hamper. The Chippy Larder team are delighted with the help from local organisations coming to together to spread some Christmas cheer - and demonstrate the compassion and community spirit. The scheme is targeted at particular families in need. The Larder's Rizvana Poole emphasizes that there is no means testing or selection criteria, but the Larder is guided by their partner organisations - local schools, charities and Council bodies who know and understand our communities and have referred to the Larder, individuals and families who could do with a little extra support over the Christmas period. 

Revival of net zero home plan

In September, the Chipping Norton News reported on a scheme for local Chippy-based development company, Green Axis, to build net zero carbon affordable homes at Weavers Fold. This is a WODC-owned site at the far end of Walterbush Road and, with much trumpeting back in 2022, WODC announced the 'groundbreaking' scheme as a 'national first'. The homes would be discounted from market value, with a zero-carbon specification and custom options for buyers. Then suddenly, this June 2023, WODC said they were pulling out of the deal to avoid potential financial risk, and would be pursuing other options for the land. Chipping Norton Town Council were not well pleased. But now, it seems, after Green Axis and WODC reworked the proposals, and legal issues have been ironed out, the Council's Executive, at their latest November meeting, have now agreed for Green Axis to go ahead. The plan will now be for seven homes. Net zero carbon homes means they will not have a carbon footprint and will use innovative technologies to reduce energy usage. This will also mean the homes are cheaper to run for the people that buy them. The homes will be sold at 15% less than the average market price for the area. The scheme will also provide an electric vehicle charging hub and garden for the community to use. Chipping Norton's District Councillor Geoff Saul, who is also WODC's Executive Member for Housing and Social Welfare, said he was pleased that issues had been resolved and that WODC were moving forward with Green Axis. He stressed that, in spite of the challenges, the Council was committed to pushing for new ways to tackle both the housing crisis and climate emergency.

WODC: no town parking plan



Visitors, local shoppers and residents experiencing parking issues in Chipping Norton Town Centre particularly on busy shopping and tourist days seem unlikely to get more help from West Oxon District Council anytime soon. WODC's

last 'parking strategy' for Chippy, in 2016, said the town centre was more than 100 parking places short – and solutions such as an extra layer in WODC's New Street Car Park were mooted. Now in 2023, things are busier, there are 100s more houses and, in April, Oxfordshire County Council started a stricter regime enforcing short stay limits on the Town's streets. WODC, with an eye on their two free long-stay (12 hours) Albion St and New St car parks, started penalising nearby residents overstaying the limits. After complaints, the WODC Executive Member in charge agreed to pause that action - pending further review.

A year ago, WODC's Executive said they would look at Chippy's parking problems as part of a District-wide Review - with a focus on their 14 free car parks. This much-trailed Review has now been published; the report and its recommendations were discussed at WODC's October Executive. The result? No actions for Chippy - no more parking provision, no change to stay times, no potential residents parking permits. The review looked at car park use,

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with a spot check on capacity during only one week in early June. In fact, Albion St car park, (average capacity use of 85%) and New St car park (average capacity use 72%, but 82% for 4 hours over lunch time) had some of the highest usage rates across the District. But the Review concluded we have enough parking – so no action is proposed. A 'spot check' by the News on a wintery November Sunday lunchtime found our car parks overflowing with visitors.

Chippy will expect another busy summer next year. The new Living Room Cinema is open (no parking), the Branch Hub opens in February (no parking), the hotel plan for HSBC looks like being revived (no parking), Series 3 of Diddly Squat's TV series is on the way (rampant visitors), the Town Council wants to double the use of the Town Hall with events (good news but no extra parking) and — as reported in October — Chippy should have over 1000 new homes on the way (with no extra town centre parking mentioned). Any money for this from WODC? Unlikely. At the same October WODC Executive meeting, officers reported around a £200 million shortfall in funds to provide much needed District-wide 'infrastructure' — and that, they said, is a 'conservative' estimate.

Home Care Award



East Chippy Roman hold up



Will any housing ever get built at East Chippy? As regular readers know, after years of little action, planning the 1000+ new homes at East Chipping Norton 'Strategic Development Area' has been stalled for nearly 18 months because of archaeology investigations. There's not much news. Historic

England (HE) has been assessing two detailed archaeology reports on land off Glyme Lane before deciding whether or not to recommend the Department of Digital, Culture, Media & Sport to designate the area a Scheduled Ancient Monument. There's no formal decision yet but but developer Cala Homes, whose land at East Chippy could be affected (so has a lot is at stake financially), told the News that they heard in early October that HE's report had been sent to DCMS for 'final adjudication'. We now await the Secretary of State's decision on scheduling that could determine the future shape of Chippy.

What might Government Ministers decide? Our planning authority West Oxfordshire District Council might just be ultra-cautious, but do they know something others don't? In a response to a nearby planning proposal they stated recently that 'the indications are that the area will be scheduled. While the extent of the scheduled monument is not yet known, an important consideration will not only be the impact of this proposed development on the scheduled monument but also on its setting and the potential need for a buffer area'.

So what for East Chippy? Restrictions on developing part of the East Chippy site could reduce the Local Plan proposal for 1000+ new homes significantly, but, with some careful land allocation, it should still be possible to design a sensible masterplan for new homes, employment and other facilities to the north and east of the Town. Major landowners, Oxfordshire County Council and Cala, must both be eager to pursue this. Paul McCann of Cala told the News, 'We are very keen to continue the master planning on the East Chipping Norton site but until we know finally DCMS's position on the archaeological issue, it is difficult to move forward'.

Projects to smarten up Town

October saw a first meeting in Chipping Norton of a potential new 'Town Partnership' proposed by West Oxfordshire District Council and aimed initially at bidding for money to improve the 'public realm' in our Town Centre. It was organised by WODC's Market Town's Officer. Over a year ago, WODC secured a grant from Central Government's Levelling Up 'Shared Prosperity Fund' to improve market town centres across the District, to be spent from April 2022 to March 2025. Included is £62k, specifically to improve public realm, increase footfall & reduce vacancies, and £69k to improve open markets and town centres generally. So not a huge pot of cash to cover more than five market towns over a 3-year period already over half way through. Consultants, appointed by WODC, have suggested a Town Partnership in Chippy as 'a forum for key stakeholders to discuss and gain feedback on projects in the town.'

(B 4026 At its first meeting, in October, representatives local businesses. council officers and of some Chippy's councillors had a lively discussion brainstorming potential visual promotional improvements to the weekly market. It seems WODC could even consider handing the market over to an experienced privoperator. meeting also suggested improvements to the general appearance of Town including Chippy in Bloom, bunting, lighting, street furniture,

flower beds, empty units, improvements to the pedestrian and cycling experience, visitor information and signage across the town. Then, on 31 October, group members did a 'walkabout' identifying signage updates they feel are required. The next step is to put a bid or bids together for a share of the Government grant 'pot'.

There seems some good initial enthusiasm, but these kind of 'grant bid' projects to get Central Government money can



be bureaucratic, take time and divert some local councils from what they should have been doing anyway (for example

upgrading Chippy's signposts to the nonexistent visitor centre and citizens advice offices that closed many years ago). A similar initiative in late 2021 for 'Covid Recovery' money which also looked at Chippy's 'public realm' got nowhere. On the latest 'Shared Prosperity Fund'. The Observer reported in November that 95% of local councils that received this SPF funding in 2022-23 were unable to spend all their share. Let's hope Partnership group, with

Pool Meadow restoration

What progress at Pool Meadow, the historic wetland and nature area along the stream below the New Street playground? Just over a year ago, in September 2022, Chipping Norton Town Council (who own the site), commissioned local consultant Jonny Ackroyd of Beaumont Rivers to

prepare a feasibility study on how to reverse the decline in biodiversity and restore the meadow as a wildlife and countryside access site. Jonny's comprehensive plan, includes: connecting the stream with the meadow to create ponded wetland area, building dams and dealing with an old sewage outlet, bringing the great horsetail monoculture under control, replanting the meadow floodplain with wildflower seed mix, improving 285m of existing footpath surface to include wheelchair/pushchair accessibility, adding information boards, possible picnic areas as well as an additional formalised 160 metre further path round The Mount side of the pool.

So far, clearing of some of the problematic growth has been done, with great help from the Green Gym. Dangerous trees have been felled, and the route of the rear path has been carefully cleared. After full discussion with all the different public authorities involved, Beaumont Rivers have now finished a full feasibility and design report - which will now be used to obtain planning permissions, permits and Scheduled Ancient Monument Consent. To complete this 'planning and permissions' stage, costs could be around £20,000 of which £13,000 is being covered by a grant from the Evenlode Partnership via the Trust for Oxfordshire's Environment. Town Councillors were very positive about all this. Once permissions are obtained, the main construction, including with contractors, can start. Costs could exceed £100,000 but major partners, such as Thames Water, are keen to support this important project, and Jonny is optimistic that other grant bodies will join in and work should proceed smoothly in 2024. The Town Council earmarked £25,000 of reserves in next year's budget for their contribution. For the full report see chippingnorton-tc.gov.uk under Strategic Planning Committee meetings.

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Defibrillator for Banana Moon

In October, Chipping Norton's Banana Moon Nursery on Evans Way was delighted to see a new defibrillator installed at its building. It was thanks to a national scheme called 'Little Hearts, Bright Futures' launched by the umbrella Banana Moon franchise company. They are in the process of raising

£125,000 to provide an external automated defibrillator in every one of the around 40 Banana Moon franchise operations. The equipment can be accessed and used in an emergency not only by the nursery but by the local community. The devices (as with other defibrillators at locations around Chipping Norton) will be registered with local ambulance services, who can direct 999 callers to their location. The British Heart Foundation say there are more than 30,000 out-of-hospital cardiac arrests annually in the UK – 20% are in public places, and more than 270 a year occur in schools. BHF say that using a defibrillator as well as quality CPR can increase survival odds from 6% to 74%.

Town Council's 2024/5 budget

Chipping Norton Town Council will hold their next Full Council meeting at 6.30pm on Monday 4 December, when they aim to agree their proposed budget for next year (starting I April for 2024/2025) - and any required rise in Council Tax. For the current year (2023/24), the Town Council froze their 'per-household' share of Council Tax - planning to use a small amount of reserves to balance the books. They were also planning to use over £300,000 of further 'earmarked reserves' (saved from previous years) on Town Hall repairs, new recreation equipment and a Pool Meadow Project. On 4 December, the full Council will consider progress so far this year and the budget recommendations from their Finance Committee which met on 20 November. With no 'per-household' rise last year, the Council are looking at an increased budget for 2024/5 (starting next April), to cover inflation cost increases and increased staffing. They will be considering an 8% rise per household and some use of the Council's reserves to balance the books. All this will be finalised by the full Chipping Norton Town Council on 4 December.

Polluting the river Evenlode



The national issue of river pollution, from both sewage and other causes, remains a hot topic locally including around Chipping Norton. This summer a group of volunteers joined the Evenlode Catch-

Hot spot outfalls with high pollution levels

ment Partnership (ECP) to undertake a water pollution outfall 'safari' on the stream above the Chipping Norton water treatment works. This stream eventually flows into the River Evenlode and down to the Thames. There is automatic pollution testing equipment (called sondes) already in the stream above and below the treatment plant. What was surprising



was the level of pollution being recorded above the plant. The safari sought to find what the possible sources of the contaminants might be. Some pipes set into the stream bank were known about and recorded, some were not.

The survey found four outfalls/pipes upstream of the upper sonde. At the first outfall (the first picture), chemical testing showed high levels of nitrates. There was a strong smell, strong discolouration, and lots of sediment on the surrounding channel bed. The amount of human waste products is evident. This outflow is adjacent to Bliss Mill but does not come from there but is part of the Thames Water system. One other outfall was of particular interest. At another spot (second picture) there was a lot of erosion from the outfall, extensive sediment, and a strong smell. Investigations continue to track its source.

The ECP is a collaboration of various communities and organisations associated with the Evenlode river catchment. Among its projects and objectives is one to address and eliminate water pollution sources throughout the catchment. The ECP has been funded by various bodies including Thames Water. The River Evenlode rises near Moreton-in-Marsh and local citizen scientists grouped as Riverlution have proved the river is already polluted even there. Previously, Thames Water promised to upgrade the water treatment works at Moreton but in its latest Plan delivered to the Environment Agency, this, among 12 other upgrades, has been discarded. ECP sees this as a betrayal of trust and has therefore decided to sever all

links with Thames Water from 2025 once the current funding arrangements finish. They will seek alternative funding and collaborations with organisations such as WASP (Windrush Against Sewage Pollution) which has gained a national profile in its exposure of water companies' statutory failings.

Xmas: beware online fraud!

Citizens Advice West Oxfordshire are warning Chipping Norton shoppers about seasonal shopping traps. Nationally, Citizens Advice is contacted by worried shoppers every nine seconds and fraud is up 35%. Teresa Archer, head of CAWO, said they often hear of shoppers' difficulties and are there to help. Here are some tips to help you shop confidently and not to fall for scams:

If it seems too good to be true – it probably is. Be wary of sites offering big discounts, and ensure it's a genuine product. Check on www.gov.uk/get-information-about-acompany. Do some background research into the company and look at the reviews. Find out how they can be contacted, where they're based and if they're part of a consumer protection scheme.

Be cautious about payment methods. Watch out for being asked to use methods such as iTunes vouchers, crypto currency or via bank transfer. These are harder to track and lack vital protections you get using debit or credit cards or third-party apps such as PayPal.

Delivery scams and issues. It's the seller's responsibility to make sure the item is delivered to you. If the seller used a courier, they should chase the courier to find out what's

Views on next Local Plan

Where should West Oxfordshire's new development go over the next 20 years? The District Council have declared their current Local Plan (adopted in 2018) as 'out of date' and they have had some issues with new housing plans. So WODC's Executive are eager to get a new Local Plan in place, covering up to 2041. They've been asking the public for views, and a WODC public exhibition at Chipping Norton's Glyme Hall exhibition on 23 October was well attended. Naturally, particularly with the current Local Plan failing to get housing growth in the right places, there was a lot of focus on Chipping Norton. But overall, district-wide, WODC said response was 'fantastic', with more than 600 responses giving 'helpful feedback'.

The Chippy News Team did its own analysis of the 274 online responses sent to WODC by the closure date. Many on-line respondents felt new development should still be distributed in a hierarchical manner, focussing mainly on the three towns (Carterton, Witney and Chipping Norton), with some growth in larger villages and less in more rural areas. Carterton was favoured as a location but Witney residents felt they have had enough! The idea of more growth in 'village clusters' was unpopular, but many favoured growth along public transport corridors.

Many people stressed the need for infrastructure investment to cope with new housing, citing issues such as sewerage upgrades, road capacity improvements, increased healthcare provision and enhanced public transport. People in Witney, Bampton, North Leigh and Long Hanborough repeatedly said they were already overwhelmed by new development. Smaller villages were losing character and identity. Re-use of brownfield sites was favoured. Development along the A40 corridor was favoured – if it helped fund solutions to congestion. Rail infrastructure here was also mentioned. One respondent described Chipping Norton as a 'catastrophe' due to new housing without additional facilities.

As reported in November's News, Chipping Norton Town Council favours a broad strategy, combining Carterton development with growth in village clusters and along public transport routes. A WODC spokesperson confirmed that a combination of strategies was likely. Chipping Norton could see a change of direction, but the immediate next stage of growth remains unclear — particularly with East Chipping Norton's plans still stalled while a Government decision is awaited on the archaeology reports about the site. WODC aims to produce a summary report about the new Local Plan by December, explaining the main issues raised and how those will be taken into account. In the new year, they will pull

together the draft plan before consulting again on their preferred approach.

Raising the UN Flag

In October, Town Councillors joined members of Chipping Norton Amnesty group to raise the United Nations Flag to mark United Nations Day – the annual commemoration of the official creation of the UN on 24 October 1945. Amnesty International campaigns to protect human rights and for a world where human rights are enjoyed by all. This is a cross-

cutting theme in all UN programmes: peace and security, development, humanitarian assistance, and economic and social affairs. At the flagraising, Amnesty's Kate Ward outlined the Group's work and Town Cllr Alex Keyser remembered his grandfather. John Keyser. who was a Secretary with the UN just after its formation. Deputy Mayor Cllr Steve Akers led a minute's silence to remember all those who have lost their lives in conflicts around the world. The UN flag's blue colour and laurel leaves symbolise peace.

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

Letting all the grass grow!



Uncut grass verges at the bottom of Hailey Road

How do we like our grass verges? Chippy's road and pavement users may have noticed that many of our adjacent grass verges seem to have grown to some height - and sometimes overgrowing the paths or even blocking sight lines. Local resident Martin Hannant had particularly noticed those along the Churchill Road at the top of Tilsley Road and bottom of Hailey Road. It appears the verges has been cut only once this last year - and cut grass was left on top and made a mess. After he enquired at the Guildhall, our Deputy Town Clerk, Katherine Jang, told him that Oxfordshire County Council ('tis them who do it), had recently changed their grass-cutting policy, which has caused some discontent. OCC say 'we updated our maintenance policy to prioritise biodiversity where possible. This new approach means that all roadside verges in Oxfordshire (rural and urban) will be cut once a year. Wildlife refuges will be cut in rotation every five years'. It is encouraging to see our County Council's enhanced focus on biodiversity, or some might suspect 'costcutting'. Anyone can report messy or dangerous verges to OCC online via fixmystreet.oxfordshire.gov.uk/ and you can track the progress of your complaint.



Healthy hints for January

So now to January Pies, puddings and chocolate eaten, mulled wine, beer and prosecco drunk. Feeling a tad bloated and sluggish after too much Christmas feasting? The News Team here suggest trying 'Veganuary' – and maybe a 'Dry & Gym' January!

Try the 'Veganuary' challenge

VEGANUARY

Join a worldwide movement – Veganuary started in 2014, to

inspire people to experiment with a plant-based diet throughout January. In 2022, more than 620,000 people signed up. Why? Research shows that having a diet rich in plant-based

foods can have numerous health benefits including reduced risk of heart disease, cancer, obesity, general inflammation of tissues and organs, and lower blood pressure. Plant based



diets can increase life expectancy, improve digestive health, boost our immune system and, fascinatingly, because adding a wider variety of plants adds beneficial microbes to our gut microbiome, it can improve our mental health too. And of course – for the sake of the climate, environment and animal welfare reasons – switching to plant-based foods will help you and your family reduce your impact. Meat, poultry, dairy, fish and honey, produced in volume, can all take their toll on the planet.

Lots of interesting choices – Perhaps when you hear the words 'vegan diet' you think it's going to be very dull. It's quite the opposite in fact, with a wide variety of vegetables, legumes, pulses, whole grains, fruits, nuts and seeds, plus, more recently, plant-based alternatives to traditional meat-based products to choose from. Dips, stews, pies, bakes, soups, salads, snacks, drinks – the list is endless. Many plant foods are rich in protein (especially the wind-producing types!) so you can still eat a balanced diet if you research and plan it thoughtfully. You might add vitamin supplements (especially B12 which is present in many animal foods but not easily found in plant-based foods) and use yeast and yeast extracts). But if you have any serious health concerns please check with your healthcare provider before making any big diet changes.

Switching & managing the budget – One key – including in persuading your family to give it a go – is not to think about what you're NOT having in your diet, but what you can ADD

to make it interesting, flavourful and nutritious, including experimenting with a wider variety of spices and herbs. Worried that vegan foods will cost more? First, if you cook from scratch, a plant-based diet can be incredibly low cost when compared with diets containing fresh meat. Rice, pasta, pulses, grains and veg are cheap, filling and nutritious, and often burn slower, avoiding peaks of hunger you might get soon after a meat-rich meal. When it comes to ready meals and processed foods (often lifesavers for busy parents), local research suggests more supermarkets – including the Co-op, Aldi, M&S and Sainsbury's in Chipping Norton - stock a wide range of vegan food and drink products, with many ready meals the same price as or even less than meat-based versions. Check the packet for vegan friendly labels.

What about eating out? - More and more pubs,



restaurants and cafes are adding plant-based options to their menus. Whilst Chippy and surrounding villages don't (perhaps yet?) have any veganonly places, (which

many firm vegans prefer so their food isn't contaminated by animal products), we found several with delicious vegan options including Brown Cow and The Fox in Chippy, Chloes in Charlbury, The Straw Kitchen at Whichford Pottery and Cinnamon Stick in Middle Barton. When you eat out it's worth noting that some places use V for Vegetarian on the menu (which typically includes dairy products) and VG or VE for Vegan (which doesn't), whilst others use them the other way around! Check the small print!

How to start – Interested? You can sign up for the challenge at www.veganuary.com where you'll get loads of tips, inspiration and an easy recipe every day for 31 days. Some people going vegan make it a full lifestyle choice (eg no animal products in clothes, skincare and more), but most just start with diet. So, if you fancy losing some of that Christmas podge, giving you and the family a health boost, and potentially saving money, why not give a plant-based diet a try?

Dry and Gym January!

Traditionally, January sees us make our New Year's Resolutions (this year I will lose 5 stones, get promoted and run a marathon), join the gym (I will go twice a week all year) and foreswear alcohol (I will never drink again). Then, just as traditionally, we break our resolutions before 2 January, go twice to the gym then not again until the following January and open a bottle because it's someone's



birthday somewhere! So be kind to yourself. Make your New Year's Resolutions practical – exercise several times a week by going for a walk or scorching up the house with the vacuum cleaner or standing on one leg for five minutes and maybe only drink to celebrate the birthdays of people you know ... Just some thoughts.

Our Chippy Mince Pie test!

Are you buying Christmas mince pies or making your own? With tight budgets in mind, the News Team decided to help by organising a blind taste test — here's what happened!

Testing Pies: 6 bought & 4 homemade -Mince pies great and good were sourced, six packets bought from Chipping Norton's main supermarkets and four homemade, two of which were filled with homemade mincemeat (recipes by the great Delia Smith). Then 10 plates of pies were set before a 'tasting panel' of II worthy Chippy residents. Could they tell the difference between homemade and shop bought? Which was the most delicious? How was the texture, something Paul Hollywood refers to in The Great British Bake Off as 'the feel in the mouth' (well it would hardly be 'the feel on the elbow'), and, importantly, which gave the best value for money?

From cheap to a whopping lot! — To calculate the cost of home-made pies, one committed 'panel' member surveyed ingredients to be bought from a range of shops, including the Co-op, M & S, Oats, Aldi and Sainsbury's. The costs for six homemade mince pies were calculated, including pastry and homemade filling (but not the cost of cooking). The range was from £1.71 to £2.83 for six, working out



at 28p to 47p per pie. The shop bought ranged from £1.50 to £3.50 a box, at from 25p to a whopping 58p per pie.

And finally... the results – The star of the show was a box of six shop-bought pies at the cheapest price, £1.50 for six or 25p each. They were rated highest by a considerable margin! They were a little smaller than most, and simple in style, but there was no arguing with the result in this blind tasting. The most expensive shop bought pies were third, at £3.50 a box. They boasted all butter pastry and Cognac in the filling, but at 58p each it's interesting that they were beaten into third by the cheapest and by one homemade batch. The homemade pies were ranked from second to sixth, costing between 28p and 47p per pie, so, overall, it would seem worth the bother of making your own for taste, but it won't be significantly cheaper. Coming in last were shop-bought pies with a chocolate crumble on the top, so the tasters clearly said, 'don't mess about with a mince pie recipe'. Thank you to everyone who contributed to this mission. It was fun, and interesting too.

Perfect party tipples

Here are two News Team suggestions for warming the cockles on a cold night

Mulled Wine Cocktail – For the perfect party why not serve this? **STEP I**: Put 100g light muscovado sugar in a pan



with I star anise, I cinnamon stick, 4 cloves and I50ml water. Bring slowly to the boil, stirring to dissolve the sugar. **STEP 2:** Simmer for 2 mins, pour into a large jug and leave to cool. Add I lemon and 2 clementines, both thinly sliced, to the jug with I50ml Cointreau and a 750ml bottle light red wine

(Beaujolais?). Stir well, cover and chill for at least 2 hrs or even overnight. **STEP 3:** Serve chilled or over ice, with twist of orange zest and a star anise. For a traditional warm serving, heat without boiling and serve in heatproof glasses.

The Orchard's Wassail Cup – Those who went to Chippy's Apple Day at the Community Orchard might have

tasted this delicious (and non-alcoholic!) concoction. Very many thanks to Heather Leonard for the recipe: Put all the following into a large pan and then heat gently: 6 tsp brown sugar, 2 litres apple juice, 6 eating apples cored, I orange



stud-ded with cloves, I inch cinnamon stick, 6 allspice berries (maybe use powder!), I inch root ginger — peeled and chopped. The mixture should be simmered briefly but not for long! Serve warm or cold.

Cinderella - A fantastic fiesta!

Chippy's latest nationally-admired traditional Panto – this year running to nearly 100 performances – is *Cinderella*, written by the Theatre's own Director John Terry, with original music by Eliane Correa and Rebecca Applin. It opened on 15 November and here's what our *News* Team reviewers thought!



Cinderella in the rainforest? Whatever next! On entering The Theatre colourful decorations immediately tell you something different and vibrant is about to happen on the stage. On taking your seat, you see the amazing forest curtains about to open onto bright buildings Santa Maria de

Orejas de Soplillo – 'Santa Maria with the sticky out ears'. After the jolly opening song, Leafy Mother Mountain, Cinderella and her friend Buttons (you'll big it up for him

later) remind the audience of the original story with clever puppetry.

The story unfolds with all the usual Chippy pantomime fun, songs, jokes and 'it's behind you' but with the added pzazz of Latin American music and dance. The wonderful, sparring identical twin ugly sisters Quosimoda and Adnausea each pick an admirer from the audience. Cruel stepmother Elsa is booed as she should be, for wanting to cut down the forest and diversify into a better money-spinning enterprise. When the invitations to a party at the big house on the hill owned by wealthy Don Francisco, aka Chico, are handed out, we see just what a horrid life Cinderella leads.

As in the opening song, 'it really does take all sorts to make a world' and all's well that ends well, even though one of the Pippins does eat the pumpkin which should have been magicked into the carriage for Cinderella to go to the party. The Pippins deserve a special mention, as always right on cue; they make adorable donkeys too with Buttons' home delivery startup company. Writer/Director John Terry has been admirably assisted by the creative team, too numerous to mention, and the multilingual cast. A *Cinderella* you could never have imagined, but it works.

Cinderella runs to 14 January — so plenty of time if you missed it at Christmas!



Holy Trinity School ... are they still the Champions?

Local sports enthusiast Bill Williams has unearthed another chapter in the history of Chippy Baseball. This time he charts the unbeaten record of the Holy Trinity School team – winners of the Grant Cup back in 1933!

Are they still the champions? It's 90 years since Holy Trinity School won the Grant Cup! Chipping Norton's remarkable link with Baseball has been well documented and the successes of the 1920's under the leadership of Fred Lewis are legendary! In its heyday, the club ran five men's teams and at least one mixed team, but Baseball was also played competitively in local primary schools. This photograph from the Baseball archive at Chipping Norton Museum has revealed The Holy Trinity School team to be 'Holders of The Grant Cup' 90 years ago in 1933!

'The Grant Cup' was donated by Mr W Grant the Manager of Chippy's New Street cinema, and as far as we know they were the last team to win it and are therefore,

still the holders and defending champions! In the inter-war years, the game grew in popularity and competition between junior teams was even sponsored by The Daily Mirror. Holy Trinity had beaten the old British School, based in New Street until 1965 in the building which is now a Dental practice.

Five years after this photo was taken a junior team of 16 & 17 year-olds under the guidance of Fred Lewis reached the Southern Area National Juvenile Final, where they were beaten by a team called The Pioneers and it is likely that the Chippy team contained boys who

had played for Holy Trinity and other local Primary Schools in The Grant Cup competition!

Chippy Ramblers escape the mud



Green Gym: Focus on Fitzalan Wood

The Green Gym team has continued work in weathers on various local sites including at Chipping Norton Centre, Health weeding the borders, atriums and planters. In addition, we have also been weeding at Great Rollright School and cutting back invasive black-



thorn in the Glyme Valley Nature Reserve (managed by the BBOWT – the Berks, Bucks and Oxon Wildlife Trust). There was bramble and path clearance at Fitzalan Wood plus selected trees trimmed, branches stacked and logs prepared for storage. In addition, the team has now built this log store on the site. Fitzalan Wood, located in Station Road, was planted in 2014–15 by Chipping Norton Green Gym with the help of local school children. It was originally established under the guidance and support of the field reeves of the regulated pasture supported by The Trust for Oxfordshire's Environment (TOE) and Grundon Waste Management. The wood stands on part of the ancient common land granted to the Town in 1377–1378 by Richard Fitzalan, the Earl of Arundel, and can still be enjoyed by locals as a quiet spot to sit and enjoy the surrounding nature.

Chippy's plastic Christmas trees



Let's run through a few things, Chipping Norton 'Gateway to the Cotswolds' where tourists come to visit and spend time and money; maybe they visit for Christmas. Do plastic Christmas trees really say 'gateway to the Cotswolds'? ... No! It says welcome to

Chipping Norton, a town that has very little thought about the environment, sustainability or carbon footprint. The Carbon Trust has looked at the impact of plastic Christmas trees. A real tree no taller than 2 metres and no root stump has carbon footprint of 3.5kg of CO2. A plastic tree no taller than 2 metres has a carbon footprint of 40kg of CO2. This means using the tree for 10 years to have the same carbon footprint, IF the plastic tree will last 10 years. As a resident of Chipping Norton I'm offended and disappointed in each of the Town Councillors for inflicting more damage on the environment – as well as the damage to the image of Chipping Norton as 'Gateway to the Cotswolds' with no thought about how tourists and visitors will perceive our town. The Town Council continues to make terrible decisions and this one is one of the poorest decisions ever made, these trees will still be bits of plastic in the environment for many to come years. **Dan Pitcher** – A disappointed resident of Chipping Norton (see article p3 with an explanation on trees from the Mayor - ed)

my time there is starting to feel a bit surreal. In July, I was flying into Bishkek, with no idea, no expectations, and quite a lot of apprehension for what the next five weeks would hold. On reflection, I can confidently say this mindset served me well, as the experience proved more demanding and fulfilling than I could have imagined. Amidst the physical and emotional challenges of hiking every day at altitude, living in a 4-man tent with no

personal-space, and having no contact with the outside world, the expedition had its share of rewarding moments, from conquering a 4159m peak to sharing meals with kind

it a profoundly fulfilling and unforgettable journey. New Street road safety

A big thanks to the Chippy News for the two excellent articles in last month's issue, again highlighting the huge problems we have in this Town with road safety - or a lack of it. The articles (p4 Road safety & HGV actions? and Skatebark & road safety) outline how after over 20 years of feasibility studies, optioneering surveys (whatever that means) etc, etc Chipping Norton is still being ignored by Oxfordshire County Council when it comes to improving our road safety. How much taxpayer's money has been wasted over the years in 'commissioning a consultant' or 'completing an optioneering study'? How much longer is pedestrian safety being put at risk because there is a lack of pedestrian crossings in New Street, for example? Until there is a reduction of through traffic, including HGVs, we need to protect residents on what is probably the most dangerous road in the Town. Lack of finances has always been cited by OCC as a reason pedestrians continue to be unprotected whilst crossing New Street in particular. Therefore, I again ask Chippy Town Council to contribute towards the cost of funding a crossing/s before we have another serious accident or fatality in New Street. 
